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
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A BRIEF HISTORY OF WEATHERVANE PLAYHOUSE

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members—Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch—and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works—even opera—with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/ Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 83rd season.

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

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"As Potent as a Charm" Prints by Joan Colbert

Akron artist, Joan Colbert, works in mixed media with an emphasis on printmaking, collage, and painting. Inspired by literature and influenced by her environs, she often creates works that are thematic, frequently including references to her favorite motifs: blackbirds and bare trees. Her current print series delves into the world of poisonous plants. This ongoing series, "As Potent as a Charm" explores the malevolent side of familiar plants in a collection of black and white linoleum block prints. Although the concept is botanical, allusions to dark tales and malfeasance hint at a narrative within each visual presentation.

This series is the perfect complement to our current production, *Les Liaisons Dangereuses*. This play is an erotic tale of deceit, betrayal, and seduction. The Vicomte de Valmont and the Marquise de Merteuil are two wealthy individuals in high society who revel in lies and treachery as they set out to ruin several lives for their own amusement. Both appear to be caring and concerned in their dealings with Madame De Tourvel and Cecile Volanges. They present themselves as "beautiful people" interested solely in the well-being of their victims. The vicious, hidden motives aren't recognized until it is too late. The plants featured in this display, which appear to be beautiful and non-threatening, are actually quite lethal. These poisonous plants look appealing and unsuspecting persons find out too late that they have been poisoned by contact with them.

A graduate of The University of Akron, Joan Colbert has won numerous awards in both juried shows and art festivals. The Akron-Summit County Library owns work commissioned for branch libraries, including the Mogadore, North Hill and Goodyear branches. As the First Night Akron 2001 button designer, she created a mixed media piece: a whimsical skyline with a dove, a peregrine falcon and a blackbird/jester.

Joan was Gallery Coordinator for Summit Artspace Gallery from 2007 to 2013. She is a member of Artists of Rubber City (AoRC) and lives in the Highland Square area of Akron. Her home was featured in "Artist in Residence—The West Hill Tour of Expressive Addresses".

Her artwork is available at Joan Colbert Studios, Summit Artspace Studio 319, 140 East Market Street, Akron, OH 44308, at Don Drumm Studios and Gallery in Akron, OH and River Light Gallery Peninsula.

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DIRECTOR'S NOTE

"In life, as in chess, forethought wins." (Charles Buxton)

"Chess is ruthless; you've got to be prepared to kill people." (Nigel Short)

"The human element, the human flaw, and the human nobility—those are the reasons that chess matches are won or lost." (Viktor Korchnoi)

"Life is not always like chess. Just because you have the king surrounded, don't think he is not capable of hurting you." (Ron Livingston)

In Les Liaisons Dangereuses, two former lovers conspire to seduce a young convent girl and break the fidelity of a virtuous woman in what begins as a gaming pastime for bored aristocrats. But when the possibility of true love stokes their still-smoldering desires for one another, their games become deadly, claiming many victims in revenge's fire. The novel, written in 1782 by Pierre Choderlos de Laclos, served as a critique of the amoral French aristocracy, who would soon receive their comeuppance during the years of the French Revolution.

Fast forward to now. Christopher Hampton's 1985 theatrical version, though still set in the 18th century, ironically feels quite contemporary and relevant. We live in a culture that is—alternatively—permissive and repressive where sexual mores are concerned. The play calls for an "eyes wide open" attitude that acknowledge sex's potency for both good and ill, while not allowing it to rule our every waking thought and action. Relatedly, in the age of sound bites, social media, tweets, and fake news, we have to remind ourselves that words, too, have power. What we say has effects—if not physical, then spiritual. Gossip, rumor, accusations, and more can ruin lives.

Beyond the temporal—then and now—the play speaks also to a universal experience—that love can be the most exhilarating and terrifying thing in the world. Loving and being loved unsettles us, undoes us, changes us. How to respond to that transformation—fighting against it or being remade into something new—is the central question for Valmont, Merteuil, and Tourvel.

Yet, amidst all these big ideas, elevated language, fancy costumes, and coded meanings, it's also a fun, sexy—and deadly—game.

For over 80 years, and more than 700 productions, Weathervane Playhouse has entertained our community with high quality live theater. It has been a place for people of all backgrounds to experience and appreciate live theater onstage, backstage or in the audience. We are proud to be associated with Weathervane Playhouse.

CHRISTOPHER JAMES HAMPTON was born in England in 1946. While at Oxford University, he wrote about his experiences with adolescent homosexuality in the play When Did You Last See My Mother? The play moved from London's Royal Court Theatre to the Comedy Theatre, making Mr. Hampton the youngest modern playwright to debut in the West End. He then adapted the novel Les Liaisons Dangereuses into both a stage and film version, the latter of which won the Academy Award for Best Adapted Screenplay in 1988. Twenty years later he was nominated again for his adaptation of Ian McEwan's novel Atonement. Mr. Hampton is also an accomplished translator, adapting published versions of Henrik Ibsen's A Doll's House, Ghosts, and Hedda Gabler, as well as Yasmina Reza's Tony Award-winning God of Carnage.

PIERRE CHODERLOS DE LACLOS, was a French soldier and writer, author of the classic Les Liaisons Dangereuses, one of the earliest examples of the psychological novel. Laclos chose a career in the army but soon left it to become a writer. His first novel, Les Liaisons Dangereuses (1782), caused an immediate sensation. Written in epistolary form, the story deals with the seducer Valmont and his accomplice, Mme de Merteuil, who take unscrupulous delight in their victims' misery. Laclos' second novel, De l'éducation des femmes (1785; "On the Education of Women"), is of little importance except for the light it throws on the psychology of the earlier novel. After he mocked the French army and its hopelessly outdated methods of defense, he lost his army commission. He then entered politics, working for a while as secretary to the duc d'Orléans. He again joined the army in 1792, however, and ultimately rose to the rank of general under Napoleon, serving in the Rhine and Italian campaigns.



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
