
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


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
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
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






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
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
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A BRIEF HISTORY OF WEATHERVANE PLAYHOUSE

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members – Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch – and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 82nd Season.

Please enjoy the artwork created by students of Woodridge High School and home-schooled students, including LGBT teens and their friends/allies, which embody and/or portray the concept of gender identity and gender expression in fine art medium.

Because the subject matter of January's production, "A Kid Like Jake," dealt with a couple's concern about their four year old boy's increasing desire to be more interested in "Cinderella than G.I. Joe," I believed that an exhibit featuring artwork by members of the LGBT Community would help put the idea of being transgendered into a different context.

All but one of the high school students participating in this exhibit are students of Ms. Chelby Benson. She is a K-12 Art Educator and Theater Artistic Director at Woodridge High School. For this exhibit she worked in collaboration with Mrs. Susan Mongold, the GSA advisor. GSA is the Gay-Straight-Alliance Group for supporting LGBT Students and Community.

"Our students are very adamant about using the arts to give voice to LGBT teens. I hope that the art they turn in will embrace this concept well. Some of the works I've received are self-portraits, which shows that these students are just normal teenagers not to be feared despite an unpopular sexual orientation," says Ms. Benson.

F. Jonathan Kurch, whose photography complements the students' work, is also a member of the LGBT community. "I hope that something in my work speaks to you. That something can be beautiful regardless as to what it started out as, or what it is believed or expected to be. That something can be strong, regardless as to how delicate or fragile it may appear. That, even though one might feel utterly alone and helpless, there are always avenues of support and help waiting for us. We just need to be open to them. And remember, take a moment to stop and notice the beauty that is all around us and within us."

Because all the artists' statements could not be listed here, I hope you will take the time to read them, as they will be displayed next to their work. Their passion, sensitivity, and desire to communicate is to be applauded. Their work fulfills my hope for this exhibit, which is to show people who are transgendered aren't to be feared, ridiculed, or persecuted.

ABOUT THE PLAY

In 1960, author Harper Lee published what was to become one of the most influential novels in American history, *To Kill a Mockingbird*. When it was first published she was told not to expect it to sell more than a couple thousand copies. It quickly became a sensation, and now, over fifty years later, it has never been out of print, has sold over thirty million copies and has been translated into forty languages. It also received the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction in 1961, among other awards garnered over the years.

Set in Depression-era Alabama, Scout, a young girl in a quiet southern town, is about to experience dramatic events that will affect the rest of her life. She and brother, Jem, are being raised by their widower father, Atticus, and by their strongminded housekeeper named Calpurnia. Scout's wide-eyed innocence will be tested when Atticus decides to defend a young boy against the charges from a crime he didn't commit.

"To Kill A Mockingbird"

It's an honor to direct this adaptation of Harper Lee's literary classic, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, and an even greater privilege to present this work at Weathervane Playhouse.

It's a daunting task to direct a piece of literature that has such an abiding place in hearts and memories, in part due to indelible film performances by actors like Gregory Peck and Brock Peters. As an artist, the challenge is to ensure the production resonates in our current culture as powerfully as it did in the latter half of the last century.

My goal in directing "To Kill a Mockingbird" was to revisit the Depression era South, prior

to the Civil Rights Movement, in order to show the bravery exhibited amidst a wall of hatred and bigotry. In understanding the history, we can better understand the moral imperative to stand up for one's beliefs, even in the face of intense opposition and social pressure to remain silent.

This classic work's most compelling lesson is taught to us through the eyes of children discovering a world that can be unjust. We find strength in our own convictions when we reflect on Atticus's words: "The one thing that doesn't abide by majority rule is a person's conscience."

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Harper Lee is the Pulitzer-Prize winning author of the brilliantly written *To Kill a Mockingbird.* The book instantly became a best seller internationally and was also adapted into an Academy-Award winning movie in 1962. Although Harper's contribution to literature has been limited, she has achieved what many writers can only wish for even after authoring volumes.

When *To Kill a Mockingbird* was published in 1960, Lee instantaneously became a literary legend. In addition to a short version of the story being published in *The Reader's Digest*, the book was chosen by the Literary Guild and also picked up by the Book of the Month Club. Many more awards followed and in 1961, the book won the prestigious Pulitzer Prize.

On November 6, 2007, President George W. Bush presented to Lee the Presidential Medal of Freedom for her services to literature. She was also awarded the National Medal of the Arts in 2010. After refusing for decades to appear for interviews or anything to do with her popular novel, she passed away on February 19, 2016 in Monroeville, Alabama, where she had lived for many years.

Christopher Sergel was born in 1918 in Iowa City, Iowa, and he lived a life full of adventure. Following his graduation from the University of Chicago, he served in World War II as a lieutenant commander in the U.S. Merchant Marines and taught celestial navigation. Later, he spent two years as the captain of the schooner *Chance* in the South Pacific. Then as a writer for *Sports Afield* magazine, he lived in the African bush for a year.

In 1970, the same year he began adapting *To Kill a Mockingbird*, he became president of Dramatic Publishing, a play publishing and leasing company founded in 1885 by his great uncle, Charles Sergel. During that time, he attracted many fine writers of the 1970s and '80s such as Arthur Miller, Roald Dahl, Ray Bradbury, and E.B. White

Sergel served as Dramatic Publishing's president until he died in 1993 at age 75 in Wilton, Connecticut, from heart failure.
