A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run as a live theater in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel Maclachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

Their first problem was money to pay the rent and to cover production costs. Money was in short supply in 1935 so the women chose a carnival as their fundraiser. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60 which encouraged them to continue. They named their space Weathervane after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Murial MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because there were fewer and fewer people willing to commit to directing a play, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. Belfance held the position from 1961-69 and again from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960's the membership planned, plotted and raised funds. It all came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon*. There was ample space and a mortgage. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Two major additions to the facility followed; these included firstfloor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. A former scene shop in 2005 became the John L. Dietz Studio/Theater/Classroom, where experimental productions are presented.

Weathervane Playhouse now looks forward to a third expansion and a 75th anniversary.

Director's Notes

Children of Eden is very dear to me for many reasons. I first directed it 10 years ago and, through that production, found my voice as a director. This is my third production and I can think of no other piece I would rather work on repeatedly. It is special. It is a story I can tell honestly from my heart. I know what it means to be a daughter. I know what it means to be a parent. I have four children: two step sons, a birth son and an adopted daughter. In addition, I love my students as my children, and so I have had the opportunity to experience parenthood on many levels. I treasure the spiritual journey that this show provides. I never tire of its lessons: "The hardest part of love is letting go." There is always "hope for second chances."

Another reason this particular show is important to me is because it brought me together with three people who have become part of my theatre family. My friend and colleague, Eric van Baars, choreographed the first two productions of *Children of Eden* and our work together in 1998 cemented a life-long friendship. I also met Melissa Fucci through that first production. She was the accompanist and assistant to the Musical Director. That meeting was the beginning of our collaboration and friendship. Most importantly was the service of Larry Hartzell as the Musical Director for the very first production and our resultant collaboration with Stephen Schwartz. Although I had not yet met Larry, nor seen his work, I was inspired by the stories I had heard about him. I asked him to join our team. It was one of the best decisions of my professional career. Larry was an inspiration not only as a musical director and a teacher but also as a friend, parent, colleague and child of God. He taught us all so much about music and faith and friendship. He shared his life and his stories about his family with us. He infused each of us with a faith and a hope that we could all "Begin Again."

Last winter Larry's Father "called him home" and we are all still suffering from the loss of his presence. But Larry's spirit continues. I hear him in the pauses of the music, in the laughter of the cast, in the rustling of the trees. I often think, "What would Larry tell me to do, see, reach for, in this production?" In answering those questions, I know that he continues to be an active force in my work and in my life. I am blessed with the opportunity to continue his legacy by passing on the lessons he instilled in me.

And so, with all my heart and soul, I dedicate this show that means so very much to me to Dr. Larry Hartzell with the hope and the prayer that our work is worthy of his spirit!

About the Musical and Playwright

About the Musical

Freely based on the Book of Genesis, Children of Eden renders the Old Testament stories into a joyous musical. In Act I, the stories of Adam and Eve and Cain and Abel take center stage. Act II tells the story of Noah and the flood. Children of Eden originated from a play named Family Tree, which was staged in 1986 at a Belleville, Ill., summer theater camp. Composer and lyricist Stephen Schwartz adapted this short play into a full-length musical he re-named Children of Eden. With a new book by director John Caird, the show's first major professional production came in January 1991, in London's West End. When the show closed only three months later, many observers blamed its short run on the Persian Gulf War, which curtailed international tourism. For several years thereafter, the show received numerous productions, both professional and amateur, throughout the United States – and meanwhile Schwartz continued to tinker with the show, adding songs and cutting others. In 1997, the Paper Mill Playhouse in New Millburn, N.J., mounted the show with Schwartz's revisions. This production finally "froze" all of the composer's changes, and this version has become the officially licensed version of the musical. Although never produced on Broadway, Children of Eden remains one of the most frequently produced musicals in Stephen Schwartz's repertoire.

About the Composer and Book Writer

Stephen Schwartz (music and lyrics) was born in 1948 in New York City, where he studied piano and composition at the Juilliard School of Music (while still in high school). Upon graduating with a drama degree from Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh in 1968, he returned to New York and worked as a producer for RCA Records. Soon, however, he began to focus his work toward Broadway. One of his first theatrical credits was the title song he composed for the 1969 comedy Butterflies Are Free. At one point in the 1970s, his musicals Godspell, Pippin and The Magic Show were all running on Broadway simultaneously. For Godspell, Schwartz won two Grammys and two Drama Desk Awards. For the musical Working, he contributed four songs and directed the production's original Broadway production, winning the 1978 Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Director of a Musical. Schwartz has also composed several songs for film. With Alan Menken, he collaborated on the scores for the Disney animated films *Pocahontas* and *The Hunchback of Notre Dame* and the DreamWorks animated feature The Prince of Egypt. His most recent musical, Wicked, has been playing on Broadway and on tour since the fall of 2003. With the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) Foundation, he runs musical theater workshops in New York and Los Angeles, serves on the ASCAP board and is also a member of the Council of the Dramatists' Guild.

John Caird (book), the English director of the 1991 London production of *Children of Eden*, also wrote the musical's book, giving shape and form to the Old Testament-inspired stories of Adam, Eve, Noah and the Flood. He is a freelance director, writer and lyricist who works in theater, musical theater and opera. He has directed several productions at the National Theatre in London. He is an honorary associate director of the Royal Shakespeare Company, where he has directed over 20 classic plays. Along with Trevor Nunn, he adapted and directed the long-running musical *Les Miserables* in both London and New York. He also directed the award-winning London and New York productions of *The Life and Adventures of Nicholas Nichleby*.



From Our Executive Director

"The Messiah is One of You"

This seems like an appropriate time to tell this story. With a nod to Benjamin Zander from his book, **The Art of Possibility**, I give you *The Monks' Story*:

A monastery has fallen on hard times. It was once part of a great order, but due to religious persecution in the 17th and 18th centuries, it had lost all its branches. In fact, there were only the Abbot and four other monks left in the mother house, all of whom were over 70. Clearly it was a dying order.

One day, the Abbot visited a nearby Rabbi to see if he could offer any advice that might save the monastery. The Rabbi commiserated saying, "I know how it is, the spirit has gone out of people." "Have you any advice that might save the monastery?" the Abbot asked. "No, I am sorry," the Rabbi replied, "I have no advice to give. The only thing I can tell you is that the Messiah is one of you."

The Abbot returned to the monastery downhearted and bewildered. The monks wondered to themselves what possible significance the Rabbi's words might have. Did he mean the Messiah is the Abbot who's been our leader for so long? Or did he mean Brother Thomas, who is a very holy man? Surely, he couldn't have meant Brother Phillip – he's too passive. But then he's always there when you need him. Or Brother Elrod – he's so crotchety. But then Elrod is very wise. Of course he didn't mean me – yet supposing he did?

As they contemplated in this manner, the old monks began to treat each other with extraordinary respect, on the off chance that one of them might be the Messiah. And on the off-off chance that each monk himself might be the Messiah, they began to treat themselves with extraordinary respect.

Because the monastery was situated in a beautiful forest, people often came to visit. When they did, they began to sense this aura of extraordinary respect that permeated the atmosphere. As a result, their visits became more and more frequent, eventually bringing friends, and their friends brought their friends. After a while, some of the younger men, drawn to this enormously positive energy, asked if they might join. Miraculously, within a few years, the monastery became a thriving order once again, and – thanks to the Rabbi's gift – a vibrant community of light and love.

About Our Creative Team

Terri Kent (AEA, AFTRA) -- Director/Choreographer

Terri has served eight seasons as Artistic Director of Porthouse Theatre. Last year she directed Anything Goes and The Music Man. In previous years she directed Jesus Christ Superstar, The Spitfire Grill, West Side Story, Godspell, Guys and Dolls, Oklahoma!, Brigadoon and Big River: The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn. She has been affiliated with Porthouse Theatre since 1983 and has performed in numerous productions including Dames at Sea, Quilters, Fiddler on the Roof, Twelfth Night and The Importance of Being Earnest. She is a member of AEA and AFTRA and has performed regionally and internationally as well. Ms. Kent has directed locally at Cain Park, the Halle Theatre and the Working Theatre. She has also served as Assistant Director and Movement Coach for a number of productions at Great Lakes Theater Festival. She is a Fulbright Professor and traveled to India in 1990 to direct and teach. She is a Professor in the School of Theatre and Dance at Kent State University, where she heads the musical theater program. This past season at KSU she directed *Urinetown*. 


