A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run as a live theater in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

Their first problem was money to pay the rent and to cover production costs. Money was in short supply in 1935 so the women chose a carnival as their fundraiser. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60 which encouraged them to continue. They named their space Weathervane after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because there were fewer and fewer people willing to commit to directing a play, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. Belfance held the position from 1961-69 and again from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership planned, plotted and raised funds. It all came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon*. There was ample space and a mortgage. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Two major additions to the facility followed; these included firstfloor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop in 2005 became the John L. Dietz Studio/Theater/Classroom, where experimental productions are presented.

Weathervane Playhouse now looks forward to a third expansion and a 75th anniversary.

From Our Executive Director

"The Messiah is One of You"

This seems like an appropriate time to tell this story. With a nod to Benjamin Zander from his book, **The Art of Possibility**, I give you *The Monks' Story*:

A monastery has fallen on hard times. It was once part of a great order, but due to religious persecution in the 17th and 18th centuries, it had lost all its branches. In fact, there were only the Abbot and four other monks left in the mother house, all of whom were over 70. Clearly it was a dying order.

One day, the Abbot visited a nearby Rabbi to see if he could offer any advice that might save the monastery. The Rabbi commiserated saying, "I know how it is, the spirit has gone out of people." "Have you any advice that might save the monastery?" the Abbot asked. "No, I am sorry," the Rabbi replied, "I have no advice to give. The only thing I can tell you is that the Messiah is one of you."

The Abbot returned to the monastery downhearted and bewildered. The monks wondered to themselves what possible significance the Rabbi's words might have. Did he mean the Messiah is the Abbot who's been our leader for so long? Or did he mean Brother Thomas, who is a very holy man? Surely, he couldn't have meant Brother Phillip – he's too passive. But then he's always there when you need him. Or Brother Elrod – he's so crotchety. But then Elrod is very wise. Of course he didn't mean me – yet supposing he did?

As they contemplated in this manner, the old monks began to treat each other with extraordinary respect, on the off chance that one of them might be the Messiah. And on the off-off chance that each monk himself might be the Messiah, they began to treat themselves with extraordinary respect.

Because the monastery was situated in a beautiful forest, people often came to visit. When they did, they began to sense this aura of extraordinary respect that permeated the atmosphere. As a result, their visits became more and more frequent, eventually bringing friends, and their friends brought their friends. After a while, some of the younger men, drawn to this enormously positive energy, asked if they might join. Miraculously, within a few years, the monastery became a thriving order once again, and – thanks to the Rabbi's gift – a vibrant community of light and love.

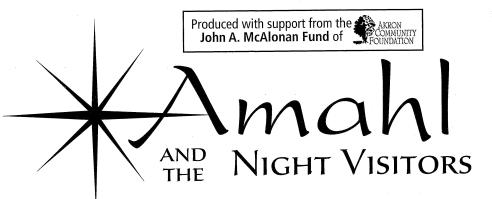

About the Opera and Composer

About the Opera

In 1951, NBC Television Opera Theater commissioned Gian Carlo Menotti, an Italian-born, American-educated composer, to write an opera for its Christmas Eve television special (a first). By Thanksgiving, Menotti was still in the throes of composer's block when he happened to see the painting entitled "The Adoration of the Magi" by the 15th and 16th century Dutch artist Hieronymous Bosch while wandering through the Metropolitan Museum of New York. This, coupled with his childhood experience of being cured of an unexplained lameness after his nurse took him to a shrine, became the inspiration for his opus, *Amahl and the Night Visitors*. Styled after the "morality plays" popular during the Middle Ages, the theme centers on "giving."

Menotti wrote both the music and the libretto. The plot has the Three Kings stopping by the hut of a widow and her disabled son, Amahl, on their way to take gifts to the Christ Child. Shepherds bring gifts of food to the Kings since the widow has nothing to offer them and, finally, Amahl offers his crutch as a gift to the Christ Child, resulting in his miraculous healing.

This one-act opera is the most popular opera in the world, with more than 500 performances annually. Weathervane's 2007 production of *Amahl and the Night Visitors* was the premiere performance of the opera in a local theater. The production lasts about an hour, has no intermission and is traditionally performed without a curtain call.

About the Playwright

Gian Carlo Menotti was born on July 7, 1911, in Cadegliano, Italy. Born the sixth of eight children, Menotti's parents were wealthy coffee-trade merchants. His mother made music a central part of all her children's lives, providing lessons in cello, violin and piano – a foundation that lead Menotti to compose his first songs at the age of five and his first opera when he was 11. When his family moved to Milan in 1924, Menotti continued his musical education at the Verdi Conservatory of Music. In 1928, as the family's coffee fortunes began to collapse, Menotti immigrated to the United States and enrolled at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. It was here that Menotti began his 40-year professional and personal relationship with the famed American composer Samuel Barber. The two men composed collaboratively, traveled and lived together until Barber's death in 1981. Menotti graduated from Curtis in 1933 and began work on his first major opera, Amelia al Ballo, which received its first staging in 1937. The English version, Amelia Goes to the Ball, premiered at the Metropolitan Opera in New York and Menotti's success earned him a commission from NBC radio. The resulting work, The Old Maid and the Thief, was broadcast in 1939. In subsequent years, Menotti's operas, all written in English, enjoyed unusual success on the Broadway stage. His 1946 work, The Medium, which was paired with The Telephone, ran for 211 performances in 1947. In 1950, his first full-length opera, The Consul, ran for 269 performances and was awarded the Drama Critics Circle Award and that year's Pulitzer Prize for music. In 1951, another NBC commission (this time for television) produced the work that remains his best known and most performed, Amahl and the Night Visitors, the first opera ever composed for American television. It became a Christmas tradition on the network's programming schedule for many years thereafter. His post-Amahl operas include Labyrinth (1963), The Last Savage (1963), Martin's Lie (1964), Help, Help, the Globolinks (1968), The Most Important Man (1971), The Hero (1976), The Egg (1976) and The Trial of the Gypsy (1978). In addition to opera, Menotti composed cantatas, ballets, orchestral tone poems, instrumental concertos and various songs and chamber-music pieces. In the early 1970s, he adopted an aspiring performer named Francis "Chip" Phelan as his legal son, who took the legal name of Francis Menotti. As the senior Menotti began to age, Francis took over the dayto-day operations of the Festival dei Due Mondi (Festival of the Two Worlds) in Spoleto, Italy, which the elder Menotti founded in 1958. In 1977, Menotti also founded an American counterpart to his Italian festival of the arts, Spoleto Festival USA, which continues to this day in Charleston, South Carolina. In 1984, Gian Carlo Menotti received the Kennedy Center Honors for lifetime achievement in the arts. At the age of 95, he died on Feb. 1, 2007, at Princess Grace Hospital in Monte Carlo, Monaco.

About Our Directors

Todd Ranney -- Director

Todd makes his directing debut for Weathervane Playhouse although he has appeared on this stage in the 1994 production of Finian's Rainbow as Woody Mahoney. He has performed over 40 baritone roles throughout the Midwest with numerous opera companies including Michigan Opera Theatre, Des Moines Metro Opera, Opera Iowa, Ohio Light Opera, Indiana Opera North, Lyric Opera Cleveland, Cleveland Opera, and Dayton Opera. Some of his roles include Figaro (The Barber of Seville), Guglielmo, Papageno, Marcello, Sharpless, Paquillo, and Carl Linden. He has been a featured soloist with the Cleveland Orchestra (at both Blossom Music Center and Severance Hall) and he has sung with the symphony orchestras of Dayton, Akron, Wooster, The University of Akron, Cleveland Institute of Music and the Cleveland Pops at Severance Hall. He appeared with Cleveland Opera Theater in its production of Amahl and the Night Visitors (with the opera's composer, Gian Carlo Menotti, directing). He performed 12 seasons with Cleveland Opera as an associate artist and was featured in its productions of Carmen, Die Meistersinger, Romeo and Juliet and H.M.S. Pinafore. Mr. Ranney is currently Director of Music Ministries/Organist at the United Methodist Church of Wooster and is the Founding Artistic Director of Akron Lyric Opera Theatre, for which he has directed productions of Madama Butterfly, Cosi fan Tutti and La Boheme. Sought after as a stage director, this past season Mr. Ranney directed productions of Carmen for the Wooster Symphony and Akron Lyric Opera Theatre. Additionally, he is in his final year at The Ohio State University as a graduate teaching assistant completing his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in vocal performance.

Evie Morris -- Musical Director

Evie is a freelance Northeast Ohio-based musical director and vocal coach. 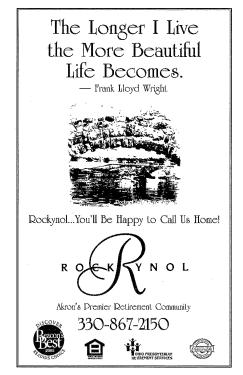

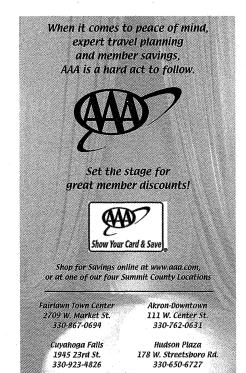

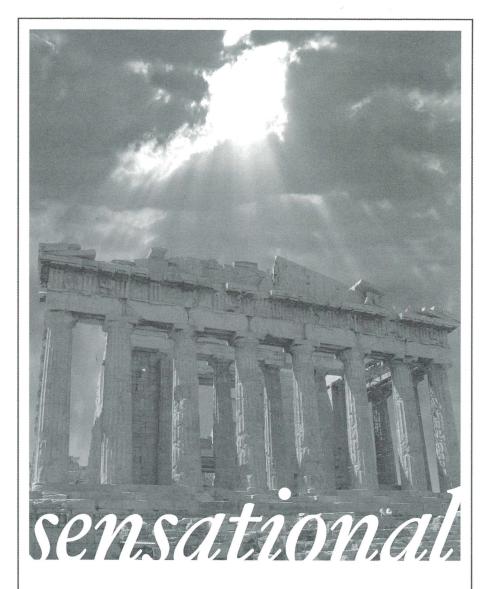
