From 1935 until 1951, Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue. Some recall its cramped quar-

ters but especially the energy and devotion of four ladies, Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it happen. A lobby plaque lists the names of other founders who shared their commitment. The rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.

In 1951, the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and, from 1960 - 1992, Bob Belfance served as director. Along with custodian/ticket office manag-

er, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions. Ticket receipts and donations helped meet expenses and created a modest endowment. A fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263-seat facility which opened in 1970. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has been paid off.

Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added class-rooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery and fly system, a sound-proof production booth and a costume workshop.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production, *The Laramie Project*, during the 2002-2003 season. Thanks for being a part of our history as we celebrate this 70th season!





Perhaps Thomas "Fats" Waller's most famous song is Ain't Misbehavin', which is also the title of this production featuring the music, the gaudy glamour and the excitement of a 1930s Harlem night spot. Thomas Wright Waller was born into a sternly religious household in Harlem where his father was a deacon in the Abyssinian Baptist Church. He taught himself to play the organ in that church and by the age of 15 was accompanying silent films on the organ at a local movie theater. His masters at the piano were Harlem's best -- James P. Johnson and Willie "the Lion" Smith. From them he acquired the sturdy musical style called stride piano that became his trademark.

In the early 1920s when jazz emerged from the back rooms of Harlem to become the popular music of the day, "Fats" Waller went downtown to fame and fortune. He wrote some 500 songs and is credited with many other well-known standards which he sold to unscrupulous Tin-Pan-Alleyites when he had overextended his financial resources. He soon became, with Louis Armstrong, one of the first authentic black superstars in the white world. He had his own radio program, recorded extensively for RCA, and made films. He could make up the tunes he would play at a recording session in the taxi on the way to the studio. He had an incredible appetite for life. His bulk—he was a little less than six feet tall and weighed over 300 pounds—was the result of excess: in eating, loving and in drinking. He was also noted for his generosity, his talent, and his humor. He shrugged off fear of the future with his famous motto: "One never knows, do one?" Work never interfered with his partying and his night life. His furious lifestyle led to an early death at age 39 in 1943.

Ain't Misbehavin' offers foot-stomping renditions complete with the jazzman's famous stride bass of Honeysuckle Rose, Mean to Me, The Joint Is Jumpin' and Your Feet's Too Big! Featured are songs made famous by the entertainer as well as those he wrote himself.

About the playwrights

Our presentation is based on an idea developed by Murray Horwitz, an actor and circus clown, and Richard Maltby, Jr., an Ivy League theatrical whiz kid, who put together thirty songs to create a Tony Award-, New York Drama Critics Circle Award- and the Outer Circle award-winning production based on "Fats" Waller's songs. With Maltby as director and Horvitz as associate director, the original shoestring edition of Ain't Misbehavin' went into rehearsal with only the songs and a vague sense of form. They quickly decided on the revue format without any attempt to impersonate Waller. The concept worked and after 30 sold-out showcase performances, the show was whisked into a Broadway theater where it accumulated the awards mentioned above. This is not a nostalgia show, according to Maltby. "This is Waller talking to his audience and giving them a whole philosophy of life: not taking things too seriously, laughing in adversity as well as good times and in effect saying 'Do it! Eat that extra meal, drink that extra bottle, love that extra woman!' He does it with such a sense of humor you can't disagree with him." The original off-Broadway production of Ain't Misbehavin' garnered two Obies, and the original cast recording by RCA won a Grammy for Best Show Album.

ARIC CALHOUN (Andre) lives in Maple Heights where he is shipping and receiving manager for Bearing Distributors, Inc. He is an actor, singer and dancer, appearing at Cassidy Theatre as a cubicle worker in Working and as a black attorney and first officer in Ragtime. He was a state trooper in the video release, Massachusetts State Training, played in Entertainment, a workshop for actors at Karamu House, and was Little Moe in Five Guys Named Moe at the Beck Center for the Arts. He would like to thank God and for everyone who is in his new family from Ain't Misbehavin' with love to Martín and Heidi and all the cast. "Let's break some legs, people!"

CHARLES KORECKI (Sound Design) is co-chairman of Weathervane's sound committee and has provided lighting for The King of the Kosher Grocers, As Bees in Honey Drown, The Wiz, Joseph and last season's splendid production of My Way, a Tribute to Frank Sinatra. A graduate of Albion College, he is the auditorium manager at Cuyahoga Falls High School.

KATRINA STONEMAN (Properties), who comes from Wales in the British Isles, holds a Masters Degree in art. She enjoys Irish step dancing with her daughters and is in charge of the art and theater programs at St. Sebastian's Elementary School where she was instrumental in starting the drama club. Katrina joined the Women's Board when Rachel Harker chaired the Youth Education program. She also worked with Sean McConaha when he was teaching at



Hoban High School. She has three children, 10, 16, and 21, all of whom are involved in theater activities.

KEVIN FORD (Lighting Co-Design) has been a Weathervane volunteer beginning with the All Night Strut. He has had a hand in just about every season since 1996,

building sets, working props, running lights and designing sound for The African Company Presents Richard III. Kevin works at Acro Tool and Die as a CNC mill programmer and attends The University of Akron in his spare time.



There are cats that claim the name "Fats," some pool player from Minnesota, some other that sang about Blueberry Hill, but they all came after the real Fat Man! Upon learning that I would be directing Ain't Misbehavin', I thought of the double-record cast album that sat in my mother's apartment. I think I wore the grooves out of it that summer. I suppose the neighbors were as puzzled as my mother. That was my first introduction to "Fats" Waller. Not only was Thomas "Fats" Waller one of the greatest pianists jazz has ever known, he was also one of its most exuberantly funny entertainers. A man of gargantuan appetites, his overindulgence to food and liquor are legend. Just listen to Ain't Nobody's Business and you get a microcosm of his life. His extraordinarily light and flexible touch belied his ample physical girth. He could swing as hard as any pianist alive or dead, in his classic, James Johnson-derived stride manner, with a powerful left hand delivering the octaves and tenths in a tireless, rapid, seamlessness. His very physiognomy (a thin mustache on a round, amiable face, and black derby hat cocked to one side) became his stage trademark, as much as Fosse's derbies became his style. "Fats" did it first. Audiences looked forward to his winks, to the way he rolled his eyes during performances, to his witty remarks. His recordings still communicate to this day the same force and warm humor. It makes sense that his work would transfer to the Broadway stage in this Tony Award-winning musical-void of falling chandeliers, Disney puppets, and flying helicopters-could still hold and captivate audiences. (It did so for a kid from Spanish Harlem.) The tapestry of "Fats" Waller's music simply brought you to tears in both directions, from the joy of Your Feet's Too Big to the tragic Black and Blue. While every clown longs to play Hamlet as per the cliche -- and Waller did have so-called serious musical pretensions, longing to follow in the footsteps of George Gershwin and compose concert music -- it probably was not in the cards anyway due to the racial barriers of the first half of the 20th century. Besides, given the fact that Waller influenced a long line of pianists of and after his time, including Count Basie (who studied with "Fats"), Teddy Wilson, Art Tatum, Thelonius Monk, George Gershwin, Dave Brubeck and countless others, his impact has been truly profound. Theater is that door to another place, another time. Let this show take you along! Feel free to sing, dance, and swing with the Fatman! One never knows, do one!







Volunteer Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes. create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. *Nobody* can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.





Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and Northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a sold out sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Single-ticket buyers and subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are promising to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). These subscription seats are held until intermission. This, additionally, makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really sold out and annoys ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

Subscribers: Please call the Ticket Office at 836-2626 if you will not make your ticketed performance. Thank you.

Weathervane Traditions

Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.

Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on first Friday performances. We provide light snacks and refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.

For your sweet tooth snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission. Refreshments (other than water) are not permitted in the auditorium.



Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theater (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, The Grapes of Wrath and Little Women will be

featured in the Project STAGE events. Tickets are only \$8.

Adult Classes

Professionally taught Adult Theatre classes include Classical Drama, Improvisation, Scenic Design, Stage Lighting and Directing. These classes help actors expand their performance and public speaking skills. Look for classes in the spring.




