


A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works - even opera - with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Munel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hited its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.





Jill Sutton Filo received her BFA in Art Education from Kent State University. From the 1970's through the early 1980's she was a batik textile artist featured in art shows, galleries and museums. In 1995, she discovered quilt history and wrote a research paper that was published by the American Quilt Study Group in 1996. That was a springboard for further adventures including a series of magazine articles in Better Homes & Gardens' American Patchwork and Quilting, self-published books and numerous quilt patterns. Following her appearance on HGTV's Simply Quilts, she lectured, conducted workshops, and displayed her quilts at national and international events. Jill says, "Quilts and sewing are my heritage. Both my grandmothers created many hand- and machine-sewn quilts that were loved and used. Many of my quilts were inspired by Ruby McKim, a prolific artist and author who syndicated quilt patterns from 1916 through the 1930's. I wanted to blend those vintage designs with contemporary fabrics and techniques and share these interpretations of Ruby McKim's work to inspire future generations." In 2009-2010, Jill was asked to be the guest costume designer for Weathervane's productions of The Goat or, Who is Sylvia and Italian American Reconciliation.

In previous lives, Carole Pollard earned a Sports Car Club of America competition driver's license and a Ph.D. in American Literature. In 1995, approaching retirement from a teaching career, she discovered curved two-patch piecing as a quilting technique. In 2000, Carole began to study quilt design in earnest and began entering judged and juried shows in all media. Two of her pieces were among the 80 selected from 700 entries for the 69th Annual Area Artists show at the Butler Institute of American Art in Youngstown, OH. "We each have a certain amount of time here, and we call it our life. What we do with that time - with that life - matters." The quilts here at Weathervane span the 15 years of my aspiring to be an artist and my groping towards what matters. Literature is sometimes the inspiration for some of my quilts. In *BloomTime* there are two lines from Shakespeare's Sonnet CXIII stitched into the left and top left borders. *Things Fall Apart* is a response to the first few lines of W.B. Yeats' *The Second Coming*. Many of my pieces incorporate my love of art and literature."





About the Play and Playwright



Notes Toward an Adaptation of Sherlock Holmes for the Stage

I remember when Melanie Pepe, Producer of the Young Actor Series at Weathervane, and I first talked about adapting some of Arthur Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes mysteries for the stage. Melanie is great: no-nonsense, really wicked-smart, and extraordinarily knowledgeable regarding what audiences like.

The conversation went something like this:

Melanie: "Sooo...I've contacted you because we need to write a play for lots of young people."

Me: Okay, usually, uh, Sherlock Holmes' stories have very few people in them."

Melanie: "And we need parts for young women."

Me: "Yeah, about that. See, Sherlock Holmes' stories feature almost all men."

Melanie: "And we need... lots of action."

Me: "Right, because. So like the stories are pretty talky..."

Melanie: "And you should, maybe, combine two or three stories so we can have more characters."

Me: "..."

So I began to read the stories – 60 or so – to find a handful of tight little mysteries with lots of people and parts for young women and some exciting action. Melanie and I talked; she told me animatedly about the director they had been lucky enough to find – John Davis, a fight choreographer – and how she hoped I had some really great fight scenes, too.

I kept reading. And thinking about fights and parts for women and lots of action.

And writing some things and discarding them and writing some more things and getting a snack. And that's sorta how it goes.

Then: Presto!

The Art of Deduction, an adaptation by me. I decided to adapt, as it happens, two of the more famous short stories, A Scandal in Bohemia and The Red-Headed League. I threw in a few of my favorite passages from other stories, too, for instance, from The Adventure of the Naval Treaty; and added some choice tidbits such as the fact that Holmes and Watson were young and cool, that Watson was actually the ladies' man of the duo, and that Holmes never in the stories actually smoked a calabash pipe.

But as we all know, the true magic is with the character himself. Sherlock Holmes remains the most reproduced fictional character in our culture: TV series, dozens of films, plays. As a matter of fact, it is through the theatre (notably the dramatizations of William Gillette – yes, of the razorblade family – who also popularized the calabash pipe) that Holmes achieved the popularity he enjoys today.

Sherlock Holmes, a more fascinating, brilliant, charismatic, theatrical personality – literature, stage and film have not seen. It was my great honor (and good fun) to continue the tradition of adapting him once more for the stage.

Derek Davidson directed Weathervane's 2009 production of *The Goat or, Who is Sylvia?* He is a playwright, director and filmmaker who has taught at Marietta College, Carnegie Mellon University, Appalachian State University (in Boone, North Carolina), and was an Associate Artistic Director at the Barter Theatre in Abingdon, Virginia, where he also coordinated the Appalachian Festival of Plays and Playwrights. He has directed his own adaptations of *Mother Courage and Her Children* and *As You Like It.* He wrote the award-winning play *The Road Where It Curves Away*. His film, *This is Not the South*, has played at numerous festivals and won Best Feature at the SkyFest in Asheville, North Carolina.
