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Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

In 1985, political activist Cleve Jones was among those planning the annual candlelight march to honor the memory of San Francisco Supervisor Harvey Milk and Mayor George Moscone, both assassinated in 1978. While planning the march, Jones learned that more than 1,000 San Franciscans had been lost to AIDS. In their honor, he asked his fellow marchers to write the names of those friends and loved ones on placards and carry them in the march. For the first time, numbers became NAMES.

At the end of the march, Jones and other participants taped the placards to the walls of the San Francisco Federal Building. It was this action, the creation of a wall of names with its resemblance to a patchwork quilt, which gave birth to the idea for The AIDS Memorial Quilt and, eventually, The NAMES Project Foundation.

In June 1987, Jones and a small group of friends and strangers alike formally organized The NAMES Project Foundation. From the start, the public response to The Quilt was immediate. People in each of the U.S. cities most affected by AIDS - New York, L.A. and San Francisco - sent panels to the workshop in memory of their friends and loved ones. Generous donors rapidly filled "wish lists" for sewing machines, office supplies and volunteers.

On June 27, 1987, the fledgling NAMES Project displayed the first 40 panels of The Quilt from the Mayor's balcony at San Franciso City Hall. Each panel measures 3' X 6'. the size of a human grave, and bears the name of an individual lost to AIDS. Four months later in October, the first 1,930 panels were displayed on the National Mall in Washington, D.C. Half a million people visited The Quilt that weekend. That overwhelming response led to a four-month, twenty-city national tour for The Quilt in spring 1988. Local panels were added in each city, tripling The Quilt's size to more than 6,000 panels by the end of the tour.

Today, The AIDS Memorial Quilt is an epic, 54-ton tapestry that includes more than 45,000 panels dedicated to more than 88,000 individuals. It is the premiere symbol of the AIDS pandemic and the largest piece of community art in the world – a living memorial to a generation lost to AIDS. Currently, there are 22 NAMES Project chapters in the United States and more than 40 international affiliates around the world. About the Play & Playwright

Tony Kushner was born in Manhattan on July 16, 1956. His parents, both classical musicians, moved a year later to Lake Charles, Louisiana, and Kushner spent his child-hood there. Growing up as a gay Jew in the deep South, he has later said, made him more conscious of his distinctive identity as he might not have been in heavily Jewish New York City. Kushner returned to the city for college, receiving a degree in medieval literature from Columbia University. After graduating, he taught in Louisiana for three years, then returned to New York for good, studying for an M.F.A. at New York University and writing and producing plays. His early works include an adaptation of Pierre Corneille's *The Illusion* in 1988 and *A Bright Room Called Day* in 1990.

Nothing in Kushner's early career, however, predicted the overnight success he attained when part one of Angels in America, Millennium Approaches, opened in Los Angeles in 1992. Critical reaction to the play was immediately and overwhelmingly positive: the influential New York Times theater critic Frank Rich, for instance, called it "a searching and radical rethinking" of American political drama and "the most extravagant and moving demonstration imaginable" of the artistic response to AIDS. The play's part two, Perestroika, was greeted with similar adulation the following year. Kushner received bushels of awards for Angels in America, not least of which were Tony Awards for Best Play in 1993 and 1994 and 1993's Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Outside liberal literary and theatrical circles, however, the play sometimes sparked controversy. A 1996 production of Angels in Charlotte, North Carolina, for instance, took place only under protection of a court order after local officials threatened to prosecute actors for violating indecent-exposure laws, and productions in other cities were picketed.

It is impossible to appreciate the play without understanding something about the history of the AIDS crisis as well as the broader story of gays and lesbians in America. Although men and women have engaged in homosexual behavior in all times and cultures, it was only in the twentieth century that homosexuality came to be seen as a fundamental orientation rather than a specific act. In the United States, the modern gay rights movement began after World War II. Gay bars and political organizations existed mostly in secret in the 1950s and 1960s, but New York City's Stonewall riot in 1969 helped usher in a period of growing openness among gays and greater public acceptance.

Although gay life flourished in the 1970s, many gays saw the 1980s as a period of retrenchment and tragedy. The first cases of AIDS were diagnosed among gay men in 1981; within ten years more than 100,000 people died of the disease in the United States alone. In the early years of the epidemic, ignorance and fear resulted in widespread discrimination against AIDS patients, and the national media reported the story in a sensationalistic manner, if at all. Gays' anger about the mainstream reaction to AIDS became interlinked with political frustration, as a conservative backlash that began in the late 1970s hindered the cause of gay rights. For many gay activists, Presidents Reagan and Bush symbolized the opposition: both men's administrations were at best uneasy with and often hostile to the gay cause, and Reagan remained silent on the subject of AIDS until 1987. Angels in America opened in Los Angeles in the same week that Bill Clinton, the first presidential candidate to openly reach out to lesbian and gay voters, defeated George Bush; among gays the play inevitably became associated with a sense of euphoria and political optimism.





From 1935 until 1951. Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue. Some recall its cramped quar-

ters but especially the energy and devotion of four ladies. Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it happen. A lobby plaque lists the names of other founders who shared their commitment. The rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.

In 1951, the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and, from 1960 - 1992, Bob Belfance served as director. Along with custodian/ticket office manager, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions. Ticket receipts and donations helped meet expenses and created a modest endowment. A fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263-seat facility which opened in 1970. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has been paid off.

Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery and fly system, a sound-proof production booth and a costume workshop.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production, The Laramie Project, during the 2002-2003 season. Thanks for being a part of our history as we celebrate this 70th season!



In the John L. Dietz Theater

Once Weathervane had a theater to call its very own on Copley Road in the 1950's, the wish/need for another smaller "black box" theater surfaced. This space would provide a venue for meetings, children's activities, play readings, cabaret and small revues, and experimental productions, perhaps by local playwrights. A goal of the Capital Campaign which began in the year 2000 was to add new classrooms for the many children's programs being held by the theater. The Capital Campaign raised \$1,750,000 and provided a two-story addition to the playhouse; new classrooms became reality as well as installation of a fly system over the stage.

One of the classrooms sponsored by Margaret J. Dietz and named in memory of her 12-year-old son, John L. Dietz, became the "black box" theater so long awaited. John was a sixth grader at Akron's Rankin School at the time of his death in 1971 following an auto accident. A darling little boy with a passion, even at that age, for play-acting, he had just finished playing a clown in a youth theater production of Aesop's Falables, a rock musical for kids.



ALAN SCOTT FERRALL (Scenic Designer/Technical Director) began at Weathervane under the tutelage of John R. Thomas. He spent six years at Cuyahoga Falls High School as auditorium manager. During that time, he was awarded a Design Excellence citation from USITT for Carousel, and a place in Who's Who Among America's Teachers. Scott has earned four Chanticleer Awards -- one as stage manager for Fences, the others as lighting co-designer for A Man for All Seasons and lighting designer for The Laramie Project and A Lesson Before Dying. Scott also takes great pleasure in writing the end-of-the-season revue for The Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players who appear at our annual Chanticleer Awards Dinner.

SEAN McCONAHA (Director of Education and Producer of Youth/Family Productions) holds a dual major in Theater Performance and Pre-Law from West Virginia Wesleyan College and an M.A. in Theater from The University of Akron. He is a free-lance actor and director throughout Northeastern Ohio. Sean directed the OCTA award-winning production of Romeo and Juliet as well as Chanticleer winners for Best Production, The King of the Kosher Grocers and A Lesson Before Dying. He lives in Bolivar with wife, Beth, daughters, Leda and Delaney, and one-yearold twins Zoe and Griffin.

KEITH D. CAMPBELL (Supervisor Front-of-House & Patron Services) holds a B.A. in English from The University of Akron, where he served as editor of The Buchtelite and sang with the Akron Symphony Chorus. During the summers of 1995 and 1996, he interned in the box office at Porthouse Theatre Company. Keith has done post-baccalaureate studies in Arts Administration at The University of Akron. This is his ninth season at WCP.

JOHN COTTER (Business and Public Relations Assistant) has the duties that come with helping Jan and Keith in the Marketing and Box Office areas. He also

serves on Weathervane's Production Board as Co-Chair of Auditions. John is a retiree of 36 years with Ohio Edison and has been a long-time volunteer of the Playhouse having served on the Production Board as its President and Co-Chair of Properties. He has also worked backstage for many productions and has won Chanticleers for Properties Design for four productions. He is, however, most proud of his three grandchildren, Dana, Nicholas and Kristin.

KATHRYN A. KOHL (Assistant Technical Director) holds a degree in Elementary Education from BGSU and a Master of Business Management degree from Aurora College in Aurora, IL. Kathy also serves as Resident Master Carpenter and Master Painter for the Theatre Department at Firestone High School. Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theater (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, The Grapes of Wrath and Little Women will be featured in the Project STAGE events. Tickets are only \$8.
