Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan, They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good


Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951 when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years, directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer sup-

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of Dark of the Moon. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a soundproof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the awardwinning The Laramie Project in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with Angels in America: Millennium Approaches in January 2005.



- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

About the Play & Playwright

Tony Kushner was born in Manhattan on July 16, 1956. His parents, both classical musicians, moved a year later to Lake Charles, Louisiana, and Kushner spent his childhood there. Growing up as a gay Jew in the deep South, he has later said, made him more conscious of his distinctive identity than he might have been in heavily Jewish New York City. Kushner returned to the city for college, receiving a degree in medieval literature from Columbia University. After graduating, he taught in Louisiana for three years, then returned to New York for good, studying for an M.F.A. at New York University and writing and producing plays. His early works include an adaptation of Pierre Corneille's *The Illusion* in 1988 and *A Bright Room Called Day* in 1990. Kushner was recently nominated for an Academy Award for the screenplay of Steven Spielberg's *Munich*.

Nothing in Kushner's early career, however, predicted the overnight success he attained when part one of *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches*, opened in Los Angeles in 1992. Critical reaction to the play was immediately and overwhelmingly positive: the influential *New York Times* theater critic Frank Rich, for instance, called it "a searching and radical rethinking" of American political drama and "the most extravagant and moving demonstration imaginable" of the artistic response to AIDS. The play's part two, *Perestroika*, was greeted with similar adulation the following year. Kushner received bushels of awards for *Angels in America*, not least of which were Tony Awards for Best Play in 1993 and 1994 and 1993's Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Outside liberal literary and theatrical circles, however, the play sometimes sparked controversy. A 1996 production of *Angels* in Charlotte, North Carolina took place only under protection of a court order after local officials threatened to prosecute actors for violating indecent-exposure laws.

It is impossible to appreciate the play without understanding something about the history of the AIDS crisis as well as the broader story of gays and lesbians in America. Although men and women have engaged in homosexual behavior in all times and cultures, it was only in the twentieth century that homosexuality came to be seen as a fundamental orientation rather than a specific act. In the United States, the modern gay rights movement began after World War II. Gay bars and political organizations existed mostly in secret in the 1950s and 1960s, but New York City's Stonewall riot in 1969 helped usher in a period of growing openness among gays and greater public acceptance.

Although gay life flourished in the 1970s, many gays saw the 1980s as a period of retrenchment and tragedy. The first cases of AIDS were diagnosed among gay men in 1981. Within ten years more than 100,000 people died of the disease in the United States alone. In the early years of the epidemic, ignorance and fear resulted in widespread discrimination against AIDS patients, and the national media reported the story in a sensationalistic manner, if at all. Gays' anger about the mainstream reaction to AIDS became interlinked with political frustration, as a conservative backlash that began in the late 1970s hindered the cause of gay rights. For many gay activists, Presidents Reagan and Bush symbolized the opposition: both men's administrations were at best uneasy with and often hostile to the gay cause, and Reagan remained silent on the subject of AIDS until 1987. Angels in America opened in Los Angeles in the same week that Bill Clinton, the first presidential candidate to openly reach out to lesbian and gay voters, defeated George Bush. Among gays, the play inevitably became associated with a sense of euphoria and political optimism.

His other work includes The Chosen, The Glass Menagerie, Hamlet, Our Town and last season's Three Days of Rain. Sean also is the Artistic Co-Director of The Bang and the Clatter Theatre Company. Its inaugural production was Sam Shepherd's The Late Henry Moss. He lives in Bolivar with his wife, Beth, and daughters, Leda and Delaney, and twins, Griffin and Zoe.

Director's Notes

The Red and Blue Symphony:

When I first saw Angels in America, I was amazed by the depth and humor of its writing, and the vibrancy and passion of its characters. When I read the script, I was even more impressed by its worldview and incredible analysis of our nation. This is a play that does not preach, but illuminates the spirit of a disparate and troubled country.

While the play is a dark comedy involving gays, Mormons, Jews, and Roy Cohn set against the darkness of the Reagan years, it is also about searching for grace and coming to terms with loss in a dark, painful world. We have begun the new millennium and AIDS has crept out of the dark, unspoken corners of the world and has become a full-blown pandemic. We are approaching an age that could be critical for man. When God is losing significance, when values, morals and justice are becoming warped, when definitions of family and society are rapidly changing, this play looks at these issues and tries to suggest the painful process of change and growth that must occur if we are to survive.

Fantasy, reality, comedy, tragedy, compassion, prejudice, historical figures, fictional characters, angels and ghosts are all on stage to challenge conventional concepts of what is real in the world and beyond it.

Tony Kushner's self-described "Gay Fantasia on National Themes" was one of the first plays to feature AIDS without being driven by disease. His incorporation of such varied characters as a repressed homosexual Republican Mormon, his pill-popping wife, a young Jewish man dealing with the dying of his lover, Ethel Rosenberg, and real-life McCarthy henchman and closeted AIDS victim Roy Cohn, gives a panoramic breadth to the piece.

The synchronicity of the piece tosses away staid ideals including physical interconnectivity for such spiritual connections as the moment in which the fevered AIDS dreams of a dying man intersect with the hallucinations of a woman on Valium. This is a play of political poetry and of religious realignment. Everyone is suffering here, but redemption is coming.

I hope that these talented actors and technicians have created a fantastic world for you to immerse yourselves in for a few hours — a world that is true to the spirit of the master who created it. Thank you for being a part of the newest Weathervane theatre tradition and enjoy the show.

We dedicate this production to all those who have lost a loved one to this disease and to Margaret Dietz, a champion of Weathervane and our guardian angel.

Scott thanks his beautiful wife, Kelly, for putting up with his many "personalities" as his theatrical endeavors continue.

CELESTE COSENTINO (Harper Pitt) Perestroika is Celeste's first production at Weathervane but she has been a part of our teaching staff this season. Locally, she has worked with The Bang and the Clatter Theatre Company where she was last seen as Alice in Closer. She is a native of Cleveland where she has worked with

Ensemble Theatre, Dobama, Cain Park, Willoughby Fine Arts Association and Notre Dame College. Celeste is a graduate of Ohio University's School of Theatre. While in Athens, she worked as an actor for stage, film and radio, as well as working behind-the-scenes as a director. She dedicates her performance to the memory of a dear friend and amazing actress, Alice White.

JONATHAN D. WRAY (Belize) has appeared in more than 60 theater, film, commercial and television productions. Stage performances include A Raisin in the Sun, Oedipus, Fences, Mr. Rickey Calls a Meeting and On the Hills of Black America. Sean's Weathervane credits include The Chosen. The Laramie Project, The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged), A Lesson Before Dying and Angels in America: Millennium Approaches. Sean is also directing The Bang and the Clatter's production of Griller by Eric Bogosian this summer.

DEDE KLEIN (Hannah Pitt) is happy to be reprising the role of Hannah Pitt. Once Weathervane had a theater to call its very own on Copley Road in the 1950's, the wish/need for another smaller "black box" theater surfaced. This space would provide a venue for meetings, children's activities, play readings, cabaret and small revues, and experimental productions, perhaps by local playwrights. A goal of the Capital Campaign, which began in the year 2000, was to add new classrooms for the many children's programs being held by the theater. The Capital Campaign raised \$1,750,000 and provided a two-story addition to the playhouse. New classrooms became reality as well

One of the classrooms sponsored by Margaret J. Dietz and named in memory of her 12-year-old son, John L. Dietz, became the "black box" theater so long awaited. John was a sixth grader at Akron's Rankin School at the time of his death in 1971 following an auto accident. A darling little boy with a passion, even at that age, for play-acting, he had just finished playing a clown in a youth theater production of Aesop's Falables, a rock musical for kids.

Angels in America: Millennium Approaches was the first full presentation held in Weathervane's new "black box" theater. Running from Jan. 23 to Feb. 5, 2005, the Pulitzer Prize-winning play was directed by Sean McConaha.

Parallel Lives: The Kathy and Mo Show by Mo Gaffney and Kathy Najimy (July 28 - 30 and Aug. 4 -6, 2005) was the second production for the Dietz Theater. Angels in America: Millennium Approaches was remounted November 10 - 19, 2005 as a preface to Part Two: Perestroika, which is now presented May 18 - June 3, 2006.

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theater (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment.
