

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






- ★ Emergency Exits are located at the left front of the auditorium and the left side of the lobby. Front door and main lobby side exits will also be used in case of emergency.

- ★ Beverages and Food may not be taken into the auditorium during performances.
- * Use of Cameras, Tape Recorders, TV cameras is prohibited during performances.
- ★ Curtain time Every effort is made to begin shows promptly at 8 p.m. for evening

- performances and at 2:30 p.m. for Sunday matinees. We appreciate audience courtesy in arriving on time.
- * Latecomers will be quietly seated at the rear of the auditorium during a suitable break in the play if space is available and may take their reserved seats after intermission.
- ★ Exiting the Theater For safety and as a courtesy to other patrons and the performers, please remain seated until the auditorium lights are on at intermission or after the show. Auditorium doors will not be opened until the house lights are on. Parking lot illumination assures that getting to your car will be easy and secure.
- ★ Smoking Weathervane Playhouse is a smoke-free facility. Smoking is permitted outside the building.
- ★ Lost and Found items will be held at the Ticket Office until claimed. Please inquire about them during business hours.
- ★ Comments from audience members are always welcomed with interest. - ★ Tickets may be purchased by telephone when you call (330) 836-2626 Tuesdays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. You may also purchase tickets in person during these hours. On performance Saturdays only, the Ticket Office is open from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The Ticket Office is also open one hour prior to all performances and remains open through the first intermission.
- * Telephone reservations must be charged to a Visa, MasterCard or Discover credit card. Reservations are also required when using coupons from your Weathervane Super Coupon book, complimentary tickets or coupons offered from any other cooperating arts organization. Please arrive at the Ticket Office at least 20 minutes before curtain time to pick up your tickets. Any unclaimed tickets will be released for sale to waiting ticket buyers five minutes prior to curtain at the discretion of the Ticket Office Manager and volunteers.
- ★ Special seating Please inform us if you have seating preferences, or require special attention due to visual, auditory or other physical needs. We'll do our best to accommodate you, but please remember orders are filled on a first-come, first-served basis with season subscribers and advanced group sales taking first priority.
- * Super Coupon holders are reminded that coupons do *not* ensure seats for a specific performance. Please call the box office early to reserve seats with these prepaid coupons.
- ★ Season Subscriber Exchange Please call the Ticket Office at (330) 836-2626 if you wish to exchange your subscription seat for another performance of the same show. Exchanges must be phoned in at least 24 hours prior to your originally

- scheduled performance. We can't always guarantee the same seats but we'll give you the closest available replacements. An upgrade fee will be charged when changing subscription seats from the Preview Series to any other performance. If you cannot use your subscription seats, please call us at least 24 hours in advance to release them. We will recognize this as a donation to Weathervane.
- * Student Rush Tickets go on sale 30 minutes before curtain time allowing students with valid ID to purchase remaining tickets for half price on the night of performance, pending ticket availability. These tickets cannot be reserved in advance.
- * Complimentary Tickets for cast members and production volunteers require reservations and may be used only on designated performances. Complimentary tickets distributed to special donors also require reservations but may not be restricted to specific performances. Please let us know you wish to use a complimentary ticket when you telephone for a reservation.
- ★ Discounted Group Reservations are available for groups of 15 or more. Call Weathervane at (330) 836-2626 to learn how you can entertain friends, associates, or clients with a night at the theater or to plan a fund-raising event for larger groups.
- ★ Gift Certificates are available through the Ticket Office at any time in any amount you choose.

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
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


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From the Barn to the Valley A Brief Weathervane History



From 1935 until 1951. Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue in Akron. The

Barn, as it was known, has long since been destroyed but there are still a few people who recall its cramped quarters and especially the energy and devotion of the four ladies, Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it all happen. The plaque in our lobby lists the names of the other founders who shared their commitment and who joined their ambitious mission, producing everything from light comedy to Shakespeare and opera.

Though the Barn is now only a memory, its rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.

Except in 1948 when located at the Pythian Temple, the Barn was home to Weathervane until 1951. Then the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and became a more accommodating 100-seat facility. In 1960, Weathervane hired its first professional director, Bob Belfance, who served until 1992. Along with long-time custodian/ticket office manager, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions and Weathervane existed on a lean budget. Ticket office receipts, along with donations and community support, helped Weathervane meet expenses and created a modest endowment fund. Volunteers still nourish all of Weathervane's activities.

In the mid-1960's, a fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263seat facility which opened in 1970, one of the first enterprises at the head of the corridor into the Cuyahoga Valley National Recreation Area. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has since been paid off. Growing audience demand for live entertainment and theater education continues to underscore Weathervane's needs for increased community support.

In its nearly seven decades, Weathervane has constructed, torn down, recycled, painted and refitted stage settings for more than 500 productions (when Stage Two and Youth Theater productions are included). We've stitched up hundreds of costumes, created lighting magic by the multi-watt, crafted reality out of scores of stage properties and, most of all, shared the talents of well over a thousand amateur performers, who take their performance curtain calls to the applause of more than a hundred thousand theater goers. This effort is the result of volunteer dedication based on the founders' original philosophy that "all who can contribute are welcome."

Our volunteer archivist, Cue Fleming, has compiled the impressive list of productions back to 1935, a record of the dedication of those who have given their time to present each show to please the audiences who seek entertainment excellence each time the lights go up. 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

If you'd like to take an additional part in Chanticleer night and serve as a juror to vote for the award winners, all that is required is your affidavit that you have seen all seven shows during the season, and your choices for outstanding lead performances by a male or female in a drama or comedy, outstanding support performances, and outstanding lead and support in a musical as well as choices in technical achievement. Chanticleers are also awarded for Properties, Lights, Costumes and Sound Design, plus Best Production of the season. In addition to performance and production awards, the event also recognizes outstanding volunteers of the year.

Chanticleer ballots are available during the run of the season's final show in July or August each year. We welcome regular theater-goers who'd like to take part in the jurying and join us for the biggest nail-biting party of the year. For information, please call our office.



Theater Education at Weathervane

Youth Theater

Weathervane's mission to provide children's theatrical education began with Junior Weathervane classes in 1937. The education program has continued to grow since then with workshops and classes, plus production opportunities for children. In the 2000-2001 season, we offer professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays at Weathervane. In addition, two-week workshops for children are planned throughout the summer months. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available for motivated students and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children from throughout the community may also audition for roles in Youth Theater productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides in our **Project STAGE** program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as two productions each season. This season, *The Glass Menagerie* and *Of Mice and*

Men will be featured in the **Project** STAGE events.

But we're not done yet. Much more is planned in Stage Two to make Weathervane the community playhouse our patrons deserve.

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
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
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A play by Ed Schmidt

A First-Time Collaboration between Weathervane and Karamu House of Cleveland.



Not only is this arrangement between Weathervane and Karamu, two of Northeast Ohio's most important theaters, unique, but the play itself tells a story of a unique time in history-the hiring of the first African-American player in Major League Baseball. The player is Jackie Robinson and it is Branch Rickey, owner of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who plans to hire him, breaking the color barrier of the "America's National Pastime." Robinson's entry onto the ballfield will also signal the demise of the Negro Leagues but it changed the sport of baseball itself from that first moment on.

The year is 1947 and Schmidt makes clear that Branch Rickey himself had problems making the decision. He knows Robinson will face difficulties. So the imagined drama brings other great African-American stars to tell Robinson what he may face. Joe Louis, Paul Robeson, and Bill "Bojangles" Robinson join the scene to tell Jackie Robinson what he may expect in his new role. All of these men were also at critical points in their own careers.

We hope you will look forward to this collaboration as a strong way to improve the cultural diversity, community relations and outreach of both these organizations.

Mr. Rickey Calls a Meeting will play at Weathervane Community Playhouse from May 23 through June 10 and will then offer performances at Karamu in Cleveland. Please call early for your reservations to see this "turning-point" production.



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About the Play & Playwright Communicating Doors by Alan Ayckbourn

Alan Ayckbourn has been one of England's non-stop playwrights since 1959, outdoing Shakespeare's output with an astonishing variety of comedies (for the most part) and other plays illuminating a vast variety of views of human nature. Shakespeare only completed 36 plays. The production you are seeing tonight is Ayckbourn's 46th and there are likely more to come. He directs and previews most of his plays at his theater in Scarborough, England, but many quickly make their way to London's West End theaters and from there to Broadway, though only a relative few have been seen in theaters in the United States.

Like J.B. Preistly, Ayckbourn is fascinated by the vagaries of time as seen in *Communicating Doors*, which had its U.S. premiere in Chicago in 1993. Weathervane audiences were introduced to Ayckbourn's sense of humor when *Bedroom Farce* was on our season schedule in 1983 not long after its Broadway introduction.

With murder at its heart, *Communicating Doors* seeks to save the victims by changing time to foul up the plans of Julian and Reece. You will have to keep your wits about you as Poopay, not really a dominatrix, discovers that the doors she opens change everything that might happen between murderer and victims in three different moments in time, forward or backward.



In Our Gallery Works by Marjorie Lutes

Ms. Lutes has been involved in art for nearly thirty years. Currently living in Uniontown, she has studied in Ohio and Ireland and has received numerous grants and awards for her work. Her stay in Ireland originated as an art exchange program with the Irish Museum of Modern Art. She enjoys her work teaching students from age five to adult.

Her part-time work has included commercial art, designing posters, brochures, newsletters, stage sets and costumes. She has often been featured demonstrating portraits, caricatures and pastel portraits at Stan Hywet and E. J. Thomas Hall public events. A staff artist for Mensa, Ms. Lutes chooses a variety of media from pastel to collage or assemblage to express human emotions and awareness.

Her background includes graduate work at The Ohio State University and Kent State University after graduation as an art major at the University of Akron. Her time in Ireland also included studies at the University of Galway.

She is delighted to have the opportunity to direct farce once again, recalling many happy days in dinner theatre staging No Sex Please, We're British; Not Now, Darling; I Love my Wife and the like. Nancy has directed more than a hundred productions in regional, university and LORT theaters across the country including, locally, Ain't Misbehavin', Pump Boys and Dinettes and The Foreigner for Porthouse Theatre Company at Blossom Music Center and Oh, Coward! as a collaboration with Ohio Ballet.


An honors graduate of the University of Virginia, Nancy has received five sets of regional and critics' awards for excellence in directing.

TIMOTHY H. CHAMPION (Julian) was recently seen as C.K. Dexter Haven in our production of The Philadelphia Story. Last season he appeared in A Man For All Seasons and The Two Gentlemen of Verona. His performance of Sir Thomas More in A Man For All Seasons earned him a Best Actor Chanticleer, one of the six he has collected during his 16vear association with Weathervane. DEDE KLEIN (Ruella) says she is delighted to be working with Nancy Cates again as she did in Blithe Spirit at Weathervane two seasons ago. She is equally pleased that she will not have to be dipped in silver for her role in this production, though the time shifts find her mortality questionable. Her Elvira in Blithe Spirit brought a Chanticleer award to her mantel as did her appearance as Birdie in The Little Foxes a few seasons previously. She's also been seen at Weathervane as Amanda in The Glass Menagerie and as Florence in The Odd Couple, and she's appeared in several Hudson Players and Stow Players shows. With Aurora Theatre, she was seen as M'Lynn in Steel Magnolias, and at Chagrin Valley Little Theatre she played Aunt Bella in Lost in Yonkers. She graduated with a Theater Degree from the University of Arizona and is a flight attendant with American Airlines.

SARA K. MENEFEE (Jessica) is happy to be making her Weathervane debut in this production. She lives in Chagrin Falls and has been part of several Cleveland-area productions. Recently she was seen as Mayella in To Kill a Mockingbird at Tri-C East and

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
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




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



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Weathervane Traditions

Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteer hosts and host-esses. Please enjoy a cup with us. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome our audiences on the first Friday night of each production. We'll provide light snacks and refreshments after the show so you can share that "first-nighter" feeling.

For your sweet tooth, snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission. *Refreshments are not permitted in the auditorium.*

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Who Gets On Stage at Weathervane? ...

The performers you see on the Weathervane stage come from throughout the greater Akron and surrounding areas. They're volunteers, just like the many men and women who supply backstage talent to make sure the show goes on performance after performance. They've committed themselves to four to six weeks of rehearsals plus perfor-

mances, and their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come to our shows with substantial theatrical experience. Others may be new to the stage. Frequently we find that talented newcomers to our area find that Weathervane is a great way to make new friends especially if they've

been involved with community productions in their former home town.

Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for performance opportunities for ethnic minority actors and others who may be physically or mentally challenged. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent and sincerity of purpose.

To find out how you can get on stage, check the newspaper for audition dates and times or call Weathervane at (330)836-2626 if you are interested in auditioning for a role in one of our up-

coming productions or in a Youth Theater production. We'll tell you about requirements.

Weathervane shows are never "precast." When you've been in a show or auditioned, your name will be included in our file so we can send you future audition notices. Some guest directors prefer to set appointments for audition

times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance

schedule ahead. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged. Come try again. The next show may suit you even better!




Put On Your Own Show

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

Remember, you can always buy a new Super Coupon book at the Ticket Office any time you want to treat yourself and several friends to a Weathervane show. Books of eight coupons provide a modest savings over regular admission prices.

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

What Can You Do as a Weathervane Volunteer

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work night after night. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call our Production and Volunteer Coordinator, Maryanne Cotter, at (330) 836-2323. Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A fulfilling responsibility for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- ★ Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. We appreciate all the help we can find to design and build sets, move them and tear them down after a show to make new ones.
- ★ Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We need skilled and even unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized. Add your design ideas or learn from other hard-working volunteers.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. You'll take pride in knowing that nobody can see the show without you.
- ★ Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural environment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system

for technical rehearsals and productions. We'll help you learn.

- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. We need many volunteers to work on each performance. If you are clever at building things or have friends with "neat stuff" they'll loan, volunteer here.
- ★ Box Office If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations.
- ★ Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, showing them to their seats, passing out programs, and serving refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager The theater's unofficial representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theatergoers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.
- ★ Office Volunteer Put a few morning or afternoon hours to good use answering phones, taking reservations, helping with mailings, working with staff, and greeting customers and visitors. Many friendly people are needed to help.
