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

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre, improvisation and design for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and Tuesdays evenings. Two-week Hands-on Theatre (H.O.T.) workshops are offered throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE© program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, Fences, All My Sons and Romeo &

Juliet will be featured in the Project STAGE© events, Tickets are \$8.

Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.



Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.



Women's Board

The Women's Board was formed in 1938 to "offer voluntary service and financial assistance to the Playhouse." Women's Board has energized youth education programs, sponsored productions, spearheaded fund raisers and paid for many of the amenities we appreciate in the Green Room/kitchen. Members of this active group are invaluable as hostesses, office helpers and backstage. The Women's Board sponsors an annual puppet presentation for children and also operates the Gift Boutique and Bank One Art Gallery.

About the Play & Playwright

The time of Fences is 1957. For blacks like Troy Maxson, living in the industrial North, social and economic equality is more a legal principle than a reality. And Troy Maxson is a free man, a descendant of slaves, a menial laborer, a father. His character embraces all the contradictions of being black, male and American in his time. As a youth he became a baseball star in the Negro Leagues, only to be kept from the majors by his age and race. Now, he is a trash collector who wonders why blacks aren't allowed to drive the garbage trucks. Every Friday night he comes home to his wife, Rose, and drinks his frustrations away. Because of the hurt he endured, he refuses to allow his son, Cory, to play sports. Troy struggles with the rage of a defeated human, taking out his anger on those he loves most while, at the same time, revealing the majesty and awesome imperfections of a man determined to find some dignity in life.

August Wilson died on August 2, 2005 at the age of 60 of liver cancer. Though he died in Seattle, he was born and raised in Pittsburgh and his gritty plays portray the African-American experience there in the 20th century. His goal was to write a play for each decade of the past 100 years, a goal he achieved before his death. The cycle began with Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, which opened on Broadway in 1984 and explored the role of the black artist in a 1920s white-dominated society. Next was Fences (written in 1987) which was set in the 1950s, ran 525 performances and garnered four Tony Awards and a Pulitzer Prize. Joe Turner's Come and Gone (written in 1988) takes place in 1910. The Piano Lesson (written in 1990), which occurs in 1930, was filmed for television and Wilson's second Pulitzer Prize winner. Two Trains Running (written in 1992), chronicles the social upheavals of the Civil Rights movement in the 1960s. Seven Guitars (written in 1996) takes place in the 1940s, King Hedley II (written in 1999) follows the characters of Seven Guitars into the 1980s. Jitney (written in 2000) takes place in a 1970s service garage. Gem of the Ocean (written in 2004), the beginning play in the cycle set in the 1900s, deals with Aunt Ester, a mystical matriarch mentioned in several of the other plays. Radio Golf, set in the 1990s, had productions at the Yale Repertory Theater and in Los Angeles just before Wilson's death. All told, Wilson's plays received seven awards from the New York Drama Critics Circle, two Pulitzer Prizes, a Tony award and six Tony nominations, two Drama Desk Awards and numerous other citations. One critic called his plays "the most audacious, noblest achievements in the American theater."

Terrence Spivey is a native of Kountze, TX and received his B.A. degree in Theater Arts at Prairie View A&M University. While he was a student, the theater department made history as the first black college to perform at the Kennedy Center during the American College Theater Festival. He lived in New York twenty years, appearing in numerous off-Broadway shows, music videos and indie films; his directorial debut was at Crossroads Theatre. He was a Theodore Ward Prize finalist for his play, Smokestack Lighting. Spivey was invited to Karamu as guest director in spring 2003 to direct Carlyle Brown's The Little Tommy Parker Celebrated Colored Minstrel Show. Accepting the position of Karamu Artistic Director, he moved to Cleveland and directed the Midwest premiere of Thomas Gibbons' Bee luther-hatchee during the 2003-2004 season. The Cleveland Plain Dealer said, "You want to run down the street and twist people's armscome see it." Angle Magazine said, "Spivey took the literary arguments of Thomas Gibbons' play of ideas and launched it into the deeper metaphor of dreams and longing. One of the best plays of the season." He opened the 2004-2005 season directing For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide/When the Rainbow Is Enuf by Ntozake Shange. Tony Brown of the Plain Dealer wrote, "Glory Be, Karamu, the oldest black theater in the country, has returned to its rightful place as one of the most exciting venues in Cleveland." Spivey also directed the Ohio premiere of Dennis McIntyre's Split Second.

In 2005 Spivey was nominated by Cleveland Theater Collective for "reinvigorating Karamu." At Karamu he will direct the Cleveland premiere of Thomas Gibbons' *Permanent Collection* in February. Other shows will include the Cleveland premiere of *The Trial of the One Short-Sighted Black Woman vs. Mammie Louise and Safreta Mae*; *Black Nativity*; the Ohio premiere of August Wilson's *King Hedley II*; the world premiere of *A Colored Funeral* and Otis Sallid's *Gospel! Gospel! Gospel!*

Director's Notes

I am delighted to be here at Weathervane. What better way to initiate someone than by inviting them to direct an August Wilson play. A master of language. A master of storytelling. Turning the African-American slice of life full of trials and tribulations, joys and strifes, into a poetic monument of ten 20th century cycle plays. Mr. Wilson was able to accomplish a feat that no other playwright has done, thought of or tried to do. With the exception of playwright Ed Bullins, one of the greats during the Black Arts Movement, who also worked on a cycle, Wilson took the baton and went a different direction - one play per decade. While staying in New York, I had one of my greatest theatre moments when I first saw Fences with James Earl Jones, Mary Alice, Frankie Faison, an upcoming Courtney B. Vance and the late Charles Brown (as Lyons), a Clevelander and Karamu House alum on Broadway. It was magic that night in the Big Apple. I would like to thank Elynmarie Kazle for inviting me to this wonderful theatre. The staff have been very helpful, courteous and professional. I thank Jerry Dorton and Marcus Bentley for their creative input. Scott Ferrall, Jerry Mirman Jr., Casey Jones, Jennifer Klika, Mary Miller-Sobah and Kathy Kohl for their time and vision. To the cast: Layne Farr, Carlos Rush, J.C. Patterson, Raymone Scott, Christopher Henderson, Jasmine Moore, and especially, Abdullah Bey and his family, for their strength. 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

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- *Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- ❖ Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- *Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.


Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.







Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.


Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on Main Stage first Friday performances. We provide light refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.
