Special Collections, the Library's division responsible for maintaining local history materials, is planning a permanent collection of area music from Summit County-based musicians, professional or amateur, past and present.



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From the Barn to the Valley



From 1935 until 1951, Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue. Some recall its cramped quar-

ters but especially the energy and devotion of four ladies, Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it happen. A lobby plaque lists the names of other founders who shared their commitment. The rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.

In 1951, the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and, from 1960 - 1992, Bob Belfance served as director. Along with custodian/ticket office manag-

er, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions. Ticket receipts and donations helped meet expenses and created a modest endowment. A fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263-seat facility which opened in 1970. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has been paid off.

Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added class-rooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery and fly system, a sound-proof production booth and a costume workshop.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production, *The Laramie Project*, during the 2002-2003 season. Thanks for being a part of our history as we celebrate this 70th season!

In a 25+ year theatre career, she began as a stage manager then moved into producing, fundraising and public relations in the early 1980s. She's had the pleasure of working with a wide range of artists from Baryshnikov to John Ritter, Ed Asner to Chita Rivera, in theaters such as San Diego's Opera and Old Globe, Sacramento Theater Company, LA Classical Ballet, Great Lakes (when it was Shakespeare) and Brooklyn Academy of Music. She serves as the Artistic Director of the Ravenna Community Choir and Director of St. Paul Lutheran Church Choir also in Ravenna. Jan was honored with the 2003 Trustees Award. She recently shared in the joy of the birth of her first grandchild.

ALAN SCOTT FERRALL (Scenic Designer/Technical Director) began at Weathervane under the tutelage of John R. Thomas. He spent six years at Cuyahoga Falls High School as auditorium manager. During that time, he was awarded a Design Excellence citation from USITT for

He is a free-lance actor and director throughout Northeastern Ohio. Sean directed the OCTA award-winning production of Romeo and Juliet as well as Chanticleer winners for Best Production, The King of the Kosher Grocers and A Lesson Before Dying. He lives in Bolivar with wife, Beth, daughters, Leda and Delaney, and one-year-old twins Zoe and Griffin.

KEITH D. CAMPBELL (Supervisor Front-of-House & Patron Services) holds a B.A. in English from The University of Akron, where he served as editor of *The Buchtelite* and sang with the Akron Symphony Chorus. During the summers of 1995 and 1996, he interned in the box office at Porthouse Theatre Company. Keith has done post-baccalaureate studies in Arts Administration at The University of Akron. This is his ninth season at WCP.

JOHN COTTER (Business and Public Relations Assistant) has the duties that come with helping Jan and Keith in the Marketing and Box Office areas. He also



serves on Weathervane's Production Board as Co-Chair of Auditions. About the Play & Playuright

Two generations collide in a time-shifting account that reveals a devastating secret from the past in *Three Days of Rain*. The setting is a downtown loft in 1995 where Walker, a world-weary man bedeviled by a past he can't accept, and his married sister, Nan, and their best friend, Pip, a soap opera actor, meet for the reading of Nan's and Walker's father's will. All three are the progeny of two famous architects who, early in their careers, designed a glass house in the Hamptons that created their legacy. Nan and Pip have built successful lives for themselves. Walker's life is a mess, in part, because he loathed his father and wasn't fond of his mother. He has also found a diary of his father's stuffed in a mattress in the loft where they are meeting. The first entry: "April 3-5—three days of rain," infuriates him by its lack of detail. In the first act, the children put together a story about their parents based on memories, solving to their satisfaction the questions about their parents' marriage and their father's greatest building.

In the second act, the time is 1960, the loft is the same, and the characters we meey are the parents themselves. Walker's suppositions about the parents turn out to be wrong and those three days of rain become extremely significant—changing everything as the secrets gradually unfold. The **New York Times** declared *Three Days of Rain* "an elegant puzzle."

Three Days of Rain was produced by Manhattan Theatre Club (Lynne Meadow, Artistic Director; Barry Grove, Executive Director) in New York City in November 1997. The play was directed by Evan Yionoulis, with set design by Chris Barreca, costume design by Candace Cain, lighting design by Donald Holder, sound design by Red Ramona, original music by Mike Yionoulis, special effects by Gregory Meeh, and production stage management by Roy Harris. The cast was as follows: Walker/Ned: John Slattery; Nan/Lina: Patricia Clarkson; Pip/Theo: Bradley Whitford.

About the Playwright

Richard Greenberg grew up on Long Island, graduated from Princeton University and was accepted in 1982 in the playwriting program at the Yale School of Drama. His first two plays, The Bloodletters and Life Under Water, had professional New York productions before he graduated from Yale in 1985. He received the Oppenheimer Award for best new playwright for The Bloodletters. In January 1989, following graduation from Yale, his comedy Eastern Standard opened at the Golden Theatre to rave reviews. He saw several more plays produced and began to write for film and television which he enjoys "because they pay me money." In 1993 his Jenny Keeps Talking was produced at the Manhattan Theatre Club. This was followed in 1994 by Night and Her Stars which premiered at the South Coast Repertory Theatre with a production by the Manhattan Theatre Club in 1995. Three Days of Rain was produced by the Manhattan Theatre Club in 1997. In 2001 Greenberg brought out his version of Dance of Death by August Strindberg on Broadway with Ian McKellen, Helen Mirren and David Strathairn. Take Me Out, about baseball, opened in 2002 at the Donmar Warehouse in London, moved to the Joseph Papp Public Theatre, and transferred to Broadway where it closed in 2004. In spite of Greenberg's success, he seems unimpressed and a little bemused by it all and has kept his priorities and his ideals intact. He's grateful that people like his plays and he just wants to keep writing more of them.

Character Descriptions

Walker Janeway —thirties. Febrile, sweet, compulsively verbal, angry, a self-described "impossible person."

Ned Janeway—his father at the same age. Watchful, self-doubting. Smart, tentative, surprising.

Nan Janeway—a year or so older than Walker. Committedly normal. Someone who has coped forever and is determined to keep doing so under very trying circumstances.

Lina—her mother at the same age. The antithesis of Nan. Mordant, southern, labile. Delightful but at a cost. (The "i" in Lina is long, as in Carolina.)

Pip Wexler—thirties. Sunny, good looking, almost helplessly happy. Embroiled in the complexities of his friends, but not wrecked by them.

Theo Wexler—his father at the same age. Golden boy-arriviste. Insecure about his "genius," struggling to maintain ease. Genuinely charming, but a degree of violence added to the mix.

Setting

Act One: An unoccupied loft space in downtown Manhattan, 1995 Act Two: The same space, only tenanted and happier, 1960

There will be one fifteen-minute intermission.

Sean McConaha is Weathervane's Director of Education and Producer of Youth/Family Productions. He has a dual Bachelor's degree in Theater Performance and Pre-Law from West Virginia Wesleyan College and a Master of Arts degree in Acting and Directing from The University of Akron. He is co-founder of the Prodigal Theater Company, a floating company of graduate school friends which surfaces whenever there is extra time to "put on a play." Their most successful production was David Ives' All in the Timing at Cleveland's Cabaret Dada. Sean was seen on the Weathervane stage in The Chosen and The Laramie Project.

For Weathervane he directed *The Glass Menagerie* and the Ohio Community Theater Association award-winning production of Romeo and Juliet. He received an Excellence in Directing Award for last season's A Lesson Before Dying from OCTA. The play also received an Outstanding Award for ensemble presentation, Weathervane acknowledged the play as its best production of the 2003-2004 season. He was also director for the best production of the 1999-2000 season's The King of the Kosher Grocers. He directed The Chosen, Hamlet and Our Town for the playhouse.

Sean will also direct Weathervane's special production of Angels in America, which will be seen in the Dietz Theatre from January 16 - February 2, 2005. He and his wife Beth, daughters Leda and Delaney and twins Griffin and Zoe, live in Bolivar.


Director's Note

In Paul Thomas Anderson's Magnolia, the character of Quiz Kid Donnie Smith says, "We may be through with the past, but the past is not through with us."

In my years of avid movie watching, those words have stuck with me. One of the main threads of my artistic life has been examining all the wrong turns I've taken on my life's journey: the friends I've lost, the enemies I've made, the quarrels I've had, the artistic mistakes I've made and the family and loved ones I have often wounded while dealing with my own personal demons. I try to reconcile these issues in my work through the plays that I choose to direct or act in.

It seems only natural to me that Three Days of Rain would eventually cross my path. I had discovered the script in our play reading committee process and realized that Richard Greenberg had written some of the most beautifully wounded creatures I had ever encountered.

Rain is a complex tangle of old traditions versus new ideologies fighting at the boundary of a new generation. We see destruction and ruined dreams as the result of people staying in bad relationships. The results of this tragic mistake are lies, wasted talent, depression, unrequited love, stifled passion, unhappiness and the distance built between parents and children in an attempt to swallow a scandalous truth. We watch as regret prowls in the shadows, the past lives again and only the truth can set things free but not necessarily right. Greenberg never promises us happy endings, but he does give us all a little lamp in the darkness to examine the grimy corners of our souls where we may not know what lies for us in wait.

Dramaturgical Notes

Frozen music: The idea of architecture as frozen music came from German writers—Goethe and Schelling because it was in Germany that architects strove to create monuments of stillness.

Pericles, Prince of Tyre: statesman and leader of Greek assembly during the Golden Age and great patron of the arts; responsible for building the Parthenon.

Hegel: system of logic based on a process of change and progress (Hegelian dialectic). Basically, one concept (thesis) inevitably generates its opposite (antithesis); their interaction leads to a new concept (synthesis), which becomes the thesis of a new triad.

Boolean algebra: abstract mathematical system; permits algebraic manipulation of logical statements. Can demonstrate the relationship between groups, indicating what is in each set alone, what is jointly contained in both, and what is contained in neither. **Umberto Eco:** novelist and more importantly a professor of Semiotics, a philosophical theory, which now means a study of any cultural product (text) as a formal system of linguistic signs.

Palimpsest: old writing material (parchment or tablets) that, after scraping or erasure, has been used again.

Pentimento: presence or emergence of earlier painting, images, strokes, or forms that have been painted over (repent or regret).

Hedda Gabler: Ibsen heroine who is selfish and willful, whose unbridled desire to dominate and destroy others brings death to herself. Lovborg writes a manuscript with another woman's help, which Hedda ultimately burns. "I am burning your child."

Joycean riff: James Joyce was famous for his mastery of language and moments of spiritual insight (epiphanies).

Martin Heidigger: Twentieth century German philosopher. Major work: Being and Time (1927) about concepts of care, mood and the individual's relationship to death. Considered a founder of existentialism.

Rochefoucauld: *Les Maximes* were first published in 1664 and represented an embittered pessimistic interpretation of human nature. Rochefoucauld considered love of self (egoism) the basis of men's actions.

Nietzsche: Nineteenth-century German philosopher, who had contempt for Christianity, morality, conscience, and altruism.

Emerson on the IRT: Transcendentalism, a belief in God's immanence in man and nature, and in individual intuition as the highest source of knowledge.

Sir Joshua Reynolds: Considered the most important English painter, he raised the artist to a position of respect in England. His annual discourses were a significant exposition of academic style, propounding eclectic generalization over direct observation and allusion to the classical past over the present.

Reinhold Niebuhr: Twentieth-century American religious and social thinker who became a socialist in 1930s. He was an advocate of the church's moral rule of society.

Trimalchian: The word is Trimalcionico, it comes from Trimalcione, the character in *Satyricon* by Petronio. Trimalcione gives a huge banquet: grandiose, sumptuous, spectacular. The word is associated with banquets.

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



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Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes. create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

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
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
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Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and Northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a sold out sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Single-ticket buyers and subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are promising to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). These subscription seats are held until intermission. This, additionally, makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really sold out and annoys ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot. Weathervane Traditions

Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.

Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on first Friday performances. We provide light snacks and refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.

For your sweet tooth snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission. Refreshments (other than water) are not permitted in the auditorium.



Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theater (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, The Grapes of Wrath and Little Women will be featured in the Project STAGE events. Tickets are only \$8.

Adult Classes

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

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
