

A BRIEF HISTORY OF WEATHERVANE PLAYHOUSE

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members – Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch – and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 82nd Season.

Fearsome and Friendly Aliens

Since "Audrey", the man-eating plant in our production of *Little Shop of Horrors* turns out to be an alien, I thought it would be fun to feature an exhibit, of aliens as created by artists who were featured in two of last season's exhibits.

First, Robert A. Kraus, who was our gallery artist for *Dracula* last season. Robert is the owner/creator of the independent company, RAK Graphics. He graduated in 1977 from Central Hower High School, where he participated in the vocational Commercial Arts program. Robert attended The University of Akron briefly before creating his self-published graphic novel character "Chakran, The Forever Man". This character was later made into a Sega Genesis Video Game in the mid 90's. He was one of the first independent Comic Book and Game Publishers and the sole designer and fantasy artist of the board game "Dragon War" and the hundreds of expansions to go with it. This is a game that is never played the same way twice. Robert is the creator of RAK Attack Monsters, a toy line of game pieces, display and collectible 3D artworks. He has a large offering of "Superfreeks" a super-hero spoof series. Robert is involved in several Comic Cons throughout the year, including San Diego Comic Con – "The Mother of all Comic Cons" and several Wizard World Cons. He enjoys meeting and talking to his fans and will even host a "Dragon War" Game night at his home a few times a year. When his fans ask him if he likes what he does, his famous saying is, "Of course....how many people do you know that get to scribble for a living?" Visit www.rakgraphics.com to see all his work.

Second, Scott Alan Evans, who was one of our gallery artists for *Vanya and Sonia and Masha and Spike* in the spring. He works in several mediums including paint, photography and digital art. His themes often focus on a collective mix of nature, mythology, supernatural, science fiction and fantasy elements. Scott is a resident artist at Studio 2091 Mothersbaugh Studios in Cuyahoga Falls. His work has been shown in galleries in over 50 exhibitions throughout Northeast Ohio. Scott contributed the "Dragon Horse" for the St. Clair Superior "Year of the Horse" public art project in Cleveland. "Elementals", an exhibition of mythological works was displayed at Studio 2091. In 2015, he created several works for Dr. Sketchy's "Grimm's Fairy Tale Show" held at Studio 2091 and later at Nine Muses Gallery in Cleveland. Scott also curated the Studio 2091 Tarot Deck and Art Show, gathering together 78 artists from throughout the United States as well as Ireland and France, completing an entire Tarot deck. In early 2016, he brought his "Mythography" show to the Merging Hearts Holistic Center in Canton.

ABOUT THE SHOW

The meek floral assistant Seymour Krelborn stumbles across a new breed of plant he names "Audrey II" — after his coworker crush. This foul-mouthed, R&B-singing carnivore promises unending fame and fortune to the down-andout Krelborn as long as he keeps feeding it BLOOD! Over time, though, Seymour discovers Audrey II's out-of-this-world origins and intent towards global domination! A deviously delicious Broadway and Hollywood sci-fi smash musical, Little Shop Of Horrors has devoured the hearts of theatre goers for over 30 years. Howard Ashman and Alan Menken (Disney's The Little Mermaid, Beauty and the Beast and Aladdin) are the creative geniuses behind what has become one of the most popular shows in the world.

Little Shop of Horrors premiered in New York City on May 6, 1982 at the "off-Off-Broadway" Workshop of the Players' Art Theatre. It then opened Off-Broadway at the Orpheum Theatre in New York City's East Village on July 27 of the same year. The production was directed by book writer and lyricist Howard Ashman and starred Canton, Ohio native Lee Wilkof as Seymour, Ellen Greene as Audrey and Ron Taylor as Mr. Mushnik. It closed on Nov. 1, 1987 with 2,209 performances under its belt. When propositioned for a Broadway transfer, Ashman elected not to, claiming the show was perfect for where it was. The musical also had its West End premiere at the Comedy Theatre, produced by Cameron Mackintosh. It ran for 813 performances from Jan. 1, 1983 to Oct. 5, 1985 and starred Barry James and Ellen Greene (reprising her role from New York). A film version followed in 1986 with Rick Moranis playing Seymour, Ellen Greene reprising her role as Audrey, and Steve Martin wielding his dental drill as the sadistic dentist Orin. A Broadway revival of the show opened in August of 2003 and played for 372 performances.

Weathervane Playhouse first produced *Little Shop of Horrors* in 1999; the production was directed by Jacqi Loewy.

HOWARD ASHMAN (book and lyrics) was a native of Baltimore who grew up loving theater. In 1974, after graduating from Goddard College in Vermont and receiving his MFA from Indiana University — where he was also a member of the professional acting company — Ashman moved to New York. In 1976, his play, The Confirmation, was produced at Princeton's McCarter Theater. A founder of the WPA Theater, Ashman was also its artistic director. At the WPA, he conceived, wrote and directed a musical adaptation of Kurt Vonnegut's God Bless You, Mr. Rosewater with music by Alan Menken. In 1982 he conceived, wrote and directed Little Shop of Horrors, again with music by Menken. The musical, based upon Roger Corman's 1960 horror flick, was immediately successful. Indeed, it soon became a New York "must see" playing for five years Off-Broadway at the Orpheum Theater in lower Manhattan. The show played in Los Angeles and London's West End, Japan, Scandinavia and Europe and continues to be produced to great acclaim around the world. In 2003, Little Shop of Horrors was revived on Broadway and in 2007 it was revived on London's West End. It is currently one of the most-produced shows in American high schools.

In 1986, Ashman wrote and directed the Broadway musical, Smile, which featured music by Marvin Hamlisch. Little appreciated at the time, Smile is now considered a lost gem of musical theater and is performed by high schools and amateur groups around the United States. Turning his talents toward film, Ashman was pivotal in the renaissance of the Walt Disney Company's animated musicals and in the development of Disney's The Little Mermaid (producer and lyrics), Beauty and the Beast (executive producer and lyrics) and Aladdin (lyrics), all with music by Alan Menken. Ashman's contributions to the revival of classic Disney animated musicals were perhaps best expressed by his colleagues, who dedicated the film Beauty and the Beast to his memory: "To our friend Howard, who gave a mermaid her voice and a beast his soul. He will be forever missed." Ashman's numerous awards include two Oscars, two Golden Globes, four Grammys, a Drama Desk and a London Evening Standard. He died in 1991 at age 40 from complications arising from AIDS.

ALAN MENKEN (music) has composed some of the most beloved songs and musical scores of our time. His work has introduced an entire generation to the world of musicals, on the stage and on the screen. Born in 1949, he grew up as a child of the 1960s, dreaming of a career as a singer-songwriter, while assuming he'd become a dentist like most of the other men in his family. While enjoying a spectacularly unsuccessful stint as a pre-med student at New York University, he was introduced to the BMI Musical Theater Workshop, run by the great conductor, Lehman Engel. There, Menken found his calling as a musical theater composer-lyricist. Along with performing on the New York cabaret circuit and writing and producing commercial jingles and Sesame Street songs, some of the musicals and revues that Menken wrote songs for in this period include Atina: Evil Queen of the Galaxy, Real Life Funnies, Patch Patch Patch, Personals, Diamonds, Kicks and The Apprenticeship of Duddy Kravitz. His first collaboration with Howard Ashman — God Bless You, Mr. Rosewater — opened in 1979 to excellent reviews and modest box office. In 1982, their next musical, Little Shop of Horrors, became the highest grossing Off-Broadway show ever, toured the world, won countless theater awards and resulted in a movie musical that earned Menken his first Oscar nomination for the song "Mean Green Mother from Outer Space."

On the strength of the success of Little Shop of Horrors, Menken and Ashman were hired to write the songs for the 1989 Walt Disney animated feature The Little Mermaid, for which Menken also wrote the score. The result was an Academy Award for the song "Under the Sea," a nomination for "Kiss the Girl," and the Academy Award for Best Score. Beauty and the Beast followed in 1991, earning Menken two more Oscars for best song ("Beauty and the Beast") and best score, with two other songs ("Be Our Guest" and "Belle") nominated. After Ashman died in 1991, and with the forthcoming Aladdin not yet completed, Menken began his collaboration with Tim Rice, to complete the movie's remaining songs. Together, Menken and Rice won the Best Song Oscar and the Song of the Year Grammy for "A Whole New World," which also reached No. 1 on the Billboard charts. Menken also won

the Best Score Oscar again; and "Friend Like Me," written with Ashman, received a nomination as well. Menken's live-action film musical, Newsięs, with lyrics by Jack Feldman, was released in 1992. Three more animated Disney musicals followed between 1994 and 1997 — Pocahontas and The Hunchback of Notre Dame (with lyrics by Stephen Schwartz) and Hercules (with lyrics by David Zippel) — with two more Academy Awards, for best song ("Colors of the Wind") and for best score (Pocahontas), and two more nominations, for best score (The Hunchback of Notre Dame) and best song ("Go the Distance").

The success of the animated musicals lead Menken back to Broadway with the stage musical of Beauty and the Beast, which ran for 13 years, and Madison Square Garden's A Christmas Carol: The Musical, which ran for 10 seasons. Menken and Rice's oratorio, King David was the premiere production at the newly renovated New Amsterdam Theater in 1997. That same year, Menken returned to his Off-Broadway roots with a science-fiction musical at the WPA Theater, Weird Romance (lyrics by David Spencer). A stage adaptation of The Hunchback of Notre Dame opened in 1999 in Berlin. In 2002, Alan Menken's seventh Disney animated musical, Home on the Range, opened. And in 2007, Menken wrote the score and reunited with Stephen Schwartz to write the songs for Enchanted, earning three more Oscar nominations for "Happy Working Song," "That's How You Know" and "So Close." In recent years, his Broadway credits include the songs for The Little Mermaid (2008), Sister Act (2011), Newsies (2012), Leap of Faith (2012) and Aladdin (2014). Among his many awards and honors, he has won eight Oscars, five Grammys, four Golden Globes, one Tony, and has received multiple nominations from the Drama Desk, the Outer Critics Circle, the New York Drama Critics' Circle, the Olivier Awards and the Drama League. He has been inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame and holds honorary doctorates from New York University and the University of North Carolina School of the Arts.
