


A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works - even opera - with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane, Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.

From Our Executive Director

Connections Along the Way

As I have the privilege of producing *Pippin* for the first time, I am struck by the connections that have occurred in my life from the first time I saw the show 37 years ago to now.

I first sat in the audience for a performance of *Pippin* in 1974 when I was a 17-year-old high school student Playing the title role at that time was an actor by the name of Michael Rupert. I was captivated by the production and it inspired me to plunge headlong into a life in the theater

After college, much to my good fortune. I had the opportunity to perform alongside Michael in the musical *Working* at the American Stage Festival in New Hampshire in 1980. I was an intern at the time and he was an accomplished professional actor from New York. I was thrilled. He was very supportive of me and we've been friends and have stayed in touch ever since.

I followed his successful career, from composing a dynamic new Off-Broadway musical with an edgy title in 1985 (more on that later), to winning a Tony Award in 1986 for his performance as Oscar in the revival of *Sweet Charity*, to his stunning performance as Marvin in *Falsettos* in 1992 (a role I would later have the privilege of performing myself at the Barter Theatre in Virginia in 2000).

The theater is a very small business. Earlier this season, Michael was gracious enough, upon my request, to come to Weathervane Playhouse to direct *Breaking the Code*. He had just completed the national tour of his latest Broadway show, *Legally Blonde*, and had some time off. While he was here he agreed to teach master classes and even perform at our Gala. In one interesting turn of events, a lovely couple who had seen Michael on Broadway in *The Happy Time* with Robert Goulet in 1968 (when Michael was 16) came to Weathervane to have him finally autograph their playbills — some 42 years later!

Now here we are producing *Pippin*, a show Michael had such a long association with on Broadway and around the country, and then this coming fall we are producing that "Off-Broadway musical with the edgy title" I mentioned before — *Three Guys Naked from the Waist Down*. Hopefully, Michael will have a chance to return to Weathervane to see our production and the many new friends he has made here. We hope you'll return too.

The connections continue . . .

About the Play and Playwright

Pippin originated at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, where composer and lyricist Stephen Schwartz fashioned an original show called *Pippin*, *Pippin* as a vehicle for his fellow student members of Scotch'n'Soda, one of the oldest student theatre organizations in America. By the time the show opened on Broadway, Schwartz had settled on the title, *Pippin*, and cut all of the songs he had written for his college version.

Pippin opened in New York City at the Imperial Theatre on Oct. 23, 1972, and ran for a total of 1,944 performances before closing on June 12, 1977. The show was directed and choreographed by Bob Fosse, who is also credited with co-writing the show's book with Roger O. Hirson. The original Broadway cast featured Ben Vereen as The Leading Player, John Rubinstein as Pippin, Jill Clayburgh as Catherine, Leland Palmer as Fastrada and Irene Ryan as Berthe. Pippin was nominated for 11 Tony Awards and won five (Ben Vereen as Best Actor in a Musical, Tony Walton for Best Scenic Design, Jules Fisher for Best Lighting Design, Bob Fosse for Best Choreography, and Bob Fosse for Best Direction of a Musical).

By the time the show closed in 1977, *Pippin* ranked as the 10th longest-running show on Broadway. The original production of *Pippin* was also notable because it was the first Broadway show to film a TV commercial with actual scenes from the show.

STEPHEN SCHWARTZ (Composer and Lyricist) was born in 1948 in New York City, where he studied piano and composition at the Juilliard School of Music (while still in high school). Upon graduating with a drama degree from Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh in 1968, he returned to New York and worked as a producer for RCA Records. Soon, however, he began to focus his work toward Broadway. One of his first theatrical credits was the title song he composed for the 1969 comedy Butterflies Are Free. At one point in the 1970s, his musicals Godspell, Pippin and The Magic Show were all running on Broadway simultaneously. For Godspell, Schwartz won two Grammys and two Drama Desk Awards. With Alan Menken, he collaborated on the scores for the Disney animated films Pocahontas and The Hunchback of Notre Dame and the DreamWorks animated feature The Prince of Egypt. His most recent musical, Wicked, has been playing on Broadway and on tour since the fall of 2003.

BOB FOSSE (Book Co-Writer) was born in Chicago, Illinois, in 1927. Recognizing his apparently natural talent for dancing, Fosse's parents sent him to formal lessons. By the time he reached high school, Fosse was a frequent performer in Chicago-area nightclubs and burlesque houses. After high school, Fosse enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1945 and served a twoyear tour of duty. Following his military service, Fosse moved to New York City and carved out a career as a performer in variety shows on stage and television. His big break came when he made a brief appearance in the 1953 film adaptation of the Cole Porter musical, Kiss Me, Kate. Broadway showman George Abbott was highly impressed by Fosse's dance moves in the film and invited him to choreograph the next show he was directing, The Pajama Game, which opened on Broadway in 1954, and also his next one, Damn Yankees, which opened in New York in 1955. With Damn Yankees, he worked closely with star Gwen Verdon, with whom Fosse established a lifelong creative and romantic collaboration (the two were married from 1960) until his death in 1987). Sweet Charity, which opened on Broadway in 1966, marked one of his first hits as a combined director/choreographer. Among his other notable stage credits are How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying (1961), Little Me (1962) and Chicago (1975). Among his motion-picture credits, he directed and choreographed Cabaret (1972), Lenny (1974) and wrote, directed and choreographed the loosely autobiographical All That Jazz (1979). Hé is a nine-time winner of the Tony Award, and was nominated for four Academy Awards (winning one for his direction of Cabaret). Fosse staged and choreographed a variety show special for NBC-TV starring Liza Minnelli called Liza with a Z, which won Fosse an Émmy Award and made him the first person to ever win top honors in three entertainment mediums -- stage, film and television -- all in the same year (1973). On September 23, 1987, Fosse died from a heart attack at the age of 60.

ROGER O. HIRSON (Book Writer) was born in 1926 and got his start as a dramatist during television's "golden age" of the 1950s, during which he wrote many teleplays for such landmark drama-anthology programs as The Alcoa Hour, Goodyear Television Playhouse, Playhouse 90, Studio One, The Armstrong Circle Theatre, The DuPont Show of the Week and The Philco Television Playhouse. For the theater, he wrote the books for the musicals Walking Happy (which played on Broadway for 161 performances between 1966 and 1967) and Pippin. His additional television writing credits include A Woman Named Jackie (1991), The Old Man and the Sea (1990), The Ted Kennedy, Jr. Story (1986) and A Christmas Carol (1984).

Director's Notes

The Players Are Coming!

Pippin — Stephen Schwartz's 1972 follow up to his first hit, *Godspell*, is conceptual in that the entire musical takes place in real time on a stage. A theatrical troupe rolls into town and nightly reenacts the tale of a young man's search for fulfillment. Encouraged by the Leading Player, Pippin tries his hand at many pursuits and is constantly tempted to perform the ultimate trick for fame and glory. Tonight, you are their captive audience. Tonight, one of you has been selected to play the title role.

Originally a sweet coming-of-age story about a 9th century Franken prince, *Pippin* in the hands of Bob Fosse became a seductive look at the quest for happiness and fame. The show deals with disillusionment, generation gaps, dysfunctional families, and the malaise of narcissism. Pippin, fresh home from college, does not know what to do. He doesn't have a job and lives at home. Sound familiar?

Pippin was originally conceived when the quest for self enlightenment was on everyone's agenda and *I'm OK*, *You're OK* was a best seller. It was presented at a time when many young Americans were dropping out and dying due to recreational drug overdose. *Pippin* reflects the quest for happiness and the disillusionment that was prevalent among younger Americans during the mid-1970s. Back then our country was dealing with rising unemployment and inflation, gas shortages and an unpopular war. Sound familiar?

While working on the play with this wonderful cast and artistic team, I was struck by the many parallels between *Pippin* and the young people of today. *Pippin* is just as entertaining and resonant in 2011 as it was in 1972. It's funny how everything old is new again.

One of my earliest Broadway experiences was a ticket to *Pippin* in 1977. There, in the cavernous Imperial Theatre, I sat in a box loge, far, far downstage. The seat was sold as partial view, and I saw more backstage than onstage. I spied on the players in the wings, as they prepared for their entrances. I watched the stage hands moving scenery. It was magical. This was a pivotal moment in my education, as I was made aware of the mechanics of stagecraft on a grand scale. *Pippin* is a show about the powers of illusion and magic and the seduction of smoke and mirrors. Sitting in that box, I could see the man behind the curtain. I was spellbound and knew in that moment I had to be in the theatre for the rest of my life.

Let the Magic begin.
