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
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


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


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




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
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
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


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
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#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF WEATHERVANE PLAYHOUSE

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members – Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch – and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/ Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 81st Season.

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WATERCOLORS HAL SCROGGY

The Man Who Came To Dinner is a beloved, classic American comedy. Therefore, it seems fitting to have work in the Harris Family Gallery done by a wonderfully talented, classic artist. Hal Scroggy recently celebrated his 95th birthday. Ill health has prevented him from painting for the last few years. However, during the past several months, Hal has felt rejuvenated and has gone back to his easel to create new pieces for this exhibit.

This will mark the third time that Hal Scroggy has been in the Harris Family Gallery in the past 30 years. I am so pleased to feature him again at Weathervane. He is an award-winning watercolorist in the United States and has exhibited extensively across the nation. Hal also is critically acclaimed in the U.K. His work has been included in three volumes of Splash, which is a prestigious annual publication that features the best paintings of internationally recognized watercolorists.

Hal was discovered by artist Roy Wilhelm when he was in grade school. He studied several years with Wilhelm, a local commercial artist who founded the Akron Society of Artists and was part of the "New Movement" in watercolor. Wilhelm helped Hal get accepted at The Cleveland Institute of Art.

Hal also served in World War II (infantry cannons). After the war, he worked in fashion illustration, motion pictures, television and as Art Director of Publications for B.F. Goodrich for 20 years.

When he retired, Hal began serious impressionistic watercolor paintings. His philosophy is, "I paint adjectives rather than nouns." He was a founding member of The Ohio Watercolor Society and a signature member of The American Watercolor Society (ASW). Hal also belongs to The Transparent Watercolor Society and The Whiskey Painters of America.

Hal's work, which features people and places from around the globe, seems a perfect complement to the current production, which, although is set in a small town in Ohio, has characters from other cities and countries whirling into the action of the play.

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

Assistant Technical Director KATHY KOHL They say that fish and houseguests stink after three days. That old saying is proven true indeed in this delightful comedy from the late 1930s!

Upon arriving to dine at the Ohio home of a rich factory owner, a famously grumpy New York radio host slips on ice and breaks his hip — forcing him to stay at the house for weeks! In no time at all, the hapless houseguest proceeds to drive his hosts mad by monopolizing their house, terrorizing their staff, running up large phone bills and inviting strange guests!

The "man" of the play's title refers to the character Sheridan Whiteside, the sharp-tongued sophisticate who holds court at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Stanley. The highly successful playwriting duo Moss Hart and George S. Kaufman created Whiteside in honor of their real-life friend, Alexander Woollcott, the formidable writer and critic. Very much like his theatrical counterpart Whiteside, the imperious Woollcott suffered no fool gladly. A longtime writer for The New Yorker and host of the popular CBS radio show The Town Crier in the mid 1930s, Woollcott was renowned for his poison pen and acidic prose. According to New York University professor Laurence Maslon, Woollcott was the ultimate "taste-tester and

taste-maker" who "wielded an opinion and rapier-like wit that few could match."

Packed with dozens of references to the celebrities, politicians, plays and books that would be well known to the audience of its day, *The Man Who Came to Dinner* remains a perfect "Who's Who" of late-1930s popular culture and newsmakers. The Man Who Came to Dinner premiered at the Music Box Theatre in New York City on Oct. 16, 1939, and played for 739 performances before closing on July 12, 1941. A film adaptation followed in 1942 and featured two of its best-known original Broadway cast members (Monty Wooley as the overbearing Whiteside and Mary Wickes as his long-suffering nurse Miss Preen). Broadway has seen two additional revivals of the show (in 1980 and in 2000), and the show also inspired a musical version, Sherry!, which played for 72 performances on Broadway in 1967.

From the Director, Jim Fippin

Alexander Woollcott (1887-1943), the inspiration for the character of Sheridan Whiteside in The Man Who Came to Dinner, was an American author, critic, a front-line war correspondent (during the first World War), and radio personality, celebrated for his flamboyant character and acerbic wit. In a time before television, his radio program, The Town Crier, established his reputation as a raconteur, gossip, conversationalist, wit, and man-about-town (the town being New York). He wielded great influence as a critic of both literature and theatre; he could make a book a best-seller with a mention on his program and was instrumental in making the Marx Brothers the darlings of Broadway, and later, Hollywood. Friend and confidante of the jet set (before the advent of the jet), he was a prominent member of the Algonquin Circle, a group of literary and show business types that included Dorothy Parker, Robert Benchley, Herman Mankiewicz and George S. Kaufman. It was Kaufman, along with his frequent collaborator Moss Hart, who promised Woollcott a theatrical vehicle to showcase his Falstaffian persona. Stumped for an idea, and besieged by an increasingly impatient Woollcott, the playwrights were inspired by Hart's recollection of a nightmarish weekend spent by their subject at Hart's Bucks County

home. Arriving uninvited, Woollcott proceeded to terrorize the servants, insult his host and the other guests, and on his departure, signed the guest book, "This is to certify that I had one of the most unpleasant times I ever spent." When Kaufman remarked that it was fortunate Woollcott had not broken his leg and stayed on to convalesce, Hart knew that they had their play, and a hit was born. The Man Who Came to Dinner had a successful run in New York (Woollcott did not play Whiteside on Broadway, although he did appear in the play on the road), was a hit film (featuring Monty Wooley and Bette Davis), and has been frequently revived, most notably with Nathan Lane as Whiteside in 2000.

On a personal note: in 1983, when I was a sophomore at Otterbein University (back then it was just a college), I was the prop master for *The Man Who Came to Dinner*. The show was directed by Doctor Charles "Doc" Dodrill, and designed by Professor Fred "Pop" Thayer, the two men who transformed the theatre program at Otterbein from a liberal arts minor into one of the most prestigious pre-professional programs in the country. While I can never repay the debt I owe both of them, I would like to dedicate this show to their memory. This one is for them... and of course, for you, our audience. Enjoy!

#### ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHTS

MOSS HART (1904-1961) and GEORGE S. KAUFMAN (1889-1961) first collaborated on Once in a Lifetime (1930) followed by seven other plays including Merrily We Roll Along (19834), the Pulitzer Prize-winning You Can't Take It With You (1936), The Fabulous Invalid (1938), The American Way (1939), The Man Who Came to Dinner (1939) and George Washington Slept Here (1940). Kaufman's other collaborators included Edna Ferber (The Royal Family and Dinner at Eight), George and Ira Gershwin (the Pulitzer Prize-winning Of Thee I Sing) and the Marx Brothers (Animal Crackers and the screenplay for A Night at the Opera). Hart wrote the books

for As Thousands Cheer (with a score by Irving Berlin), Jubilee (Cole Porter) and Lady in the Dark (Kurt Weill and Ira Gershwin). Hart's other works include the play Light Up the Sky, screenplays for Gentleman's Agreement (1947) and the Judy Garland version of A Star is Born (1954), and his best-selling memoir Act One (1959). Kaufman and Hart also directed many of their own works. Each man won a Tony Award for best director: Kaufman for Guys and Dolls and Hart for My Fair Lady.



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

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
