

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes to children and teens in acting, musical theatre, dance and technical theater. This year we are offering an all new class on podcasting! Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays, Tuesday evenings and Wednesday afternoons for home school students. Two-week Hands on Theatre (HOT) camps are offered throughout the summer as well as intensive one-week classes in musical theater and auditioning. * Capital Project The construction segment of the Capital Project in 2000 included a scene shop with basement storage, a 2nd-floor classroom and rehearsal hall, soundproof production booth, elevator and fly gallery pocket above the stage and installation of the rigging system for the fly gallery. Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.





Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951 when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as Playhouse director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Phillip Arnoult's production of Dark of the Moon. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a soundproof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the awardwinning The Laramie Project in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with Angels in America: Millennium Approaches in January 2005.



About the Play & Playwright

About the Play

Enchanted April opens in London in 1922. We meet two English housewives, Lotty Wilton and Rose Arnott. Bored by their humdrum lives and desperate to flee a cold and damp, mid-winter London, the two hatch a plan to rent a villa in Italy for the month of April. The women place a newspaper advertisement seeking two other women to split the cost and the notice attracts the attention of two women very much removed from their usual social realm -- Lady Caroline Bramble, a beautiful young socialite, and Mrs. Graves, an imposing dowager of great wealth and self-importance. In the play's second act, the women make their trip to Mezzago on the Italian coast. Here, under the restorative spell of wisteria and sunshine, the women welcome the exciting opportunity to relax and rediscover laughter, basking in the promise of spring.

Before it was a stage play, Enchanted April was a book. British writer Elizabeth von Arnim's 1922 novel, The Enchanted April, has spawned several adaptations for the stage and screen. In 1925, a three-act stage play adapted by Kane Campbell played for a month-long run at the Morosco Theatre in New York City. In 1935, fabled Hollywood studio RKO Radio Pictures brought the story to the silver screen with Frank Morgan (the future Wizard in *The Wizard of Oz*) as Mellersh. Sadly, the film became one of the studio's biggest failures that year. The 1992 British television adaptation proved to be much more successful, and it was released theatrically in the United States, where it grossed over \$13 million and was a certified "art-house" hit. With a cast including Miranda Richardson, Joan Plowright and Alfred Molina, the film earned three Academy Award nominations (for its costume design, its screenplay adaptation and for best supporting actress for Plowright). Locally, at its 1992 stint at the Cleveland International Film Festival, it won the audience-choice award for best film. The stage adaptation you are seeing today had its original production in 2000 at the Hartford Stage Company, a resident professional theater company in Connecticut. The show transferred to Broadway in the spring of 2003, where it played for a total of 143 performances and was nominated for a Tony Award for Best Play. The Broadway cast featured Elizabeth Ashley as Mrs. Graves and former 1980s-era "Brat Pack" movie star Molly Ringwald as Rose.

About the Playwright

Enchanted April is Matthew Barber's first play. He graduated from the University of California at Los Angeles with a degree in English. Before venturing into playwriting, he worked as an advertising writer and arts journalist. He also worked for several San Francisco-area theaters doing publicity and marketing. In 2000, he told Variety that he approached his stage adaptation of the 1922 novel "as a challenge...I've avoided seeing the English version (the 1992 film) as well as the American one (from 1935)." After Enchanted April opened on Broadway in 2003, the Outer Critics Circle awarded Barber the John Gassner Award (presented for an American play, preferably by a new playwright). He now lives in Los Angeles.

BOB BELFANCE (AEA, AFRTRA, SAG) is directing his 191st production at Weathervane. Last season he directed our production of Over the Tavern and, this past October, directed a well received production of Brooklyn Boy at the Shaw Jewish Community Center. Bob left Broadway for Akron in 1961. In New York, Lee Strasberg invited Bob, then a fledgling director, to become an observer at the famous Actors Studio. Alfred Drake, Howard da Silva, Alan Alda and his late father Robert, and Akron's Ray Wise are some of the many stars Bob has directed. When Bob became Weathervane's first professional Managing Director, he said his goal was to build a new state-of-the-art theater for Akron audiences. Bob was responsible for transforming Weathervane into one of Ohio's leading non-professional theaters. Bob, along with a host of dedicated volunteers, helped save the Loews movie theater, now the Akron Civic Theater, from the wrecker's ball. He once was heard to say, "Managing the Civic and Weathervane simultaneously was like Purgatory before death." Bob wrote, produced and directed several award-winning films for Omnibus Film Productions (he was one of 6 co-partners) and also owned and operated the Priscilla Beach Summer Theater. Bob has also served as a consultant to theaters and educational facilities. In 2002 Bob's life-long contribution to his art was recognized when he was inducted into the Ohio Community Theater Hall of Fame.

Directors Notes

The "war to end all wars" ended on November 11, 1918. The British army suffered over 2,000,000 casualties with over 707,000 killed and the rest suffering horrible wounds to body and mind. If one walked down the main street of any city or village in Britain, scores of physically and mentally maimed veterans were to be seen. The British lower class suffered the greatest number of casualties. From the upper class, the loss of potential political leaders, educators, artists, poets, etc., was incalculable. Enchanted April begins less than four years after the armistice. Some Britons still grieved deeply for a loved one lost. Enchanted April takes place in such a time, when the rich jived and the not-so-rich dreamed. Based on the novel by Elizabeth Von Arnim, Enchanted April can be described in one sentence - it takes place in the early 1920s when four London women, strangers, decide to rent a castle in Italy for the month of April. It is the correct description but it will not prepare you for the fact that Enchanted April -- an ultimate "feel-good" play -- is perfection of its genre. The play works like a spring tonic to make one realize what is important. The act of watching it is soothing. Enchanted April is what I call a growth play. Every character is different and better at the end and it's all because one woman (Lotty) knows that the place they have chosen is a "tub of love." The play is fresh, honest and truly timeless! The change in scenery, a month in Italy in April, facilitates each of the characters in shedding those conventions which stifle their growth and development. By the end of the story, each character not only becomes more fulfilled, but is able to relate their feelings to each other. The story is so filled with Spring and an overwhelming, dreamy sweetness, it almost preordains it. When I first read the play I found myself thinking that Lotty and Rose would crack if they did not find peace. Both Mrs. Graves and Lady Caroline are very fragile, lonely women who have known great loss and mask their pain with cold exteriors. Each character defines a traditional female stereotype: Lotty the eager-to-please wife, Rose the puritan, Mrs. Graves the hardened dowager, Lady Bramble the used-up party girl. For me, the essence of the play occurs in the moment when Mrs. Graves is successful in "pairing-up" Antony and Lady Bramble. It characterizes the hope that all the women had when they embarked on their journey - to love and be loved, to be happy with self, to be enchanted by life. Enchanted April is a tone poem, an impressionist painting, a masterpiece of conveying a message with few words. The true measure of any fictional piece of work is whether or not the characters grow from their experiences and emerge altered in some significant way. By that measure, Enchanted April is a resounding success. In short the play is, well, enchanting.

She is a graduate of Kent State University with a bachelor's in Russian language and Soviet/East European studies. She works as a chiropractic assistant at Fairlawn Family Chiropractic Center. She thanks her husband, Scott Custer, for all of his love and support.

HENRY BISHOP (Mellersh Wilton) has been around Weathervane for 20-some years. He has acted, sung, danced, run props and lights and sound for all sorts of different performances. He has worked with director Bob Belfance many times. In

fact, Bob directed Henry and fellow Enchanted April cast member Carol Belfance 20 years ago in the Weathervane production of Chicago. Henry has worked and played at other area theatre groups, including Ohio Shakespeare Festival, Coach House Theatre and Eileen Moushey's Mysteries by Moushey audience-participation murder mysteries. Henry and his wife, Karen L. Wood, live in Creston, in Wayne County.

EMILY WEST (Lady Caroline Bramble) is thrilled to be performing at Weathervane for a third time. Her previous performances here include Harper in Angels in America: Millennium Approaches and Hope in a staged reading of Down Under. Emily graduated from Kent State University with a bachelor of fine arts in acting. Her favorite roles include the aforementioned Harper, Mina Murray in Dracula, Rosannah Deluce in Brilliant Traces and the title role in Annie Get Your Gun. She works as an administrative assistant with eBlueprint in Cleveland.

AARON J. VEAL (Frederick Arnott) appears for the first time on the Weathervane stage since his appearances as Jacob in the Young Actors Series production of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat in 2003 and 2004. He has participated in several staged readings for Weathervane and also performed as one of the Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players for the Playhouse's Chanticleer Awards in 2005. Aaron received a bachelor of arts degree from Wright State University, where he performed as a cast member in the operetta La Perichole and was a member of the Men's Chorale. CAROL BELFANCE (Mrs. Graves)

earned the first of her four Chanticleers as Abigail Williams in The Crucible at Weathervane's previous home on Copley Road. At Weathervane's Merriman Valley location, some of her favorite roles include Dr. Livingston in Agnes of God, Blanche in A Streetcar Named Desire, Matron Momma Morton in Chicago, Sara Muller in A Watch on the Rhine, Delia in Bedroom Farce and both Maggie Cutler and Mrs. Stanley in two separate productions of *The* Man Who Came to Dinner. She also choreographed several musical revues at Weathervane and created its original adult acting workshop, which she taught for many years. Of the more than 150 productions in which Carol has appeared (both professional and community theatre), some of her other favorites include: Madame Arcati in Blithe Spirit, Lady Bracknell in The Importance of Being Earnest, Mame in Auntie Mame, and Melba Snyder ("Zip!") in Pal Joev with Arlene Dahl. 

Shortly after the final production of each season, Weathervane volunteers, subscribers and friends share an exciting awards show and party to acknowledge outstanding work by performers and technical volunteers. And, if you have seen all of the six Mainstage productions, you are eligible to be a judge!

The top performers, as chosen by the Chanticleer "judges," are awarded rooster statuettes -- "Chanticleers" -- in recognition of their work. It's a great night to get together and share in the fun and festivities. The Chanticleer Awards event is open to all.

Awards are presented for outstanding lead performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding lead performances in a musical, outstanding featured and sup-

porting performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding featured and supporting performances in a musical and outstanding achievement in sound design, lighting design, properties design and costume design. The final award of the Chanticleer evening goes to the Best Production of the season.

In addition to performance and technical awards, the event also recognizes the Top 25 outstanding volunteers of the season, who represent all the volunteers whose time and talents create the memorable theater experiences of every Weathervane season.

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! In addition, you receive complimentary tickets to see the shows plus the pride in knowing you are joining nearly 1 million volunteers nationwide to support community theater! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in selling tickets and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the Playhouse on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account. So, don't be discouraged and please audition again.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). This makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys other ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.


Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.




