A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run as a live theater in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

Their first problem was money to pay the rent and to cover production costs. Money was in short supply in 1935 so the women chose a carnival as their fundraiser. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60 which encouraged them to continue. They named their space Weathervane after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cléaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because there were fewer and fewer people willing to commit to directing a play, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. Belfance held the position from 1961-69 and again from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership planned, plotted and raised funds. It all came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon. There was ample space and a mortgage. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Two major additions to the facility followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop in 2005 became the John L. Dietz Studio/Theater/Classroom, where experimental productions are presented.

Weathervane Playhouse now looks forward to a third expansion and a 75th anniversary.

In the Harris Family Gallery





From Our Executive Director

The Human Rescue Plan

In an important study titled "Gifts of the Muse — Reframing the Debate About the Benefits of the Arts," a comprehensive case is presented for both the *instrumental* value of the arts (the indirect benefits) as well as their *intrinsic* value (benefits inherent in the arts experiences themselves). Examples of Weathervane's instrumental value to our community are: improving the capacity of young people to learn, bringing our community together for shared social interaction, being a major contributor to the quality of life in our area and serving as an economic catalyst for Akron and the Merriman Valley. Our total economic impact to the greater Akron area is estimated to be nearly \$1.8 million.



Further, in our local schools there is an ongoing dialogue about the need for students to be "work-ready, college-

prepared and ready to earn a living wage." To do that in the 21st century requires creativity and engagement with one's imagination. General Electric's motto, for example, is "Imagination at Work." The testing results from Miller South School for the Visual and Performing Arts, where the school is consistently rated Excellent With Distinction by the State of Ohio in every major academic area, serves as testimony to the veracity that the arts are an essential element of learning and human development. These students go on to have highly successful lives working in a variety of fields, the least of which are full-time careers in the arts.

Perhaps the more important element that the arts bring to our community, though – and less quantifiable – is of a more intrinsic nature. Our commitment at Weathervane is to give people a way of accessing a sense of their own humanity through involvement in dramatic art – both as participants and as audience members. Through looking at the world from someone else's point of view and "walking in their shoes," there can emerge a greater sense of understanding and empathy for others. You can only look at the stunning results of the Shakespeare Behind Bars program in Louisville, Kentucky as an example. This is a program where convicted felons rehearse and perform plays by William Shakespeare over a period of years while incarcerated. What's been learned from this work is that the recidivism rate for those inmates who participated in the program and were released from prison was zero, compared to the national rate estimated at over 67%. This is an incredible finding given the fact that many of the over 2.3 million people currently serving jail time in our country are eventually going to be released back into our communities. What would having access to similar kinds of arts experiences have on people before they get to the point where they contemplate criminal behavior?

We believe the arts can not only contribute mightily to our country's financial rescue plan, but they can also play an integral role in our nation's human rescue plan as well.

About the Musical's History

Weathervane 's first production of *Man of La Mancha*, directed by Bob Belfance, was the opening production of the 1981-1982 season.

Man of La Mancha was inspired by a novel written by Spanish writer Miguel de Cervantes (1547 to 1616). The stage version first began as a television adaptation by American writer Dale Wasserman. The CBS TV network aired *I, Don Quixote* on November 9, 1959, as part of its 90-minute, monthly anthology series The DuPont Show of the Month.

Wasserman returned to his teleplay in the mid 1960s to collaborate with composer Mitch Leigh and lyricist Joe Darion to create a new musical version that the men called *Man of La Mancha*. The show's first production opened in 1964 at the Goodspeed Opera House in East Haddam, Connecticut. For the starring role of Cervantes/Quixote, the producers selected Rex Harrison but ultimately replaced him with Richard Kiley (who would, once the show moved to New York, win the 1966 Tony Award for Best Actor in a Musical).

After its initial Connecticut production, *Man of La Mancha* moved to the off-Broadway ANTA (American National Theatre and Academy) Washington Square Theatre in Greenwich Village, where it opened on Nov. 22, 1965. By the time it closed on June 26, 1971 – performance No. 2,328 – *Man of La Mancha* had emerged as the third-longest-running Broadway show of its era. For the 1965-1966 Broadway season, the show earned seven Tony Award nominations and won five: Kiley as best actor in a musical, best musical, best composer and lyricist, best scenic design of a musical and best direction of a musical.

As a testament to the show's perennial popularity, Broadway has revived *Man of La Mancha* four times since the original production. Forty-five years after its first Connecticut production, *Man of La Mancha* has traveled around the globe to be performed in dozens of languages: German, Hebrew, Swedish, Urdu, Icelandic, Siamese, Japanese, Slovenian, Finnish, Polish, Swahili – and even in nine distinct dialects of Spanish. In any language and in any venue, *Man of La Mancha*'s impossible dream continues to thrive.

About the Writing Team

Dale Wasserman (Bookwriter) was born in Rhineland, Wisconsin, in 1914. He was one of 14 children whose parents had immigrated from Russia. Wasserman left home in his early teens and traveled throughout the United States by way of hopping on freight trains. Despite little schooling, he ended up working in theater.

In the 1950s, Wasserman quit his job as a director of a play on Broadway after becoming frustrated with the process. Television became his next goal. He churned out teleplays for such TV anthology series as *Studio One, Matinee Theatre, The Alcoa Hour* and *Kraft Television Theatre*.

In 1963, Wasserman adapted Ken Kesey's novel, *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*, for the Broadway stage. Two years later, he collaborated with composer Mitch Leigh and lyricist Joe Darion to create the musical *Man of La Mancha*. Right up to his death last year from congestive heart failure, he continued to write. His last play, *Premiere!*, opened this past January at Theater Works in Peoria, Arizona.

Composer, producer, director and businessman Irwin Michnik – who later changed his name to Mitch Leigh – was born in Brooklyn, New York, in 1928. After graduating from Yale University in 1951 with a degree in music, he went to work in Manhattan as a jazz musician and also wrote commercials for radio and television. (One of his more famous jingles was the catchy "Nobody doesn't like Sara Lee.") In 1965 he composed the music for the show that would become his best-known work, *Man of La Mancha*. For his creative contributions, Leigh won two 1966 Tony Awards: one for best musical and one for best composer.

In addition to his Tony Awards for Man of La Mancha, Leigh's honors include the Contemporary Classics Award from the Songwriter's Hall of Fame for "The Impossible Dream," the Drama Critics Circle Award and the distinction of being the only living composer whose work was included in the Metropolitan Opera's Centennial Celebration. In 2001, Yale University named its new music building after Leigh and his wife, Abby.

Born in 1917 in New York City, **Joe Darion** (lyricist) was educated at City College of New York. After serving in the navy in World War II, he began to carve out a prolific career as a lyricist in radio, TV, films, theatre and even symphonic music. As a lyricist, his songwriting credits include "Ricochet" (a novelty song for Teresa Brewer) and "Changing Partners" (a Top 10 hit for Patti Page). Darion died of natural causes in 2001.




