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

- performances and at 2:30 p.m. for Sunday matinees. We appreciate audience courtesy in arriving on time.
- * Latecomers will be quietly seated at the rear of the auditorium during a suitable break in the play if space is available and may take their reserved seats after intermission.
- * Exiting the Theater For safety and as a courtesy to other patrons and the performers, please remain seated until the auditorium lights are on at intermission or after the show. Auditorium doors will not be opened until the house lights are on. Parking lot illumination assures that getting to your car will be easy and secure.
- * Smoking Weathervane Playhouse is a smoke-free facility. Smoking is permitted outside the building.
- * Lost and Found items will be held at the Ticket Office until claimed. Please inquire about them during business hours.
- * Comments from audience members are always welcomed with interest. 
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

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From the Barn to the Valley A Brief Weathervane History



From 1935 until 1951, Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue in Akron. The

Barn, as it was known, has long since been destroyed but there are still a few people who recall its cramped quarters and especially the energy and devotion of the four ladies, Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it all happen. The plaque in our lobby lists the names of the other founders who shared their commitment and who joined their ambitious mission, producing everything from light comedy to Shakespeare and opera.

Though the Barn is now only a memory, its rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.

Except in 1948 when located at the Pythian Temple, the Barn was home to Weathervane until 1951. Then the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and became a more accommodating 100-seat facility. In 1960, Weathervane hired its first professional director, Bob Belfance, who served until 1992. Along with long-time custodian/ticket office manager, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions and Weathervane existed on a lean budget. Ticket office receipts, along with donations and community support, helped Weathervane meet expenses and created a modest endowment fund. Volunteers still nourish all of Weathervane's activities.

In the mid-1960s, a fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263-seat facility which opened in 1970, one of the first enterprises at the head of the corridor into the Cuyahoga Valley National Recreation Area. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has since been paid off. Growing audience demand for live entertainment and theater education continues to underscore Weathervane's needs for increased community support.

In its nearly seven decades, Weathervane has constructed, torn down, recycled, painted and refitted stage settings for more than 500 productions (when Stage Two and Youth Theater productions are included). We've stitched up hundreds of costumes, created lighting magic by the multiwatt, crafted reality out of scores of stage properties and, most of all, shared the talents of well over a thousand amateur performers, who take their performance curtain calls to the applause of more than a hundred thousand theater goers. This effort is the result of volunteer dedication based on the founders' original philosophy that "all who can contribute are welcome."

Our volunteer archivist, Cue Fleming, has compiled the impressive list of productions back to 1935, a record of the dedication of those who have given their time to present each show to please the audiences who seek entertainment excellence each time the lights go up. Ticket Information

- * Tickets may be purchased by telephone when you call 330-836-2626 Tuesdays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. You may also purchase tickets in person during these hours. On performance Saturdays only, the Ticket Office is open from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The Ticket Office is also open one hour prior to all performances and remains open through the first intermission.
- * Telephone reservations must be charged to a Visa, MasterCard or Discover credit card. Reservations are also required when using coupons from your Weathervane Super Coupon book, complimentary tickets or coupons offered from any other cooperating arts organization. Please arrive at the Ticket Office at least 20 minutes before curtain time to pick up your tickets. Any unclaimed tickets will be released for sale to waiting ticket buyers five minutes prior to curtain at the discretion of the Ticket Office Manager and volunteers.
- ★ Special seating Please inform us if you have seating preferences, or require special attention due to visual, auditory or other physical needs. We'll do our best to accommodate you, but please remember orders are filled on a first-come, first-served basis with season subscribers and advanced group sales taking first priority.
- * Super Coupon holders are reminded that coupons do *not* ensure seats for a specific performance. Please call the box office early to reserve seats with these prepaid coupons.
- ★ Season Subscriber Exchange Please call the Ticket Office at 330-836-2626 if you wish to exchange your subscription seat for another performance of the same show. Exchanges must be phoned in at least 24 hours prior to your originally

- scheduled performance. We can't always guarantee the same seats but we'll give you the closest available replacements. An upgrade fee will be charged when changing subscription seats from the Preview Series to any other performance. If you cannot use your subscription seats, please call us at least 24 hours in advance to release them. We will recognize this as a donation to Weathervane.
- ★ Student Rush Tickets go on sale 30 minutes before curtain time allowing students with valid ID to purchase remaining tickets for half price on the night of performance, pending ticket availability. These tickets cannot be reserved in advance.
- * Complimentary Tickets for cast members and production volunteers require reservations and may be used only on designated performances. Complimentary tickets distributed to special donors also require reservations but may not be restricted to specific performances. Please let us know you wish to use a complimentary ticket when you telephone for a reservation.
- ★ Discounted Group Reservations are available for groups of 15 or more. Call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to learn how you can entertain friends, associates, or clients with a night at the theater or to plan a fund-raising event for larger groups. ★ Gift Certificates are available through

Members of this active group are invaluable as hostesses, office helpers and hard workers on backstage projects. The Women's Board sponsors an annual puppet presentation for children and also operates the Gift Boutique and art gallery as on-going fund sources.

Weathervane Women's Board welcomes new members who serve an apprenticeship allowing them to explore the full spectrum of Weathervane activities in which they may wish to participate. Youth Education

Weathervane's mission to provide children's theatrical education began with Junior Weathervane classes in 1937. The education program has continued to grow since then with workshops and classes, plus production opportunities for children. In the 2001-2002 season, we offer professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays at Weathervane. In addition, two-week workshops for children are planned throughout the summer months. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available for motivated students and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children from throughout the community may also audition for roles in Youth/Family productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides in our **Project STAGE** program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as three productions each season. This season,

Dracula, Seven Guitars and *Our Town* will be featured in the **Project STAGE** events. Tickets are only \$7.





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

Director's Notes

In late August, when we began this process of producing *Dracula*, our hope was to bring you a fun night of terror. Then, terror came to us, and Bram Stoker's unimaginable horror paled before the real thing. It was difficult to resume rehearsals following September 11. Would that our worst fear should be a bite on the neck!

Despite out stunned grief, we plodded on, and I began to notice how the world of the play took on a new shape in the face of these events. I could see in the characters images of the real people we hurried home to watch on the news following rehearsals. There was the incredulous Seward, who would not believe until he actually saw the terror with his own eyes. In John Harker I saw those courageous volunteers who hurried to the scene to help however they could. I found our country's leaders in the resolute, but cautious, Van Helsing and I was touched by Lucy's request for compassion and understanding, even as she suffered. I thought of those caught up in the web of terror as I watched the tortured, twisted Renfield. The flirting of the maid and attendant reminded me that the little wheels of life turn, even when the big wheels of history's momentous events grind on.

We decided to leave the reference to the Host in the play, even though many in the audience might not be acquainted with it as the representation of the Divine Presence. The Host alone, carried in a golden pyx, seemed adequate to convey the call we heard over and over again for prayers, for wisdom, strength, understanding and divine assistance in our resolve as a people to overcome its evil that had befallen us. And so the play became a metaphor — a friendly and comforting one reduced to manageable size — eight characters, one victim. And, in two hours' time, good does triumph! Maybe that is the secret of this story's staying power. Like all good art, it shows us something true about ourselves. It names our fears, gives them shape and helps us deal with them. We still wish you a fun night in the theater. *Penny Frese*

Book and Lyrics by Tom Jones Let the snow come. Let the weather chill your cheeks. What a time for love! Yes, it's true; this show began celebrating love in May, 1960 at New York's Sullivan Street Theatre. Year in, year out this whimsical little musical has continued reaching hearts, making The Fantasticks the virtual record-breaker in the number of performances seen by audiences including here when we were the first non-equity theater to stage it in 1961. The story is delightfully simple - how young love blooms though parents would try to hamper it, and how young love can wilt in the heat of reality before it can mature into true love. Its characters will treat you once again to Try to Remember, Soon It's Gonna Rain, and (the-ok-for-kids-over-12) Rape Ballet plus more delectable tunes to please and surprise you.



About the Play and Playwrights

Vampires have figured in superstition and written history for hundreds of years. They are beings who can change shape at will and who may require human blood for sustenance. Bound by a curse, they traditionally cannot be bound by earth and thus may never fully die or find eternal rest. Only when pierced by a stake to keep the body in its grave could the vampire be completely extinguished.

It was 1820 when a theatrical version of *The Vampyre* appeared in Paris and was later seen in New York and London. The novel Dracula by Bram Stoker did not appear until near the turn of the century. A native of Dublin (1847-1912) Stoker actually spent much of his life in England where he researched the life of the real-life Dracula who was born in Transylvania in 1431. The only stage dramatization of his novel appeared in 1897, almost immediately after the appearance of Stoker's book.

Hamilton Deane, the son of one of Stoker's friends at a London theater, obtained permission from Stoker's widow to write a new stage version which premiered in London in 1927, with nurses in the audience to administer to the faint-hearted. The play ran for 391 performances in theaters across England, often with Deane in the role of Van Helsing. For some 20 years he headed his own repertory company traveling the length and breadth of England. His adaptation of Stoker's novel was his only dramatic work.

Next to work on the *Dracula* script was playwright John Balderston (1891-1954) who was born in Philadelphia and served as a European correspondent for several American newspapers for several years. He changed the setting from Transylvania to England and the play opened at New York's Fulton Theatre on October 5, 1927 with Bela Lugosi in the title role. Running for 41 weeks, the play made him a star and led to his appearances in films. His association with the part lasted until his death at age 73 when he was buried in Dracula's black cape.

In the 1977-1978 season, Dracula returned to the New York scene with four different versions running at virtually the same time. At the off-Broadway Cherry Lane Theatre, a play called The Passion of Dracula was on stage following a three-part public television series. Frank Langella brought Dracula to life at the Martin Beck Theatre in 1977 for 925 performances. He also starred in the film version released in 1979 which featured Laurence Olivier as Van Helsing, Donald Pleasance as Dr. Seward and Kate Nelligan as Lucy.

In fact, you will be hard put not to find references to Dracula in film history and literature and even contemporary music. He even served as the model for the pop group KISS and you may find him on your children's breakfast table as Count Chocula cereal. With some 400 filmed versions, you may bring Dracula home to your tape or DVD player to prove that Dracula still lives (even Abbott and Costello met Dracula in a 1940s film) or you may peruse the library shelves for still other Dracula tales and other legends of the supernatural.

KARA B. WORKMAN (Miss Wells, the maid) is a welcome newcomer to Weathervane, commuting from Cleveland Heights to don cap and apron. She is a graduate of John Carroll University where she was active in its theater performances. Since then, she has performed at Huntington Playhouse as Claire in Rumors and also as Maria in Lend Me a Tenor. She was cast as Maggie in the same play when it was produced at Rabbit Run Theatre. She's also performed in Mystery Cafe productions and appeared in the Akron area in Magical Theatre's Speak Easy, Die Hard. Daytime work finds her as a Marketing Specialist for Key Bank and real life work finds her and her husband James enjoying the growing years of two-year old son Ross.

MARK D. STOFFER (Dr. Seward) has performed in a number of shows at North Canton Playhouse and we're glad he's taking this opportunity to appear on Weathervane's stage for the first time. Most recently, he was seen in All My Sons, The Nerd and The Sound of Music at North Canton Playhouse. As a founding member of the Heavenly Light Players, he has been involved in every production as an actor or director. Most recently, he appeared on stage in its productions of Cottonpatch Gospel and 1776. He and his wife Sherri live in Akron where he is the I.T. Manager for Matrix Management Solutions.

JERRY SCHABER (Abraham Van Helsing) discovered Weathervane just a couple of years ago when he played the infamous Bill Sykes in our production of Oliver! Prior to that, he'd been amassing credits with Stow Players and with the Five Pfennig Players, performing a variety of roles which have included everything from the Lion in Wizard of Oz to

King Arthur in Camelot and Captain Hook in Peter Pan. He lives in Fairlawn and works as a driver for NSK Industries. Note that the character's name, Abraham, was given to him by the playwright who was known to his friends as Bram (Stoker.) Jerry's interest in theater actually began when he was living in Germany. This show marks his 50th production. He's hoping to make it to 100!

COLIN J. COOK (John Harker) appeared in the cast of last season's Gross *Indecency...* and has spent a great deal of time at Weathervane as assistant technical director. He built some of his theatrical experience at Dobama in Cleveland Heights and also performed with Actors' Summit as the favorite beagle, Snoopy, in You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown, as Tom in A Child's Christmas in Wales and as Balthazar in Romeo and Juliet. He also discovered his singing voice in Cottonpatch Gospel. We're happy to have him not only in this cast but as a part of the Weathervane team.

JOE FRESE (Renfield) was also in the Gross Indecency... cast a year ago and began performing while studying computer engineering at Case Western Reserve University where he obtained his Bachelor of Science degree. He is now working in that field for Keithley Instruments and is living in Solon.

SCOTT SHRINER (Butterworth, the attendant) now gets to work on his own after appearing as one of the three ubiquitous Proteans in last season's closer A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum. Several seasons ago, Scott first appeared at Weathervane in Loot. He's also pleased Coach House Theatre audiences recently as Jerry in Betrayal and as Adam in Sunday in New York, for which he won the theatre's Royal Coach award

as Best Supporting Actor. Scott is the editor of the weekly newspaper The Twinsburg Bulletin.

JESSICA D. PIZER (Lucy Seward) appeared in Weathervane Youth Theatre's production of The Legend of Sleepy Hollow and has also been learning the backstage "ropes" running spotlight and handling other responsibilities. Her first Mainstage appearance came in To Kill a Mockingbird where she played Mayella Ewell. She was also active in Copley High School productions before heading for Miami University where she was a theatre major. She also takes dance classes and vocal lessons. This summer she toured with Thrall Theatre Company and is planning to resume studies leading to her BFA degree.

KYLE R. HUDSON (Dracula) is appearing (apt word for a supernatural being) for the first time at Weathervane. He lives in Canton and is a junior at Malone College where he played Oberon in A Midsummer Night's Dream earlier this year. We are pleased to welcome him.

VAUGHN G. AUSTIN (Production Stage Manager) Since 1980, the number of

Weathervane productions in which Vaughn has been involved keeps growing and growing. He has either stage managed or designed sound or lighting for as many as six shows per season capturing three Best Production Chanticleers and an equal number for best Sound Design along the way. He has, for many seasons, chaired the sound department on Weathervane's Production Board. In fact, with work on nearly 50 productions, he is reckoned as one of Weathervane's most active volunteers. Weathervane Business Office hours are from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday. To place ticket orders call the **Ticket Office** at **330-836-2626**. The ticket office hours are Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. During performances, the Ticket Office opens one hour before each performance and remains open through the first intermission only. On performance Saturdays only, the Ticket Office is open from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Ticket hours on performance Sundays begin at 1:30 p.m. Reservations may be made in person or by telephone with a credit card number.

Of course, rehearsals, set construction, classes and performance times often mean that staff and volunteers are likely to be available at other times than the hours noted during the week. For information, please call 330-836-2626. You may leave a voice mail message for a staff member, but we do not accept recorded ticket reservations. Meet the cast. It's a Weathervane tradition that, after most shows, many of the cast members may spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends from the audience. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.

Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteer hosts and host-esses. Please enjoy a cup with us. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome our audiences on the first Friday night of each production. We'll provide light snacks and refreshments after the show so you can share that "first-nighter" feeling.

For your sweet tooth, snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission. Refreshments are not permitted in the auditorium.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* Indians game? Weathervane has the same problem. Single-ticket buyers and subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). These subscription seats are held until intermission. This, additionally, makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

They've committed themselves to four to six weeks of rehearsals plus performance.

Many performers come to our shows with substantial theatrical experience. Others may be new to the stage. Frequently we find that talented newcomers to our area find that Weathervane is a great way to make new friends especially if they've been involved with community productions in their former home town.

Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for performance opportunities for ethnic minority actors and others who may be physically or mentally challenged. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent and sincerity of purpose.

To find out how you can get on stage, check the newspaper for audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330 836-2626 if you are interested in auditioning for a role in one of our upcoming productions or in a Youth

Theater production. We'll tell you about requirements.

Weathervane shows are never "precast." When you've been in a show or auditioned, your name will be included in our file so we can send you future audition notices. Some guest directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come pre-

pared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule ahead. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're

interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged. Come try again. The next show may suit you even better!



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
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
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




What Can You Do as a Weathervane Volunteer

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work night after night. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call our Production and Volunteer Coordinator, Maryanne Cotter, at 330-836-2323. Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A fulfilling responsibility for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- ★ Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. We appreciate all the help we can find to design and build sets, move them and tear them down after a show to make new ones.
- ★ Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We need skilled and even unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized. Add your design ideas or learn from other hard-working volunteers.
- ★ Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. You'll take pride in knowing that nobody can see the show without you.
- ★ Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural environment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system

for technical rehearsals and productions. We'll help you learn.

- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. We need many volunteers to work on each performance. If you are clever at building things or have friends with "neat stuff" they'll loan, volunteer here.
- ★ Box Office If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations.
- ★ Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, showing them to their seats, passing out programs, and serving refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- ★ House Manager The theater's unofficial representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.
- ★ Office Volunteer Put a few morning or afternoon hours to good use answering phones, taking reservations, helping with mailings, working with staff, and greeting customers and visitors. Many friendly people are needed to help.


