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

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre, improvisation and design for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and Tuesdays evenings. Two-week Hands-on Theatre (H.O.T.) workshops are offered throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE© program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, Fences, All My Sons and Romeo &

Juliet will be featured in the Project STAGE© events. Tickets are \$8.

Adult Classes

Professionally taught adult theatre classes have included classical drama, improvisation, scenic design, transformational acting, dance, stage lighting and directing. - * Capital Project The construction segment of the Capital Project in 2000 included a scene shop with basement storage, a 2nd-floor classroom and rehearsal hall, soundproof production booth, elevator and fly gallery pocket above the stage and installation of the rigging system for the fly gallery. Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.





Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951 when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years, directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of Dark of the Moon. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a soundproof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the awardwinning The Laramie Project in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with Angels in America: Millennium Approaches in January 2005.



Women's Board

The Women's Board was formed in 1938 to "offer voluntary service and financial assistance to the Playhouse." Women's Board has energized youth education programs, sponsored productions, spearheaded fund raisers and paid for many of the amenities we appreciate in the Green Room/kitchen. Members of this active group are invaluable as hostesses, office helpers and backstage. The Women's Board sponsors an annual puppet presentation for children and also operates the Gift Boutique and Bank One Art Gallery. New members are welcomed.

Before Weathervane, he worked at Cuyahoga Falls High School where he was awarded a Design Excellence citation from USITT and a place in Who's Who Among America's Teachers. He has designed for many local high schools as well as for The Players Guild, Cleveland Signstage and Channels 45/49. Scott has earned four Chanticleer Awards -- one as stage manager for Fences, the others as lighting co-designer for A Man for All Seasons and lighting designer for The Laramie Project and A Lesson Before Dying. He takes great pleasure in writing the end-of-the-season revue for The Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players who appear at our annual Chanticleer Awards Dinner. This is his tenth season.

MELANIE Y.C. PEPE (Director of Education/YAS Producer) holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Kent State University. She has been teaching classes at Weathervane since 1998 and has served as the supervisor of Weathervane's City of Akron-sponsored Neighborhood Playhouse program. She served as Development Associate for our Capital Campaign for two years. Melanie does most of her work in make-up design and has worked with NEOUCOM, College of Medicine; Blue City Productions and Firestone High School's Visual and Performing Arts Program. About the Play, Authors & Musical Director

About the Play

The Full Monty is the stage adaptation of the 1997 sleeper movie produced in England to wide acclaim. The musical had its world premiere at the Old Globe Theater in San Diego, then opened in October 2000 at the Eugene O'Neill Theater in New York where it ran for 770 performances. The show won the 2001 Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Music.

About the Playwright

Born in St. Petersburg, FL in 1939, Terrence McNally has written several other works for musical theater such as The Kiss of the Spider Woman and The Rink, both with scores by John Kander and Fred Ebb. He won Tony Awards for Master Class and Love! Valour! Compassion! McNally also wrote the book for Ragtime and Chita Rivera: The Dancer's <u>Life</u>. He has written a number of TV scripts including *Andre's Mother* for which he won an Emmy Award. He has received two Guggenheim fellowships, a Rockefeller grant and a citation from the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. A member of the Dramatists Guild Council since 1970, McNally has been vice president since 1981. About this play, McNally says, "The Full Monty touches on something universal, something about feeling good about yourself on the simplest level."

About the Composer

David Yazbek, who prizes his Drama Desk Award for outstanding music in The Full Monty, grew up in New York City with a father in the clothing trade and a mother who played classical piano. He was a music buff -- the Beatles' Revolver was the backbone of his collection. He took a Brown University production of *Hair* to Boston after graduation. He is married to Betsy, a yoga instructor, and has a son, Omar. He spent a year with the Letterman show and hated the experience. Being recruited for *The Full Monty* fulfilled his ambitions and changed his life.

About the Musical Director

Evie Rosen-Morris works as a musical director, pit player, accompanist and teacher throughout northeast Ohio. Most recently she was the musical director for Quilters at Actors' Summit in Hudson and she will be playing keyboard for Sweet Charity at Porthouse Theatre at the end of July. She is delighted to be joining the Weathervane community and thanks Jacqi, the cast and the fabulous band for this opportunity. Evie lives in Cleveland Heights with her husband Stephen (trombone) and is the mother of three wonderful daughters and two delightful granddaughters.



About Our Director - Jacqi Loewy

Jacqi Loewy is one of the area's busiest freelance directors and is very happy to be back with the gang at WCP. Other Weathervane shows she has directed include *The Laramie* Project, Proof, Little Shop of Horrors, The Rocky Horror Show and The Last Five Years. She was director and co-author of Mr. Lewis Rules: Stories from the Juvenile Justice System as well as appearing onstage in Prelude to a Kiss and Six Degrees of Separation. She is currently the Artistic Director of Charenton Theater Company, for which she directed the critically acclaimed Look Back in Anger and the world premiere of Both Sides of the Family. Other local directing credits include The Cleveland Play House (The Nutcracker, V-E Day), Dobama (V-E Day), Lyric Opera Cleveland (She Loves Me, Berlin to Broadway, The Fantasticks), Willoughby Fine Arts (The Fantasticks) and Solon Center for the Arts (Bad Dates, The Nerd, Crimes of the Heart, And the World Goes Round). Past staff positions include Education Director for Cleveland Shakespeare Festival, Resident Director at Solon Center for the Arts and Artistic Supervisor of Playhouse Square's Tony n' Tina's Wedding. Jacqi is on the adjunct faculty at Lake Erie College and a voice-over & on-camera talent represented by The Talent Group. Originally from NYC, she has Broadway (Oh! Calcutta! Hmmm - prelude to Full *Monty?*), Off-Broadway and touring credits to her name as well as several feature films. She holds a Master of Arts degree in Theatre Arts from The University of Akron, a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Musical Theater and currently lives on the east side of Cleveland. After she watches the boys go "the full monty," she will be starring in Mame with Mercury Summer Stock and will direct Weathervane's fall I Do! I Do!

Director's Notes

The thing about *The Full Monty* is it works so well on so many levels.

It's a beautifully-written story about the real feelings of real men. Through a sneak peak at their insecurities, we fall madly in love with men of all shapes and sizes. I can't think of another contemporary musical that draws three-dimensional characters and seamlessly incorporates great music to weave a story that touches the soul and tickles the funny bone in such an honest way.

It is a heartfelt story about a single father who struggles with the love for and partial loss of his son.

It is a feminist piece. I was struck in rehearsal by the fact that my "Monty Six" and "Keno" are fabulous and brave human beings. They're NOT strippers, they're actors and they trusted the show enough to be vulnerable with all the women sitting a few feet away. On top of that, they seemed to realize what scrutiny we women go through on a daily basis. I cannot say enough about my admiration for Rob, Patrick, Dave, Gregg, Jason, Rob and Mike -- it's a tough job and I'm so honored that these men were willing to live in our world for a brief time.

It is a heartfelt story about women who love men, men who love men and kids who love their parents and parents who love their kids! I hope you have as much fun here tonight as we have had putting this show together. And thank you so much for your continued support of live theatre -- it cannot happen without you!

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake-to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- **❖ Sound** Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- **★ Ushering** Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- ★ House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.



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
Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.


Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.

Each month, we acknowledge the outstanding Volunteers of the Month in our lobby, but those volunteers represent all who commit their time and interest to create a great theater experience for everyone who's come to see this show.

Awards are presented for outstanding lead performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding lead performances in a musical, outstanding featured and sup-



Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.


Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on Main Stage first Friday performances. We provide light refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.
