




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A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.

About the Play and Playwright

In its original 1892 production in London, Charley's Aunt broke all box office records and ran for nearly 1,500 performances. Almost overnight, the smashing success of the play spawned several touring companies across England as well as dozens of productions throughout the English-speaking world. In America, Charley's Aunt was first produced on Broadway in 1893, followed by five revivals (in 1906, 1925, 1940, 1953 and 1970). For the silver screen, Charley's Aunt was filmed in 1915 and 1925 (both of which were silent) and the first "talkie" version followed in 1930. Jack Benny played the title role in a popular 1941 American film version. Broadway showman George Abbott and Guys and Dolls composer Frank Loesser reworked Charley's Aunt to create a musical version of the comedy, called Where's Charlie?, which played on Broadway between 1948 and 1950. This popular musical comedy starred Ray Bolger (the Scarecrow from The Wizard of Oz) as Charley and his "aunt," and he repeated the role for the 1952 movie version. In 1957, the CBS anthology series Playhouse 90 aired its adaptation of Charley's Aunt with a cast that included Art Carney and Jeanette MacDonald (in what would be her final performance). Weathervane Playhouse first produced Charley's Aunt in 1949. The production, directed by Margaret Moore, was staged at the Pythian Temple on South High Street in downtown Akron (which served as Weathervane's temporary venue from October 1948 to July 1949).



About the Playwright

Born in Liverpool, England in 1848, Brandon Thomas was an English actor, playwright and composer of songs. The son of a bootseller, Thomas was educated at the Liverpool Institute and then continued his education at a private school in Lancashire. He learned bookkeeping as a young man and then served as a clerk (first with a couple of timber merchants in the Liverpool region, later with another company in the town of Hull). He supplemented his clerk's salary by working as a freelance journalist.

Mostly, though, he was attracted to the theater, and he started taking roles in amateur productions and music hall revues, often playing the piano and singing his own songs. This lead to his association with theater owners and managers and, in April 1879, he made his professional stage debut at the Court Theatre in London in *The Queen's Shilling*. His London debut opened doors to additional character roles in other theatrical productions, but at the same time he continued to write. Court Theatre managers William and Madge Kendal produced his play *Comrades* in 1882. When he was not writing, he was almost always performing and the drama critics of his day noted that, as an actor, Thomas had a keen talent for duplicating regional accents.

Despite her family's longstanding religious objections, Thomas married Marguerite Blanche Leverson in 1888. She, the daughter of a diamond merchant, and Thomas raised three children: Amy Marguerite Brandon Thomas, Jevan Roderick Brandon Thomas and Sylvia M. Brandon Thomas. (Amy and Jevan both pursued theatrical careers as their father had; Sylvia did not.)

Theatrical historians have written that Thomas wrote *Charley's Aunt* for his friend, the comic actor W. S. Penley, who originated the role of "Babbs" in the show's first production. Playwright Thomas originated the role of Colonel Chesney (which he continued to do on a regular basis in later revivals up to his death). Later, however, the two men fought, and even went to court over who could claim credit as the show's true creator.

Following the international success of *Charley's Aunt*, Thomas continued to work and thrive as a character actor. He also continued to write plays, though none ever quite matched the acclaim showered upon *Charley's Aunt*. On June 19, 1914, at the age of 65, Thomas died after a brief illness at his home in London's Bloomsbury neighborhood. The obituary printed in the June 20, 1914, edition of *The Times of London* quoted him as saying, "I hoped to go down to fame as a great actor. If I go at all it will be as the author of *Charley's Aunt*."

she directed I Hate Hamlet and Social Security earlier this season, and Ohio Shakespeare Festival, which is currently preparing The Comedy of Errors and Cymbeline for the summer of 2013. Nancy has spent 33 years absolutely loving directing almost 200 shows in Virginia, Maryland, Washington D.C., Pennsylvania and California, and looks forward with great anticipation to the next 200!

ALAN SCOTT FERRALL (Scenic/Lighting Designer) began at Weathervane as a backstage

volunteer under the tutelage of the late John R. Thomas. This is Scott's 16th season as a

Weathervane staff member. Other design work includes Cuyahoga Falls High School, The Players Guild of Canton, Cleveland Signstage Theatre and Western Reserve Public Media (PBS-TV Channels 45/49). At Weathervane, Scott has earned seven Chanticleer Awards -- one as the stage manager for Fences; one each for his lighting designs for The Laramie Project, A Lesson Before Dying and Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat; and one each for his co-lighting designs for A Man for All Seasons, The Full Monty and Man of La Mancha. In his spare time, Scott has written three one-act children's plays that tour local schools: Two Swords, a Bag of Marbles and a PB & J, The Mystery of the Missing Robot and How the Bee Learned to Spell: A Fable. He also takes great pleasure in writing the end-of-the-season revue for the Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players, who appear at Weathervane's annual Chanticleer Awards banquet. He was the recipient of the 2012 Trustees Award.



Pressed Flower Art by Lisa Merrick

It is a pleasure and delight to welcome back **Lisa Merrick** and her exquisite botanical designs. It has been several years since her art was displayed in the Gallery. Her beautiful pressed flowers are the perfect complement to the current production of *Charley's Aunt*, which is set in the later years of the Victorian era.

A longtime resident of Norton, Lisa has created her flower art for 38 years working full time out of her home studio. She raises all of her own plant material, picks, presses and creates a full line of handcrafted items.

Lisa holds an Associate's Degree in Natural Science from Wayne General and Technical College. She has won many awards at area art shows, including Ohio Mart at Stan Hywet and the Yankee Peddler festival. During the term of Governor Taft, Lisa was invited to attend the Ohio Statehouse Tree Ornament Contest with her ornament.

In addition to the creation of her pressed flower art, Lisa is an avid arrowhead hunter and collects antique stringed instruments and autographs. She loves to canoe and fish and do landscaping. Lisa is the Assistant Curator and newsletter writer for the Norton Historical Society/Biery House and Museum and serves as Chairman of the Norton Parks and Cemetery Board. Lisa is a contributor to the *Norton Post* newspaper and is writing a children's book.

Lisa is working towards having one of her pressed flower art works accepted as a design for a U.S. Postage stamp. The Citizen's Advisory Committee in Washington, D.C. looks over design ideas to create a new stamp for the future. Thousands of ideas are mailed to them, and in 2004, Lisa's idea made it to the committee desk but wasn't chosen that year. Since then, she has done extensive research about pressed flower art, written a booklet with photographs of her original works and gathered support and signatures from various mayors, state representatives and senators. Her goal is to have her work accepted by the committee and implemented as a new stamp.

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
JOHN HEDGES, Executive Director
