



* Capital Project The construction segment of the Capital Project in 2000 included a scene shop with basement storage, a 2nd-floor classroom and rehearsal hall, soundproof production booth, elevator and fly gallery pocket above the stage and installation of the rigging system for the fly gallery. Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.





Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as Playhouse director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Phillip Arnoult's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.



About the Musicals and Authors

Go, Dog. Go!

P.D. Eastman's classic children's book comes to life on stage in an exploration of movement, color and space. The dogs delve into life with gusto, creating a visual spectacle for the audience to feast upon. They snorkel. They howl at the moon. They ride a Ferris Wheel. They sing, dance and climb trees. A rollicking free-for-all of chicanine-ery, *Go, Dog. Go!* presents a big and little musical world of doggy fun - like a pop-up book that comes to life!

Author **Philip Dey Eastman** (1909-1986) published *Go, Dog. Go!* in 1961. Eastman grew up in Massachusetts and graduated from Amherst College in 1933 and continued his studies at the National Academy of Design in New York City. Eastman worked in the story department of Walt Disney Productions from 1936 to 1941, after which he spent two years in the same department for Warner Bros. Cartoons. Eastman's other books for children include *Are You My Mother?* and *Big Dog.*.. *Little Dog*.

Playwright **Allison Gregory's** plays have been commissioned by South Coast Repertory, ACT (A Contemporary Theatre) in Seattle, and A.S.K. Theater Projects in Los Angeles. One of her other plays for young audiences, *Even Steven Goes to War*, was featured as part of the Kennedy Center New Visions/New Voices series in Washington, D.C. She lives in Seattle and Austin, Texas, with her husband and *Go, Dog. Go!* collaborator, Steven Dietz, and her children, Ruby and Abraham.

Playwright **Steven Dietz's** 20-plus plays have been produced at regional theaters across America since the early 1980s. He is a two-time winner of the Kennedy Center Fund for New American Plays Award. His play, *Lonely Planet*, won the PEN USA West Award in Drama.

Composer **Michael Koerner** makes his home in Minneapolis where, since 1983, he has composed and served as musical director of nearly two dozen productions at the city's Children's Theatre Company. For the city's Theatre de la Jeune Lune (which recently ceased operations after 30 years of theatrical production), he created compositions and musical directed 25 productions.

AristoCats Kids

A beloved, pampered housecat named Duchess sits in the lap of luxury. It's 1910 in Paris, and Duchess revels in her role as the spoiled and treasured pet of a former opera star named Madame -- knowing that one day she will inherit Madame's small fortune. Madame's jealous butler, Edgar, has other plans in mind, however, and he "catnaps" Madame's beloved AristoCat (and her AristoKittens!) and dumps them in the backwoods, far from the City of Lights. As Duchess and her kittens try to re-unite with Madame, how will they evade Edgar's evil plans? With a little help from a scrappy alley cat named Thomas O'Malley and his plucky animal accomplices, Duchess and her kittens learn why "Ev'rybody Wants to Be a Cat."

This stage adaptation of the 1970 Walt Disney animated film *The Aristocats* is part of Music Theatre International's KIDS Collection, which turns beloved Broadway musicals and animated films into abridged versions, keeping each show's running time to 30 to 40 minutes. In addition, MTI's Kids Collection takes each show's songs and transposes them into keys suitable for young voices. *continued*...

Composers Richard M. Sherman (born in 1928) and Robert B. Sherman (born in 1925) may rank as the most prolific songwriting team in motion-picture history. For *The* AristoCats, the Sherman Brothers wrote the title song, "Scales and Arpeggios" and "She Never Felt Alone." Their other musical compositions are familiar to audiences who've seen Mary Poppins, The Jungle Book, Bedknobs & Broomsticks, Snoopy Come Home, Charlotte's Web, The Parent Trap and Chitty Chitty, Bang Bang.

Composers Floyd Huddleston (1918-1991) and Al Rinker (1907-1982) are the songwriting team behind "Ev'rybody Wants To Be A Cat." Huddleston's other songs include "Highway to Love" and "You Can't Do Wrong Doin' Right." He was married to Nancy Adams, who sang the Academy Award-nominated song, "Love," in Walt Disney's 1973 animated feature, Robin Hood. Rinker started performing with Bing Crosby in 1925 and the two singers formed the Rhythm Boys. He wrote the lyrics for Huddleston's song, "You Can't Do Wrong Doin' Right," which appeared in the 1952 Tom and Jerry cartoon. Push-Button Kitty.

Terry Gilkyson (1916-1999) wrote "Thomas O'Malley Cat" for The AristoCats. He was also a folk singer with his group, the Easy Riders. He composed the Oscar-nominated song, "The Bare Necessities," for Walt Disney's 1967 animated feature, The Jungle Book.

Bryan Louiselle (who adapted, arranged and added additional music and lyrics for this show) most recently performed the same task for the stage adaptation of Disney's High School Musical. For film, he has composed music for Sacred Space, Saints and Strangers and Prisoners of Hope. His other stage credits include The Radio City Music Hall Christmas Spectacular and Simon Gray's The Late Middle Classes for the Williamstown Theatre Festival in Massachusetts.

CAITLIN "CAITIE" MCNEAL (Madame), a seventh-grader at Akron's Miller



Frank Bell White, 75, has been quietly painting for the past 50-plus years. His cousin, La Jauna Thurman, a legal secretary at a law firm in Cleveland, has taken on the role of his champion and art dealer. White moved to Akron from Shreveport, Louisiana, in childhood. He was with Akron General Medical Center most of his adult life, where he was assistant manager of housekeeping for 23 years. He's always been interested in art, and started drawing while a student at South High School, although he has never taken any formal art classes. White did most of his sketching while convalescing from a leg wound he got while serving in the Korean War. He didn't start painting until later.

White is interested in history, from the 1920s to the present. He's interested in sharecroppers, cowboys, his religion and his guitar, which he plays at Sunday services at his church, St. Ashworth's Temple on Vernon Odom Boulevard. These interests are reflected in his paintings, which may begin as copies or memory pictures of illustrations he finds in books, comic books, movie posters and so on. His works also come from his own experience and what he calls "country pictures" of houses and locations he has seen in drives through area farmlands and other rural locations. He prefers to work in acrylic, which, he says, "is easier to use than oil paints."

Several paintings in the collection were done specifically for our recent production of *Ragtime*. This is the first time Weathervane has had any paintings done specifically for a show. The freshness and immediacy of his style are quite appealing.





Each month, we acknowledge the outstanding Volunteers of the Month in our lobby, but those volunteers represent all who commit their time and interest to create a great theater experience for everyone who's come to see this show.

If you have friends or relatives who volunteer generously at Weathervane, we hope you'll take a moment to thank them for their help and their support of the cultural enrichment of our community. Better yet, join them! Call us and we'll help you win your own share of the applause for a "jolly good show," an experience that offers life-enriching opportunities for all involved.

Share the Annual Chanticleer Celebration

Let's talk Chanticleer! Shortly after the final production of each season, Weathervane volunteers, subscribers and friends share an exciting awards show and party to acknowledge outstanding work by performers and technical volunteers. And, if you have seen all of the six Mainstage productions, you are eligible to be a judge!

The top performers, as chosen by the Chanticleer "judges," are awarded rooster statuettes -- "Chanticleers" -- in recognition of their work. It's a great night to get together and share in the fun and festivities. The Chanticleer Awards event is open to all.

Awards are presented for outstanding lead performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding lead performances in a musical, outstanding featured and supporting performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding featured and supporting performances in a musical and outstanding achievement in sound design, lighting design, properties design and costume design. The final award of the Chanticleer evening goes to the Best Production of the season.

In addition to performance and technical awards, the event also recognizes the Top 25 outstanding volunteers of the season, who represent all the volunteers whose time and talents create the memorable theater experiences of every Weathervane season.

We welcome you to take part in the biggest nail-biting party of the year. Make sure to pick up your ballot at the end of the season and join us!



Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! In addition, you receive complimentary tickets to see the shows plus the pride in knowing you are joining nearly 1 million volunteers nationwide to support community theater! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- **❖ Sound** Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in selling tickets and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the Playhouse on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account. So, don't be discouraged and please audition again.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a sold out sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are promising to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). This makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really sold out and annoys other ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

Subscribers: Please call the Ticket Office at 836-2626 if you will not make your ticketed performance. Thank you.






