
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A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works -- even opera -- with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director, He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.

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
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
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
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
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From Our Executive Director

The Season of Giving

About the Play and Its Production History

Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol is a comic re-imagining of Charles Dickens' Christmas classic – told from the point of view of Jacob Marley, who was Ebenezer Scrooge's business partner. Four actors – three men and one woman – portray all the characters that we know and love from this perennial favorite, and a few more characters are thrown in for good measure as well.

"Marley was dead, to begin with." These are the famous words that begin Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol. But what happens to Scrooge's mean, old cohort after that? This is the jumping-off point for Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol, which reveals that Marley has been condemned to a hellish eternity. He soon learns that the only way to escape his chains of damnation is to first redeem Scrooge. Slightly irreverent, cleverly funny and deeply moving, Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol takes audiences on a highly theatrical journey of laughter and terror, with redemption and renewal as the ultimate destination.

Writer/actor Tom Mula first conceived *Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol* as a short novel, which was published in 1995 by Adams Media. After National Public Radio broadcast the audio version of the book for nationwide radio audiences during the Christmas season, Mula adapted his novel into a one-man show for the stage. This play version, starring Mula in all the roles, opened at Chicago's Goodman Theatre in December 1998 and was nominated for a Joseph Jefferson Award (the Chicago theater community's version of the Tony Awards). The play also received the Cunningham Prize from the Goodman School of Drama at DePaul University. *The Chicago Tribune* called the play "great fun, an audience pleaser filled with laughs and capped with, of course, a happy ending." Next, Mula re-worked his play for four actors (which is the version Weathervane Playhouse is presenting). The four-man version of the play premiered at the Cincinnati Shakespeare Festival in November 2001. Since then, it has received hundreds of productions nationally and worldwide, including productions in South Africa and Australia.

About the Playwright

TOM MULA has for the past 30 years worked in the Chicago area as an award-winning actor, director, playwright, makeup artist and winner of the Joseph Jefferson Award ("The Jeff") for *The Golem* and *Sylvia's Real Good Advice*.

Some of Mr. Mula's acting credits include *The Hot Mikado* at Drury Lane Theatre, for which he received an After Dark Award and a Joseph Jefferson Award; Lawrence in Christine Thatcher's *Emma*'s *Child*; the Fool in *King Lear*; Richard III, Caliban, Bottom, Feste, Malvolio, and Prospero; another award-winning solo turn in *The Circus of Dr. Lao*; and seven seasons (over 400 performances) as the Goodman Theatre's Scrooge in *A Christmas Carol*. His directing credits include Jeff nominations for *Porch* and *A Life*, and the world premiere of Larry Shue's last play, *Wenceslas Square*, in Chicago and at the Oueens' Festival in Belfast.

Mula was Artistic Director of the Oak Park Festival Theatre for seven years, directing or appearing in As You Like It, Romeo and Juliet, The Tempest, Richard III, A Midsummer Night's Dream, and his own adaptations of Dr. Faustus and Henry IV (parts I and 2), titled Falstaff. Mula has spent 15 summers at Peninsula Players in Door County Wisconsin, where he has directed productions of Amadeus, The Lion in Winter, Red Herring and Greetings, among others. He has appeared there in Cabaret, The Cherry Orchard, Art and far too many farces.

Mr. Mula holds a B.F.A. degree from the University of Illinois and has taught in the theater department at Columbia College in Chicago for more than 20 years, most of them as an artist-in-residence. There, he has directed *Tartuffe* and co-directed *Ragtime*, *Macbeth* and *Romeo and Juliet* with Sheldon Patinkin.

About Our Director



LARRY NEHRING (Director) has been in Northeast Ohio for nearly two decades and is thrilled to be directing his third show at Weathervane! In addition to directing Much Ado about Nothing and Children of a Lesser God here, Larry has worked at nearly every theatre company in the area acting, directing, choreographing combat, or sign interpreting. Most recently he was Baron VonTrapp at Porthouse, appeared in *The Seafarer* at Dobama, coached puppets for Cain Park's Avenue Q, and choreographed sword fights for Cleveland School of the Arts' Cyrano. His film/TV work

includes various commercials, American Splendor, 7 Nights of Darkness, and The War that Made America and his playwrighting career is just starting to gain momentum. Check back later for more news.... Director's Notes

There is reason why certain stories capture our attention and our hearts long after the writer has passed and even the world of the tale has become a quaint memory. Dickens created many such classics but none are quite so enduring as A Christmas Carol. The tale of selfishness and redemption has been remade many times: adapted by Dr. Seuss, updated with Bill Murray, and even Patrick Stewart used to perform a one-man retelling of Scrooge's adventure. It even goes beyond the limits of the Christian traditions of the holiday season and applies to all people, whether they believe in one particular faith or none. It truly has become a classic lesson for the world. I had never given a thought to the extraordinary feat that Jacob Marley's spirit accomplishes from across the grave until I read this adaptation by Tom Mula. We know so little about Scrooge's business partner in Dickens' story, and yet we see that he, alone, set in motion the spiritual trials that would rekindle the cold heart of the infamous miser. The real hero of the story is Marley, not Scrooge.

The play you are about to see is not a grand performance. It is simple storytelling; four actors will paint the stage with the magic of Marley's journey... things Scrooge never knew happened behind the scenes. We don't have a set, we have only hints of costumes (we are fully clothed, don't worry!) and sound and lights will back us up, but its just the cast up on the stage sharing a story of wonder and magic. So many holiday shows are about the spectacle of the production and often we forget the real heart of the story. We hope that you will come along and share with us as we tell the tale of holiday redemption.

The Mystery of the Missing Robot and How the Bee Learned to Spell: A Fable. He also takes great pleasure in writing the end-of-the-season revue for the Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players, who appear at Weathervane's annual Chanticleer Awards banquet. He was the recipient of the 2012 Trustees Award.




JOHN HEDGES, Executive Director



Prior to coming to Weathervane, he spent ten years in the Resident Acting Company at the historic Barter Theatre in Virginia where he performed in over sixty shows. Other acting credits include performances at Broadway's Town Hall, the Pantages Theatre in Los Angeles, the Indiana Repertory Theatre, the Kentucky Shakespeare Festival, Actors Theatre of Louisville and the American Stage Festival in New Hampshire where he appeared opposite Academy Award-winner Olympia Dukakis in The Cherry Orchard. 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
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
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


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
