

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
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Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951 when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,


directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE®, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.

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



She is a self-taught quilter who, in 1995, was artist-in-residence at both Hillcrest Elementary School and Portage Path Elementary School, followed in 1997 as artist-in-residence at King Elementary School. Most recently she has had solo exhibits at the Lucy Laney Craft Gallery, Augusta, Georgia, and at the Ponder Art Galler at Benedict College in Columbia, S.C. Her work has also been featured at the Akron Woman's City Club, the Akron Art Museum, and Tomorrow's Treasures.

"Crowns reminds me of the ladies who went to the church I grew up in, the Greater Bethel Baptist Church in Akron. I remember too many times sitting behind either one of the sister elders, or the minister's wife, who wore these large fabulous intricate hats," remembers Debra. "Quilts, like those hats the women wear, carry a language and tradition all their own. The messages are visible displays of the culture of African people. These quilts, jackets and pillows are traditionally made, and they also tell stories. I hope after viewing my work and experiencing Crowns, the observer walks away with a greater understanding of the legacy and history of African-Americans."

The story of Crowns started in 1998. Michael Cunningham, a commercial photographer living in Winston-Salem, N.C., was told by a friend about the beautiful hats her relatives had worn to a reunion. "I could just see all those women in hats covered in buttons and fur and jewels. My ma was a minister, so I could just see them." So he set out to take as many portraits as possible of African-American women wearing their church hats. He put ads in local newspapers and asked ministers to announce the project to their congregations. Sixty women volunteered. Craig Marberry, a former television reporter who knew Cunningham, heard about the project and offered to write interviews with the owners of the hats. "From the outside, it might appear that this is based on self-glorification. But it's not. It's a tradition intrinsic to the black experience. It's based on showing respect for God and church and being part of a wonderful sorority of hat lovers," said Marberry. An agent was found and Doubleday bought the book rights. The Trenton N.J. City Museum became involved in the premiere of the new play written by Regina Taylor when it held an unrelated hat-themed exhibition. The hat story took on a life of its own, with tea parties, notecards and, of course, hats! A school teacher remarked, "When you wear a hat, you're different! You realize your own queenly attributes!" There is one man in the cast. He represents the spirit of the crossroads, a vital part of the women's histories and appears in different roles throughout the play. He touches the stories that the women tell, often bringing momentary life to the fathers, brothers, husbands and preachers who have influenced the lives of the other characters. #### About the Playwright

Regina Taylor played the pivotal role of Lilly Harper in the critically acclaimed series I'll Fly Away from 1991-1993, which earned her a Golden Globe Award for Best Actress in a Drama Series and an NAACP Image Award. She recently received the Women in Film Gracie Allen Award for her portrayal of Anita Hill in the television film Strange Justice. While attending Southern Methodist University, Taylor made her professional acting debut in the CBS television film Crisis at Central High. Her additional television credits include the series Law & Order, the films Cora Unashamed and Making the Case for Murder: The Howard Beach Story and, on CBS, the mini-series Children of the Dust. Her feature film credits include The Negotiator, Courage Under Fire, A Family Thing, Lean on Me, Losing Isaiah and Clockers. Taylor was the first black woman to play Juliet in Romeo and Juliet on Broadway. Her other Broadway credits include As You Like It and Macbeth. She has appeared Off-Broadway and regionally in numerous productions including Machinal and A Map of the World at the Joseph Papp Public Theater, The *Illusion* at the New York Theatre Workshop, and *The Tempest*, for which she received a Dramalogue Award. Taylor also starred in the Off-Broadway production Jar the Floor at the Second Stage Theater in New York. A Distinguished Artistic Associate of Chicago's Goodman Theater, Taylor collaborated on and appeared in the play *Millennium Mambo*, which premiered at New York's Signature Theatre in early 2001. As a playwright, Taylor was honored by the American Critics' Association for Oo-Bla-Dee. Drowning Crow, Taylor's adaptation of Chekhov's *The Seagull*, was produced last season at the Goodman. She also wrote the stage production of A Night in Tunisia, which was performed during the 2000 Shakespeare Festival, last season at the Alabama Shakespeare Festival and is currently running at George Street Playhouse in New Brunswick, N.J.


help pave the way for other young people to follow in her footsteps.

Our on-stage performers have worked long and hard to earn your applause. But their work is supported by many other unseen men and women who've helped build and paint sets, run the lights and sound, make sure that properties and set dressing items are in their proper places and do other backstage labor from stage managing to costuming and make-up. Supporting those who are actively involved in putting on each show are still more volunteers who usher, house manage, sell tickets, keep our office running and serve on our Board of Trustees, Board committees, Production Board and Women's Board.

Their spirit is the backbone of our continuing operations, a valued support on which our professional staff relies.

Each month, we acknowledge the outstanding Volunteers of the Month in our lobby, but those volunteers represent all who commit their time and interest to create a great theater experience for everyone who's come to see this show.

If you have friends or relatives who volunteer generously at Weathervane, we hope you'll take a moment to thank them for their help and their support of the cultural enrichment of our community. Better vet, join them! Call us and we'll help you win your own share of the applause for a "jolly good show," an experience that offers unique challenges with every performance.

#### Share the Annual Chanticleer Celebration

Let's talk Chanticleer! Shortly after the final production of each season (August 19, 2006), Weathervane volunteers, subscribers and friends share an exciting awards banquet and party to acknowledge outstanding performances by performers and technical volunteers. And, if you have seen all of the six mainstage productions, you are eligible to be a judge!

The top performers are awarded rooster statuettes -- Chanticleers -- in recognition of their work, as voted by Chanticleer "judges." It's a great night to get together, share hopes, fun and festivities and is open to all.

Awards are presented for outstanding lead performances by a male or female in a drama or comedy, outstanding support performances, and outstanding lead and support in a musical, as well as choices in technical achievement. Chanticleers are also awarded for properties, lights, costumes and sound design, plus best production of the season. In addition to performance and production awards, the event also recognizes the Top 25 outstanding volunteers of the season. We welcome you to take part in the biggest nail-biting party of the year. Make sure to pick up your ballot at the end of the season and join us!



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#### Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

\* Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.

Volunteer

- \* Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- \* Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- \* Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- \* Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- \* Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- \* Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- \* Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- \* House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.


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Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.

#### Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). This makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys other ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

#### Weathervane Traditions

Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.

**Intermission Tea** is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on Main Stage first Friday performances. We provide light refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.

For your sweet tooth snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission.

Refreshments (other than water) are not permitted in the auditorium.



#### Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theatre (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE© program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, *Much Ado about Nothing, Crowns* 

and Antigone will be featured in the Project STAGE© events. Tickets are \$8.

#### Adult Classes

Professionally taught adult theatre classes have included classical drama, improvisation, scenic design, stage lighting and directing. These classes help actors expand their performance and public speaking skills. Look for new schedules for classes periodically.

Every production participant becomes part of Weathervane's continuing education process. You'll learn from more experienced volunteers who share the creation of production and performance. If you don't have time for structured classes, sign on to become a crew member or performer. We'll help you expand your knowledge of backstage and onstage responsibilities.




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
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
