



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
A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works—even opera — with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carrival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane, Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.



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
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


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In the Harris Family Gallery

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

From Our Executive Director

The Messiah is One of Us

This seems like an appropriate time of year to tell this story. With a nod to Benjamin Zander from his book, *The Art of Possibility* (and with special thanks to Doug Kohl for introducing me to the author) I give you "The Monks' Story":

A monastery has fallen on hard times. It was once part of a great order, but due to religious persecution in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, had lost all its branches. In fact, there were only the Abbot and four other monks left in the mother house, all of whom were over seventy. Clearly it was a dying order.

One day, the Abbot visited a nearby Rabbi to see if he could offer any advice that might save the monastery. The Rabbi commiscrated saying 'I know how it is, the spirit has gone out of people." "Have you any advice that might save the monastery?" the Abbot asked. "No, I am sorry," the Rabbi replied. I have no advice to give. The only thing I can tell you is that the Messiah is one of you."

The Abbot returned to the monastery downhearted and bewildered. The monks wondered to themselves what possible significance the Rabbi's words might have Did he mean the Messiah is the Abbot who's been our leader for so long? Or did he mean Brother Thomas who is a very holy man? Surely, he couldn't have meant Brother Phillip – he's too passive. But then he's always there when you need him. Or Brother Elrod – he's so crotchety. But then Elrod is very wise. Of course he didn't mean me – yet supposing he did?"

As they contemplated in this manner, the old monks began to treat each other with extraordinary respect, on the off chance that one of them might be the Messiah. And on the off chance that each monk himself might be the Messiah, they began to treat themselves with extraordinary respect.

Because the monastery was situated in a beautiful forest, people often came to visit. When they did, they began to sense this aura of extraordinary respect that permeated the atmosphere. As a result, their visits became more and more frequent, eventually bringing friends, and their friends brought their friends. After a while, some of the younger men, drawn to this enormously positive energy, asked if they might join. Miraculously, within a few years, the monastery became a thriving order once again, and a thanks to the Rabbi's gift – a vibrant community of light and love.

Respect is a core value at Weathervane Playhouse and I believe our renewed commitment to it is one of the main reasons why we find ourselves experiencing a real organizational renaissance. So, at this time of year (and all year long), let's never forget – the Messiah may be one of us!

About the Musical and its Composers

About the Musical - the Story

The plot of *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat* comes from the Old Testament of the Bible in Genesis, Chapter 37. "Now Jacob loved Joseph more than all his children because he was the son of his old age; and he made him a coat of many colors. And when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all of them, they hated him and could not speak peaceably unto him." On a trip to Dotham, the brothers met a company of Ishmaelites on their way to Egypt. The jealous brothers saw an opportunity not to be missed: they stripped Joseph of his many-colored coat and sold him into slavery to the Ishmaelites. It may have been a case of good riddance for the brothers, but life is never what it seems (even in Biblical times!). Joseph, with his prophetic dreams, became a favorite of the Pharaoh and thus rose to political power. When famine struck, his brothers had to plead with Joseph for food, not recognizing him as their own brother.

About the Composers

Composer Andrew Lloyd Webber was born on March 22, 1948, and grew up in South Kensington, England. His childhood was spent in a home filled with music and he demonstrated, from an early age, an extraordinary talent for it. He is the composer of many musicals, including Jesus Christ Superstar, Evita, Cats, Starlight Express, The Phantom of the Opera and Sunset Boulevard. Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom knighted him in 1992 as Sir Andrew Lloyd Webber, He is the recipient of seven Tony Awards, three Grammys, one Oscar, an International Emmy and a Golden Globe. In 2006, he was named one of five of that year's Kennedy Center Honors recipients. Love Never Dies, a sequel to his Phantom of the Opera, opened in London earlier this year. He is also working on a new stage version of The Wizard of Oz to star Michael Crawford, the original star of Broadway's Phantom of the Opera. The show begins previews in London in February 2011.

Lyricist Tim Rice was born in Buckinghamshire, England, on November 10, 1944. He entered the world of popular music as the lead singer of the pop-rock group the Aardvarks and went on to sing occasionally with other popular rock groups of the 1960s. He published his first song, That's My Story, in 1965 – the same year he met his eventual musical partner, Andrew Lloyd Webber. In addition to Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, the two Englishmen collaborated on the blockbuster musicals Jesus Christ Superstar and Evita. Rice has worked with other notable composers, including Marvin Hamlisch and Paul McCartney, and received three Grammys for his work on Walt Disney's Aladdin. With Elton John, he wrote the lyrics for Disney's The Lion King. At present, he is working with his Joseph collaborator Andrew Lloyd Webber on new songs for a forthcoming stage version of The Wizard of Oz, in which Michael Crawford (the original star of Broadway's Phantom of the Opera) is to play the title role. The show begins previews in London in February 2011.

About the Musical's Performance History

Webber and Rice wrote *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat* as an end-of-term concert at a small preparatory school in West London. The first version of the show had a running time of only 15 minutes. Eventually, over a period of several years in the late 1960s and early 1970s, composer Webber and lyricist Rice expanded their show from a simple "pop oratorio" to a full-length musical-theater favorite. Since 1972, the show has had three major productions in London's West End theater district and two on Broadway in New York City – in addition to numerous national touring productions in the United Kingdom, the United States and in international locales. In 2007, the show became the focus of a BBC-TV reality show, *Any Dream Will Do*, in which a dozen young men competed (in the style of *American Idol*) to play the title of Joseph in a new West End production (which opened in July of that year). The show's licensing agent, the Rodgers & Hammerstein Organization, estimates that more than 20,000 productions have been staged over the years by schools and amateur-theater groups. Since 2000, Weathervane Playhouse audiences in Akron have come to embrace this production as an annual holiday tradition perfect for children, their families and the young at heart.

SARAH ELAINE BAILEY (Director and Choreographer) with this production marks her eighth consecutive year as the director of Weathervane's annual Young Actors Series production of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat. This past summer, she also directed Weathervane's Young Actors Series production of Seussical. Her other Weathervane directorial credits include 2009's Madeline and the Cypsies, 2008's Go, Dog. Go! and 2006's Madeline's Rescue. As a performer on the Weathervane stage, she played Sister Margaretta in The Sound of Music in 2006 and, in 2004, she played Sister Amnesia in Nunsense (for which she won a Chanticleer Award, the

Playhouse's version of the Tony Award!). She has taught Weathervane youth-theater classes for almost nine years and she is a frequent performer with the Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players at the Playhouse's annual Chanticleer Awards ceremony. Since September, she has also assisted Weathervane's education department in coordinating the hiring and training of the many teachers who staff the Playhouse's participation in Akron After School, onsite theater-education classes at dozens of Akron Public Schools facilities. She received her bachelor's degree in music from Ohio Northern University and her master's degree in music and pedagogy from Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. She has sung at Carnegie Hall with the New York Philharmonic and was a grand finalist in Guangdong, China, International Vocal Competition and has also performed at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe in Scotland. Her favorite roles include Adele in *Die Fledermaus*, Juliette in *Romeo and Juliette* and a Cherubino in *Le Nozze de Figaro*. Her grandest roles, however, are as mother to three daughters – Isabelle, Sophia and Cecilia – and as wife to her husband, Kyle Bailey, with whom she makes her home in Cuyahoga Falls.



J. T. BUCK (Musical Director) last served Weathervane in the capacity of stage manager for last year's production of *The Goat or, Who is Sylvia?* Outside Weathervane, he is Arts Director for First Grace United Church of Christ in Akron. He holds a bachelor's degree in theatre from The University of Akron and is completing an M.F.A. degree in directing from the University of Houston. He produced the 2005 Albee New Plays Festival under Pulitzer Prize-winner Lanford Wilson, interned on both the 2005 Tony Awards and the 2005 Broadway revival of *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* under producer Elizabeth McCann. He was a student of Tony Award-winning Broadway

producer Stuart Ostrow and has directed productions of *Corpus Christi, The Laramie Project, Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol, Book of Days* and *Godspell,* among others. His original musical, *The Gospel According to Tammy Faye,* has received a reading in New York City starring Tony Award-nominee Sally Mayes and veteran Broadway actor William Youmans (the original Dr. Dillamond in *Wicked*) and is currently prepping for future productions.

KURT FITZGERALD (Jacob and Ishmaelite) shares the stage in this production with his son, Karson (a member of the ensemble). "Being able to do this show with a family member is the icing on the

cake," he says. After playing Jacob in Weathervane's 2005 and 2006 productions of Joseph, he appeared in The Wizard of Oz, Rumplestiliskin, The Music Man and A Christmas Carol at Dynamics Community Theater in Tallmadge as well as in The Fantasticks at Stow Players. By day, Kurt works for Metro Parks, Serving Summit County and also volunteers at the Akron Civic Theatre.



MICHAEL GAFFNEY (Pharaoh and Ishmaelite) previously appeared on our stage last season in *The Great White Hope* and in the 1998 production of the musical

Working. Off the stage, Michael serves as vice president of marketing for United Way of Summit County. He sends his thanks to his wife, Corina, and daughters, Elise and Tessa.



JONATHAN MERECHANT (Potiphar and Reuben) is a senior at Akron's Firestone High School, where he has sung with the men's chorus and symphonic choir and has enjoyed appearing with the

choirs in Ohio Music Education Associationsponsored competitions (in which he has received superior ratings in solo and ensemble work). Jonathan's most recent appearances on our stage were in *Seussical* and *The Great White Hope*. He is also no stranger to *Joseph* at Weathervane: He played Reuben in the 2009 production and the title role in the 2008 production of this musical. He says he hopes to attend Savannah College of Art and Design next year.



ISABELLE POST (Mrs. Potiphar and Dan's Wife) is an eighth grader at Copley-Fairlawn Middle School who was a Bird Girl this past summer in Weathervane's Seussical and played

Benjamin's Wife in last year's production of this musical. This past May, she performed at Severance Hall in Cleveland with Jon Anderson (the lead singer of the rock group Yes) and the Contemporary Youth Orchestra and Chorus in a performance recorded for broadcast on cable TV network VH1 and preserved on a CD. In 2008, she played Doris in The Best Christmas Pageant Ever at Magical Theatre Company in Barberton.



HALLEY HOPSON (Baker and Gad's Wife) is a senior at Barberton High School, where she is a member of the Magic Singers and has appeared in Beauty and the Beast, Thoroughly Modern Millie
