A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works -- even opera -- with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.


The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951, the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 80th Season.











In the Harris Family Gallery -- A Tribute to Jack Richard

Jack was a brilliant artist and made his living over the last 70 years painting more than 800 commissioned portraits, church murals, illustrations, etc. Jack did it all and his works are in many public and private collections around the world. He was the recipient of many national and local awards and citations. Jack established his Almond Tea Gallery and the Studios of Jack Richard in downtown Cuyahoga Falls in 1960. From there, he exhibited other artists, his own and students' work, and did art restoration and framing. He was painting, teaching and running his gallery right up to his death last August at the age of 92.

Most importantly, Jack was a great teacher, having taught more than 2,000 students. Several of his students have gained important national reputations, while others have become successful teachers, educators, gallery directors, portrait painters and landscape artists encompassing styles from magic realism to non-objective abstraction. It is this legacy which was the greatest source of pride to Jack.

Mark Giangaspero started taking lessons from Jack at he age of 11. He is now a professional painter (one of his paintings is in the permanent collection at the Butler Institute of American Art) and had worked with Jack for many years at the Almond Tea Gallery as a teacher, art restoration expert and framer. Jack entrusted Mark with the task of continuing the Gallery after his death. Mark says, "Nothing was more important to Jack than teaching. He would tell us (the students) a story about asking his teachers, who numbered more than 20, 'How could he repay them for everything they gave him?' All of the answers were the same, 'Just pass it on.' And he spent his life doing just that."

Jack was commissioned to portray the *Ambassador of Golf*, chosen every year by the NEC Corporation since the World Series of Golf started in 1981. The *Ambassador of Golf* awardees are people "who have fostered the ideals of the game on an international level and whose concern for others extends beyond the golf course". Among the past Ambassadors, painted by Jack, are former Presidents George H.W. Bush and Gerald Ford, Dinah Shore, Bob Hope, Bing Crosby, Arnold Palmer, Gary Player, Sam Snead, Juan "Chi Chi" Rodriguez and Robert Dedman. The original portrait goes to the recipient, while a photographic facsimile is created for Firestone Country Club.

On a personal note, I modeled for Jack and his students on several occasions over the years. It was a joy and privilege to have known him. He is missed.

Welcome to Weathervane!



Edward Albee is one of those rare talents whose life story includes expulsions from high school, a military academy and college. Since those turbulent years in the 1940s, Albee has become one of America's most prolific and most successful playwrights. Weathervane has done just about all of his major works: Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?, Seascape, Three Tall Women, The Goat, or Who is Sylvia?, and the play we are presenting now, A Delicate Balance.

Albee's plays are not, for want of a better term, "easy." They are well-crafted, realistic, and examine the human condition. And yet, sometimes, the language is dense and you find yourself asking the question: What is this play about? You may not reach an immediate or satisfying answer to that question. Still, there is no question that his plays are worth doing.

When we put together the collection of dramas, comedies and musicals that we call a "season," we engage in that delicate balancing act of trying to meet the needs and interests of actors, designers, staff, trustees, donors, subscribers and single-ticket buyers. (That list is not prioritized, by the way.) Into that mix we throw in notions of "art" -- which is designed to evoke an emotional and intellectual response from us as members of an

audience -- and "entertainment" -- which is designed to let us sit back, put our feet up (OK, that's a little difficult to do in our theater), relax and have a good time. Art is not always entertaining and entertainment is certainly not always art. Nevertheless, they are also not necessarily mutually exclusive. Just because a play causes you to think doesn't mean it's not entertaining.

A production of A Delicate Balance can be both art and entertainment. It's a play that won the Pulitzer Prize in 1967 -the first of Albee's three. To some, that already means it's "art." What also helps make this play "entertainment" is the top-notch acting of our cast, the very real set, props and costumes and the compelling staging of our director. We hope you will be moved, challenged and entertained by Weathervane's production of Edward Albee's A Delicate Balance.

About the Play and Playwright

About the Play

In a 1996 preface to his play, Edward Albee wrote that *A Delicate Balance* concerns "the rigidity and ultimate paralysis which afflicts those who settle in too easily, waking up one day to discover that all of the choices they have avoided no longer give them any freedom of choice, and that what choices they do have left are beside the point."

A *Delicate Balance* is a dark comedy in which the carefully controlled existence of two complacent suburbanites is forever shattered by their family and friends over the course of one eventful weekend.

Agnes and Tobias are a perfectly normal, upper middle-class married couple. With a cushion of wealth to protect them, they would appear to have the best of everything: a beautifully furnished home, the finest china and the most tasteful furniture.

But the underpinnings of such a comfortable life have begun to come loose. Live-in sister-in-law Claire drinks too much and delights in trading caustic remarks with Agnes and Tobias. And Julia, Agnes and Tobias's 36-year-old daughter, has returned home after her fourth failed marriage, a lost child seeking the comfort of hearth and home.

The sudden appearance of Harry and Edna, the neighbors and best friends of Agnes and Tobias, further threatens the rigidly restrained order of suburban splendor. Harry and Edna insist that they cannot return to their own home, due to an undefined "terror" that has gripped them. With their equilibrium thus upended, can Agnes and Tobias continue to maintain their "delicate balance?"

A dark comedy packed with psychological complexity, *A Delicate Balance* takes audiences on a careening ride from domestic superficiality to a jolting confrontation with life's most existential questions.

The original Broadway production of *A Delicate Balance* opened at the Martin Beck Theatre in New York City on Sept. 22, 1966. The production ran for 132 performances and won the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1967. There have been two Broadway revivals: in 1996 (with Elaine Stritch playing Claire) and in 2014 (featuring John Lithgow as Tobias and Glenn Close as Agnes). A film adaptation, released in 1973, was directed by Tony Richardson and starred Katharine Hepburn, Paul Scofield, Lee Remick, Joseph Cotten and Kate Reid. Weathervane first produced *A Delicate Balance* in 1968; the production was directed by Robert Belfance.

About the Playwright

Edward Albee is perhaps best known for his association with the artistic movement of the 1950s and early 1960s more popularly regarded as "the theater of the absurd." Born in Washington, D.C., on March 12, 1928, Albee's parents abandoned him as a baby. A wealthy couple who owned a theatre chain, Reed and Frances Albee, adopted the infant boy. He was named after his adoptive paternal grandfather, Edward Franklin Albee, a powerful vaudeville producer who had made the family fortune as a partner in the Keith-Albee Theater Circuit.

Despite the lavish environment in which he grew up in affluent Westchester, New York, he was, by most accounts, unhappy. He attended Trinity College, a small liberal arts school in Hartford, Connecticut for a year. After failing to show up for the school's chapel services, as well as certain classes, Albee was dismissed by the school. At the age of 20, Albee left home and settled in Greenwich Village in New York City. He took on various jobs, including the roles of "office boy," record salesman and Western Union messenger.

He also began to meet other writers, including Thornton Wilder and W.H. Auden. It was Wilder who suggested that he try his hand at plays. At the age of 30, Albee wrote his first play, *The Zoo Story*, in a quick, three-week period.

Albee's first full-length, three-act play was *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* Its 1962 Broadway production won the Tony Award for Best Play, won him international fame and opened new doors of artistic opportunities.

Albee's other plays include *The American Dream, Tiny Alice, A Delicate Balance* (winner of both the Pulitzer Prize and the Tony Award) *All Over, Seascape* (winner of the Pulitzer Prize), *The Lady From Dubuque, The Man Who Had Three Arms, Finding the Sun, Three Tall Women* (winner of the Pulitzer Prize), *Fragments, The Play about the Baby, Occupant* and *The Goat, or Who is Sylvia?* He is a member of the Dramatists Guild Council and president of the Edward F. Albee Foundation, which maintains the William Flanagan Memorial Creative Persons Center (a writers and artists colony in Montauk, New York).

About Our Director - Craig Joseph



A native of Canton, Craig was bitten by the theater bug at an early age and could be found producing short plays and puppet shows in the backyard with the neighborhood kids. After receiving a fantastic arts education in Plain Local Schools, Craig pursued his Bachelors degree in English and Theology at Wake Forest University (all the while acting and directing) and then went on to receive a Masters degree in Directing from Northwestern University. A ten-year sojourn in Chicago garnered him professional directing credits with Writers Theatre, White Horse Theatre and TimeLine Theatre, among others. Contemporaneously, he acted occasionally and wrote several plays, short fiction pieces and a screenplay. Never content to just do one

thing, the Chicago decade also found Craig working in a variety of church and nonprofit contexts as a youth pastor, associate pastor, arts educator, college professor and church planter. Through these experiences, Craig developed a passion for merging the arts world with social justice concerns. His next career move, which took him to Minneapolis, found him serving as the Creative Director for a progressive congregation which utilized the arts to foster racial reconciliation, poverty awareness and neighborhood revitalization; all the while, Craig continued directing professionally. A surprise move back home to Ohio six years ago has propelled Craig in a new direction. Now serving as the curator of Translations Art Gallery and as the Creative Director for a branding and identity agency called Cassel Bear, he gets to play with the interaction between words and images all day. He continues telling stories on the stage, with recent directing credits of *The Elephant Man, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Other Desert Cities* and *God of Carnage*. He also began acting again, tackling the challenge of a one-man play, Lee Blessing's *Chesapeake*, and being very short as Lord Farquaad in *Shrek*. As ever, Craig thanks his family for their support of his multi-directional, oft-indecipherable life and career trajectory. And he thanks you for supporting the arts, so that he can continue to do what he loves.

Director's Notes

In a graduate school directing seminar on theatrical collaboration, I was assigned the task of working with MFA design students to prepare for a theatrical production. We were to read the play together, articulate a concept, develop scenic, costume and lighting designs, create a rehearsal schedule and more -- everything but actually rehearse and mount the play. I was assigned *A Delicate Balance*.

I loved the play and worked hard in that seminar. I read reviews and commentaries on the texts. I researched previous productions. I surveyed Albee's work, along with plays that had inspired him. I studied absurdism. And I remember sitting up nights, discussing the play and its layers with my classmates, growing increasingly excited about a never-to-be-mounted production. Torturous.

Understandably, I was excited when Weathervane offered me this opportunity to direct the show 15 years later. I pulled out the stuffed binder that had been sitting in a closet, waiting for the moment when I'd finally get to manifest my vision.

The problem? I didn't believe any of what I'd written back then.

This is a play that gets better with age. It has grown in folks' estimation since the 1960s, when it had numerous detractors. It needs reading and re-reading, watching and re-watching to unlock all of its wonderful secrets and humor. But most of all, it needs *life experience*; this play gets better as I age.

Since grad school, I've had more years to think about my mortality, to have dreams for my life (and then to have to revise them), to fail at loving well, to mess up, to regret, to take stock of things and find myself wanting: small glimpses of "The Terror" that plagues each of these characters. But instead of leaving me depressed or morose, these experiences have brought me back to the play with a gentleness and tenderness that stems from knowing that I'm in the same boat.

I have sometimes feared life and retreated -- just like Tobias.

I can become a control freak when I feel like my world is chaos -- just like Agnes.

I use cynicism and jadedness to mask my pain -- just like Claire.

I may revert to adolescence when I don't feel loved and safe -- just like Julia.

And I certainly understand Harry's and Edna's need to flee the silence of a quiet room that forces one to take a good hard look at oneself.

So as I come back to Albee's Pulitzer Prize winner -- blessed this time with a cast of wonderful actors with their own wealth of life experience -- I hope we've met the play not only with our heads, but also with our hearts. And I hope you will as well.
