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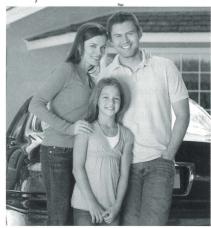
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## A BRIEF HISTORY OF WEATHERVANE PLAYHOUSE

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members – Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch – and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/ Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75<sup>th</sup> season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 83<sup>rd</sup> season.

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Dolores "Dee" Parker Morgan

Local and Internationally Acclaimed Jazz Vocalist

Dolores "Dee" Parker Morgan and Billie Holiday had one thing in common. Both were internationally acclaimed jazz vocalists. Fortunately, unlike Billie, Dee Morgan was not troubled by the demons that beset Ms. Holiday.

I thought a tribute to Dee would complement the current production, *Lady Day at Emerson's Bar and Grill* and would also illustrate that talent and fame don't always lead to devastating consequences.

Now, 98 years old and retired, Delores "Dee" Parker Morgan is an exquisitely beautiful, exceptionally talented jazz singer who has been living and performing in Northeast Ohio since she moved here in the late 1950's. This was after her marriage to E. Gates Morgan, MD, the first African-American president of the Summit County Medical Society and had a very distinguished career in medicine.

Her early professional career included singing with the Fletcher Henderson Band, with Earl "Fatha" Hines, and most importantly, the brilliant Duke Ellington. In 1993, Dee was honored by the Smithsonian Museum of American History as one of the five surviving female vocalists of the Duke Ellington Orchestra.

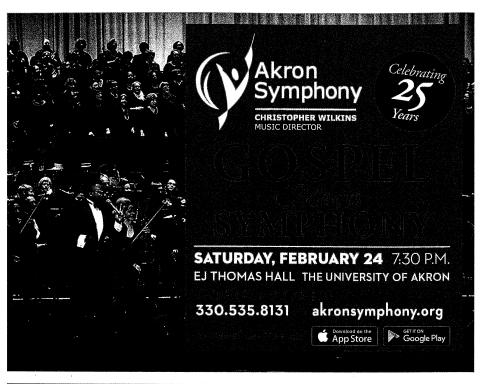
She also performed at the famous Apollo Theatre, had engagements in London, England, Glasgow, Scotland, Paris, France, and worked with Nat "King" Cole. Dee also hosted a nightly radio talk show and disc-jockey broadcast from the Palm Cafe in New York, and appeared in movies and stage productions. On a personal note, my late husband, Roland Paolucci, had her perform with the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra on several occasions when he was their musical director. He also accompanied her in other performances and venues.

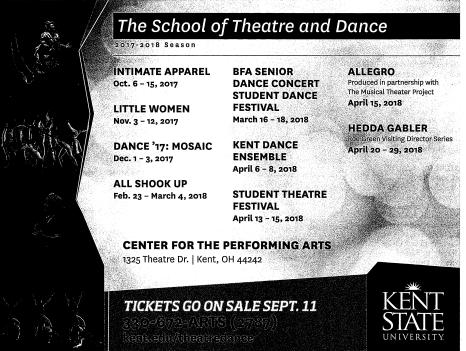
Before marrying Dr. Gates Morgan, Dee was briefly engaged to the famous prize fighter, Joe Louis.

After moving here, she did not perform on a full-time basis. She turned her attention to family and to civic volunteerism. Her daughter is now Dr. Melodie Morgan-Minot, a psychiatrist, married to Dr. Howard Minot, a urologist. Over the years, Dolores has contributed her time, talent and energy to, among others, the Akron Symphony, the Akron Art Museum, Ohio Ballet, E.J. Thomas Hall, the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, and the Visiting Nurse Association. She also served as President of the Medical Auxiliary of the Summit County Medical Society, the Cascade Locks Parks Association and The Dolores Parker Morgan Endowment for the School of Music at Kent State University.

I have tried to include as much material as possible to give everyone a sense of the scope of this remarkable woman's life. She is to be treasured by us all.

Dr. Lanie Douglas Robertson is an American playwright, actor, and educator. Born in Knoxville, Iowa in 1936, Robertson attended the University of Kansas in Lawrence, Kansas from 1955 to 1957. He attended the Gene Frankel Theatre Workshop from 1959 to 1963 before receiving his M.A. from Temple University in 1969. His first production, *The Runneth Over Cup*, was produced at the University of Kansas during his attendance there in 1957. Many of his plays were produced in Philadelphia, where he also taught literature and play-writing at the Philadelphia College of Art during the 1970s.

Robertson has written over 30 plays for regional and Off-Broadway theater. The subject matter of his work reflects his interest in historical figures and history in general. The Insanity of Mary Girard (1976), Lady Day at Emerson's Bar and Grill (1984), Nasty Little Secrets (1985), Alfred Stieglitz Loves O'Keefe (1988), and Nobody Lonesome for Me (1995) are among his better-known works. His plays have been produced in New York, Chicago, and Philadelphia, and in towns in Virginia, Alaska, and Maine. Internationally, his work has been produced in Canada, England, France, Australia, and Japan.

As of 2009, Robertson has worked for Abram's Artists Agency.

### SETTING

**PLACE:** The action of the play transpires in a small bar in south Philadelphia. Although the bar is presently closed and abandoned, the building still stands on the corner of Fiftieth & Bainbridge Streets.

**TIME:** The time of the play is about midnight of a night in March, 1959. There is no passage of time except that of the performance. It is obviously late in the evening, and it is equally late in Billie Holiday's life. Four months from now she will die of cirrhosis and heart failure in a hospital in Harlem on Friday, 17 July 1959.

The show will be performed without an intermission.

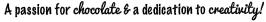

Spivey was artistic director of Karamu House for over twelve years (2003-2016). During his artistic administration, Spivey programmed over 70-plus productions and directed over twenty five, winning numerous awards for the historical institution. His notable works as director were the Thomas Gibbon trilogy Beeluther-hatchee, Permanent Collection, A House With No Walls, Ntozaka Shange's for colored girls who considered suicide when the rainbow is enuf, Gavin Lawrence Cut Flowers, Alice Walker's The Color Purple, August Wilson's Joe Turners's Come and Gone, Spivey's adaptation of James Weldon Johnson's God's Trombones, Jean Genet's The Blacks, and The Wiz just to name a few. He also directed and collaborated with numerous theatres and festivals throughout Northeast Ohio; Wilson's Fences at Weathervane Playhouse, and Howard Sackler's The Great White Hope at Karamu/Ensemble Theatre/Weathervane, Anthol Fugard's, Master Harold and the Boys at CSU and God's Trombones at Akron Civic Theatre. He served as Director in Residence for Kent State Pan African Studies during the 2013-2014 season directing John Henry Redwood's No Niggers, No Jews, No Dogs and for colored girls.... Since his departure from Karamu in 2016, he directed one of The Plain Dealer's 2016 Top 10 plays, Robert O' Hara's Bootycandy at convergencecontinuum, the award winning, nationally acclaimed Objectively/Reasonable: A Community Response to the Shooting of Tamir Rice, 11/22/14 at Playwrights Local, the world premiere of Peter Lawson Jones' The Bloodless Jungle at Ensemble Theatre, and Kia Corthron's Breathe, Boom at John Carroll University, Wilson's Radio Golf at Ensemble and Brandon Jacobs-Jenkins' Neighbors at convergence-continuum. He directed readings of Wilson's autobiographical How I Learned What I Learned and the first four plays of Wilson's American Century Cycle at Shore courtesy of the Wilson Estate. His next directing project will be the Ohio Premiere of Dael Orlandersmith's solo piece Black and Blue

Boys/Broken Men presented by Powerful Long Ladder and Holy Trinity in March. Spivey has appeared in Cleveland Magazine, Black Mask, BackStage, Ebony, Artist and Influences and American Theatre. He served as board member for Community Partnership for Arts and Culture and Cleveland Arts Prize. He is on the advisory board for Borderlight Festival and convergence-continuum in Cleveland, board member for AUDELCO in NYC, a member of Black Theatre Network and an elected member of National Theatre Conference. In 2011. He was given a proclamation by the Mayor and the City of Cleveland for his artistic contributions. Karamu was honored the 2013 AUDELCO Award for Repertory Company of the Year. He was recently selected as Cleveland Scene's Best Director for 2017. Spivey is excited to be back again with the Weathervane family in bringing one our most iconic and influential figures of the 20th century to the stage. "Thank you, Melanie."
