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

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
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

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes to children and teens in acting, musical theatre, dance and technical theater. This year we are offering an all new class on podcasting! Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays, Tuesday evenings and Wednesday afternoons for home school students. Two-week Hands on Theatre (HOT) camps are offered throughout the summer as well as intensive one-week classes in musical theater and auditioning. We also offer a comprehensive two-week Summer Stock program for teens. Next summer, students will produce, design and stage a full production of The Outsiders, based on the book by S.E. Hinton. Partial scholarships are available for all classes.

Children and teens may also audition for roles in Young Actor Series productions. Parents and family members also have the opportunity to participate by volunteering to assist designers and working backstage.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing education outreach and stu-

dent study guides as part of our Project STAGE program. This program brings public and private school students to see three productions each season. This season, *The Lion in Winter, Children of a Lesser God* and *The Importance of Being Earnest* will be featured in the Project STAGE events. Tickets are \$8.

* Capital Project The construction segment of the Capital Project in 2000 included a scene shop with basement storage, a 2nd-floor classroom and rehearsal hall, soundproof production booth, elevator and fly gallery pocket above the stage and installation of the rigging system for the fly gallery. Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.





Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as Playhouse director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Phillip Arnoult's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.


Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.





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

The Season of Giving

As we enter the holiday season and that time of year when nonprofits are soliciting end-of-the-year donations, we who are doing the asking are faced with the inevitable and, often times, overlooked question; why should anyone give away their hard-earned money to my organization? Essentially put, what is the value my organization provides that is so important that someone should give money to it?

I recently sent a letter to a number of businesses in the greater Akron area asking them to consider donating to Weathervane Playhouse. In it I cited a 2006 study by economists from the New York University Stern School of Business which found that companies that give to charities earn back \$6 for every \$1 donated. The study concludes by saying "in business terms, sponsoring or contributing to a good cause can be as easily justified as research and development, capital expenditures, or marketing campaigns." For a company, contributing to a nonprofit organization can not only be a good thing to do, but can be good business.

But what about for the individual - the average person who works hard to make ends meet - why should they give?

In terms of Weathervane Playhouse, the importance is based in our mission: to enrich the quality of life for northeast Ohioans. Theater at its best is a place where we go to experience a shared sense of our own humanity and in an age where technology is driving us further apart, that act of coming together for common understanding and meaning is an increasingly rare and vital service.

I've been asking people this season to tell me their stories about Weathervane Playhouse and I got this one a few weeks ago:





About the Opera and Composer



In 1951, NBC Television Opera Theater commissioned Gian Carlo Menotti, an Italian-born, American-educated composer, to write an opera for its Christmas Eve television special (a first). By Thanksgiving, Menotti was still in the throes of composer's block when he happened to see the painting entitled *The Adoration of the Magi* by Hieronymous Bosch (photo left) while wandering through the Metropolitan Museum of New York. This, coupled with his childhood experience of being cured of an unexplained lameness after his nurse took him to a shrine, became the inspiration for his opus, *Amahl and the Night Visitors*. Styled after the

"morality play" popular during the Middle Ages, the theme centers on "giving."

Menotti wrote both the music and the libretto. The plot has the Three Kings stopping by the hut of a widow and her disabled son, Amahl, on their way to take gifts to the Christ Child. Shepherds bring gifts of food to the Kings since the widow has nothing to offer them and, finally, Amahl offers his crutch as a gift to the Christ Child, resulting in his miraculous healing.

This one-act opera is the most popular opera in the world, with more than 500 performances annually. Weathervane's production of *Amahl and the Night Visitors* is the premiere performance of the opera in a local theater.

The Composer

Gian Carlo Menotti was born on July 7, 1911, in Cadegliano, Italy. Born the sixth of eight children, Menotti's parents were wealthy coffee-trade merchants. His mother made music a central part of all her children's lives, providing lessons in cello, violin and piano - a foundation that led Menotti to compose his first songs at the age of five and his first opera when he was 11. When his family moved to Milan in 1924, Menotti continued his musical education at the Verdi Conservatory of Music. In 1928, as the family's coffee fortunes began to collapse, Menotti immigrated to the United States and enrolled at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. Menotti graduated from Curtis in 1933 and began work on his first major opera, Amelia al Ballo, which received its first staging in 1937. The English version, Amelia Goes to the Ball, premiered at the Metropolitan Opera in New York and Menotti's success earned him a commission from NBC radio. Menotti's operas, all written in English, enjoyed unusual success on the Broadway stage. His 1946 work, The Medium, which was paired with The Telephone, ran for 211 performances in 1947. In 1950, his The Consul ran for 269 performances and was awarded the Drama Critics Circle Award and that year's Pulitzer Prize for music. In 1951, another NBC commission (this time for television) produced the work that remains his best known and most performed, Amahl and the Night Visitors, the first opera ever composed for American television. It became a Christmas tradition on the network's programming schedule for many years thereafter. In 1984, Gian Carlo Menotti received the Kennedy Center Honors for lifetime achievement in the arts. At the age of 95, he died on Feb. 1, 2007, at Princess Grace Hospital in Monte Carlo, Monaco.

Sandra J. Schlub returns to Weathervane this year as director, her last stint here having been as Musical Director for *A Little Night Music*. She has always been immersed in music, theater and performing in a variety of ways which reflects the pattern of her life. In her capacity as high school choir director, she produced, directed, choreographed, costumed, designed and lighted dozens of musicals. She has taken course work at several institutions including, but not limited to, Juilliard and Eastman School of Music and has a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Capital University Conservatory of Music and a Master of Education degree with a major in music from Kent State University. For many years, she also served as director of choirs of all levels, bell choir director and organist for a number of area churches. As a performer, she has sung in musicals including Weathervane's production of *The Threepenny Opera* and *The Golden Apple* at Peninsula Players, and opera including the role of Shepherd in the New York City Opera Touring Company production of *Amahl and the Night Visitors*.

Retired from the public schools, she maintains a private studio in Akron where she teaches voice and piano. Her vocal students have taken many honors including Superior Ratings at the OMEA Solo and Ensemble competitions, won scholarships to colleges including Oberlin, Manhattan School of Music, The Ohio State University and The University of Akron and a student will be competing in the National Finals of the Classical Singer's High School Competition having taken first place in the Ohio Region.

Director's Notes

My association with *Amahl and the Night Visitors* goes wa-a--ay back to when I was taking my undergraduate degree at Capital University Conservatory of Music in Columbus.

When the New York City Opera went on tour with *Amahl and the Night Visitors*, they used local talent for the Shepherds. I had seen the TV production, so, when they brought the opera to Columbus I was pleased that the Richard Johnston Chorale, a semi-professional group with which I was singing, was selected as the group to provide the Shepherds for the run of the show.

When the show closed, I was even more pleased when David Aiken, who played King Melchior, pulled me aside, asked me to join the tour and go back to New York with the company. Although the offer was something to seriously consider, my heart was always set on being a teacher and I have never regretted turning the offer down, for by doing so, I have had the opportunity to direct *Amahl* in three different venues: high school, church and now, theater, and I am rewarded a hundred times over by the look that appears on the faces of amateurs when they first realize that they've "got it."

A few years ago, I leapt at the opportunity to attend a seminar with Menotti (the composer of *Amahl*) at an American Choral Directors Association Convention. Although he was quite up in years and was very frail, I was very impressed with the energy and insights of this diminutive composer and the graciousness he extended to those of us interested in continuing the conversation after the seminar had officially ended. It is fitting, then, that in this year of his passing (February 1, 2007) we honor him with a production of his most famous opus.



Cast Callboard

DAVID FALATOK (Amahl) is a sixth-grader at St. Sebastian School in Akron who makes his Weathervane debut with this production. For the past four years, he has been a member of the St. Paul's Choir of Men and Boys, a Royal School of Church Music-affiliated choir in residence at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Akron. He is proud to have attended a RSCM singing course for men and boys in Montreal, Canada. He lives in Akron.

JEAN BLAIR (Mother) has enjoyed a long and fulfilling relationship with Weathervane. Most recently, she was the Mother Abbess in the 2006 production of The Sound of Music, for which audiences awarded her the Chanticleer for Best Featured Actress in a Musical. She also appeared in the ensemble of Sweeney Todd at The University of Akron School of Music, on whose faculty she serves as an adjunct professor of voice. Longtime residents of this region may recall seeing her in several Kenley Players productions including The King and I, Man of La Mancha and The Sound of Music (the latter role being one she first performed at Goodyear Community Theater). She lives in Akron and is soprano soloist at the Episcopal Church of Our Saviour. She played the role of Mother for Canton Symphony Orchestra's children concerts for 26 years.

DANIEL DOTY (King Kaspar) has sung the role of Kaspar at Bowling Green and Toledo as well as Chicago. He has appeared with the symphonies in Muncie, Indiana; Urbana, Illinois; Marion, Ohio; and with Ohio community bands in Medina and Wadsworth. He made his Akron Symphony debut as Gastone in the opera *La Traviata* this past February. His performances have found him at such locations as the Celle di Puccini (Puccini's

summer home) and Severance Hall. As participant of the Opera Theatre and Music Festival of Lucca, Daniel spent six weeks in the Tuscan village of Lucca (Italy) singing operatic arias at various venues associated with Lucca's most famous son, Giacomo Puccini. A past guest artist with the Masterworks Festival, Daniel worked with David Geier, Assistant Conductor for the New York Philharmonic Orchestra. Daniel holds a bachelor of music education degree from Bowling Green State University and is also an ordained minister. Daniel is senior minister at Trinity United Church of Christ in Wadsworth where he lives with his wife, Amy, and their children, Kristian, Sean, and Kaetlyn.

PAUL KROEGER (King Melchior) has performed dozens of roles in Broadway musicals and in operas for over 30 years in northeast Ohio, New York City and London. He has been seen as Sky Masterson in Guys and Dolls, MacHeath in The Threepenny Opera, Cervantes/ Quixote in Man of La Mancha and in such operas as The Marriage of Figaro, Carmen, La Traviata and Don Pasquale. He holds a bachelor's degree in instrumental music education from Baldwin-Wallace College and a master's in vocal music from the Cleveland Institute of Music. He teaches voice and trombone privately and maintains a small business, Meistersinger Decorating. He lives in Cleveland.

WILLYUM WARREN (King Balthazar) is the co-founder and co-owner of WAF (We Are Family) Enterprises, a professional speaking/performing business that offers motivation and counseling to families and children through words and music. He is also the creator of *TWWE*, the Willyum Warren Experience, a business he started to promote himself as a performer, entertainer and motivational speaker. As the



first African-American firefighter/paramedic hired by the city of Cuyahoga Falls, he shares stories of breaking the color barrier that make audiences laugh, cry and reflect on their own lives. Born and raised in Harlem, NY, he studied music at the City College of New York. He has appeared locally in a number of roles: Laughter on the 23rd Floor (Kent Stage), The Sam Cooke Story (the Cleveland Play House) and Say It with Music (North Canton Playhouse). He calls Akron his home, which he shares with his wife, Anita Warren, and children, Tasha and Tyler.

RUFUS MALONE (Page) will be familiar to Weathervane audiences who enjoyed his performance last season in Smokey Joe's Café. He is a self-employed actor/director with credits at the Cleveland Play House and Playhouse Square Center's Ohio Theater among others. He lives in Akron.

RENEE ARMBRUSTER (Emily) returns to the stage after a nearly 20-year absence, during which she has followed her sons with all their various sports and activities. Her performance credits include several productions at the late Goodyear Community Theatre, including Fraulein Kost in Cabaret as well as roles in How to Succeed in Business without Really Trying, Oklahoma! and A Chorus Line. She holds a bachelor's degree in sociology/criminal justice from The University of Akron, is employed as youth coordinator for the city of Stow and sings in her church's choir. She enjoys travelling with her husband, Kevin, and sons, Kyle and Cory, on their annual summer trips to Myrtle Beach. South Carolina, as well as a recent favorite excursion to Kauai, Hawaii.

MICHAEL J. 


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Volunteering at Weathervane

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! In addition, you receive complimentary tickets to see the shows plus the pride in knowing you are joining nearly 1 million volunteers nationwide to support community theater! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- **❖ Sound** Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in selling tickets and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the Playhouse on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account. So, don't be discouraged and please audition again.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). This makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys other ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

Weathervane Traditions


Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.



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
