





Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.


"The barn" was home until 1951when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.

About the Play, Playwright and Director

About the Play

The one thing about Shakespeare is that his plays can be set in any time period and, depending on the skill of the director and the cast, can be brought off in true Shakespearean style. Weathervane's production commemorates the 250th anniversary of the events of the French and Indian War from 1754 - 1761. (See Director's Notes.)

The play begins with the troublemaker Lt. John deciding to discredit the blameless Hero so that love-struck Lt. Claudio, his military rival, will give up her hand in marriage. Meanwhile Lt. Claudio's friend, Major Benedick, is declaring his antipathy to marriage and women in general while Hero's cousin, Beatrice, is announcing her similar antagonism to the wedded state. All this involves a gathering of friends, followers and nightwatch who muddle the romantic waters with friends pretending to be their friends in usual Shakespearean fashion. Comic relief is provided by Dogberry, a constable, who precedes Mrs. Malaprop in her misuse of the English language. In the end, Hero is exonerated and Beatrice and Benedick decide they might try marriage after all.

About the Playwright

William Shakespeare was born on April 23, 1564, according to baptismal records of the church at Stratford-on-Avon. He was the son of John Shakespeare, a glover and butcher. Church records also report his marriage to Anne Hathaway who, seven months later, bore him a daughter, Susannah, and, two years later, twins named Hamnet and Judith. No records have been found to tell what Shakespeare did from the birth of the twins in 1585 until 1593. Legend has it he ran away to escape being arrested for poaching, or he deserted the wife whom he had married under duress, or he became entranced by a troupe of strolling players and "ran away with the circus." His first play, thought to be produced when he was 26 in 1590, was *Love's Labour's Lost*. During the next 21 years Shakespeare wrote his 37 plays and seven poetical works that are the supreme masterpieces of our language. He became a "sharer" in the Lord Chamberlain's company of actors and he bought a large house in Stratford. His will was signed in Stratford on March 23, 1616, he died one month later on April 23 and was buried in the chancel of the Stratford church.

About the Director

Larry Nehring is thrilled to be directing at Weathervane, especially one of his all-time favorite scripts! He is the Artistic Director of the Cleveland Shakespeare Festival and has directed, acted and/or choreographed fights for nearly every theater in the Cleveland area. His favorite, recent directorial credits include *Cymbeline*, *Midsummer (abridged)*, *Henry IV: Parts 1 & 2* (Cleveland Shakespeare Festival), *The Alchemist* (Bad Epitaph Theatre), *Servant of Two Masters* (Cleveland Play House Children's Series) and numerous shows for Cleveland Play House's summer camps. As an actor he has appeared in Playhouse Square's *I Love You*, *You're Perfect*, *Now Change*, North Carolina Shakespeare Festival (*Shrew, Love's Labor's Lost, Hamlet*), CatCo (*Three Days of Rain*) and plays George Washington in the PBS miniseries, *The War That Made America*, to air in January 2006. Mr. Nehring received his MSCD from the University of Rochester and Rochester Institute of Technology, and is a graduate of the National Theater Institute (Eugene O'Neill Theater Center). He is a theatrical sign language interpreter, stage combat choreographer and a member of Actors' Equity Association.

Much Ado About Nothing is quite nearly a perfect play. Sure, as with all of his scripts there are some challenges — obscure or outdated references, political relationships that mean nothing to us, some quite unfunny jokes and sword fighting. Every director is faced with the dreaded choice, "What do I do with Shakespeare?"

Now there are many who say, "Do nothing. Leave it alone," and there are many who say, "The sky is the limit! Be creative, be conceptual, he's dead and no estate will sue!" I guess I tend to fall somewhere in the middle. Even four hundred years later (400? Seems like just yesterday...) Shakespeare's characters seem no different from ourselves. Their loves, hates, interests and aversions are our own. Macbeth wants the crown, but my best friend wants the corner office, and either will do just about anything to get that.

Yet it is easy to distance ourselves from the play when we cannot connect with the language and setting of the show. Most often I choose a contemporary setting, with modern clothes, so that the story is "here and now" for the audience. But, in the last two years, I have been very involved with the 250th anniversary of the French & Indian War (two films, a painting, and lots of reading). It made me wonder how Shakespeare would have written it if he had been in the Colonies at that time.

The French & Indian War: a brief history

While the British colonies grew slowly in the southern half of North America, sticking to the coast, the French were rapidly expanding across the northern half, making full use of the St. Lawrence River and the Great Lakes. While the British colonists regarded the Natives with little more than disdain, keeping the two cultures clearly separate, the French settlers actively blended the two cultures. By 1750 it was apparent that the French were winning, expanding faster, and even starting to push south. They were entering the Ohio River Valley and effectively cutting off British expansion into that fertile territory. The Native tribes who were being squeezed between the two European invaders were none too pleased either, seeing their sovereign territories being occupied by hostile forces. The French built forts, the British sent in the military, and the Natives tried to broker the best deals with both sides hoping to survive the battles. What followed was the first war to merit the title of a "World War," challenging British colonization across the globe. It also set the stage for the American Revolution. Then all the pieces quickly fell into place...

It is Spring 1759, scant months after the fall of the French Fort Duquesne to British forces under Brigadier General Forbes and a company of soldiers under the leadership of Britain's Prince Pedro of Buckingham returns to Williamsburg, Virginia to report to Governor Leonato. (The real Governor was Dinwiddie. It is hard to drastically change the names in Shakespeare, so even though I know a British Prince wouldn't be named Pedro, consider that he also has a sister named John, so give me a little break here.) With a few minor changes and some liberal trimming of the script, we have a pre-American, pre-Revolution comedy of love, betrayal and redemption.

I hope you enjoy the fruits of our labors.

His other Akron credits include appearances as Peter Quince in A Midsummer Night's Dream at Stan Hywet Hall and Gardens and as Inspector Hearne in Witness for the Prosecution at Coach House Theatre. Zimmerman has directed for Weathervane including productions of *The Crucible*, *The* Philadelphia Story, Oliver! 2004 - A Telling of Tomorrow, All in the Timing and Dear Gabby: The Confessions of an Over-Achiever. He has also directed for Cleveland Public Theatre and Coach House Theatre. He has served as lighting designer for numerous Weathervane productions and was recently awarded a Chanticleer for his lighting of *The Rocky* Horror Show. Mark has been named three times to Who's Who Among America's Teachers. He lives in Akron with his wife Elynmarie Kazle and son Banno.

CHRISTOPHER L. HENDERSON (Borachio) is a junior at The University of Akron where he is studying business management and communications. He appeared in the University's 2005 production of Man with Bags. Previous appearances at the iniversity include Of Mice and Men, Moon Over Buffalo and Gitney. Numerous earlier performances were at Norton High School.

BEVAN MICHAEL HAYNES (Lieutenant Claudio) has studied acting at Wright State University and is now an inventory specialist for Washington Inventory Services. This year Bevan has appeared in Jane Eyre, the Musical for Mercury

Summer Stock, in Elegies: A Song Cycle for Wav Off-Broadway in Dayton, and in Our Town for the Dayton Playhouse. In past years he has appeared in productions at Wright State in Dayton and in Guys and Dolls at Porthouse Theater in Akron. His next project will be Beauty and the Beast at the Beck Center.

RYAN STEVENSON (Conrade) returns for his second appearance at Weathervane, having played Laertes in our youth production of Hamlet in 2003. A twelfthgrade homeschooler from Fairlawn, Ryan has a passion for Shakespeare and hopes to become a professor of English literature. His interests include classical studies, fencing, music composition and performance, amateur filmmaking and directing.

MARGARET MORRIS (Dogberry) is a speech and language therapist at Cuyahoga Falls Country Place. She received a B.A. degree from The University of Akron in communicative disorders, and an M.A. degree from the University of Cincinnati in speech-language pathology. She says she became interested in speech therapy after taking classes at Weathervane more than ten years ago! She worked backstage at the former Berea Summer Theatre during her high school years. Her travels have taken her to Europe and India.

JORDAN COOPER (Colonel Pedro) After a smashing debut as the Mad Hatter in Alice and the Wonderful Tea Party, Jordan is thrilled to be making his triumphant return to the Weathervane stage — seven years later. In the meantime, Jordan has worked as everything from musical director for the Florida Repertory Theater in Ft. Myers, Florida, to "the incredible floating dead baby" in last season's production of *The Grapes of Wrath*. He would like to give bravos to his extraordinary sister, Alison, for introduc-

ing him to the theater in the first place.

JEN HANDLEY (Lieutenant John) is a senior at Cuyahoga Falls High School. She played the nurse in North Canton Playhouse's Romeo and Juliet this year and Debbie in The Real Thing for Coach House Theatre. Two other Shakespeare productions appear on her credits, both for North Canton Playhouse: Beatrice in Much Ado about Nothing, and Titania in A Midsummer Night's Dream. She received an Excellence in Acting Award from the Ohio Community Theater Association (OCTA) for her performance in *Much Ado* about Nothing.

AMANDA K. DAVIS (Hero) is studying pre-med psychology as a sophomore in the Honors College at Kent State University. 



Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- *** Costumes** Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes. create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- **Lighting** Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-


- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.



Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a sold out sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are promising to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). This makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really sold out and annoys other ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

Subscribers: Please call the Ticket Office at 836-2626 if you will not make your ticketed performance. Thank you.

Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.

Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on Main Stage first Friday performances. We provide light refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.

For your sweet tooth snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission. Refresh-ments (other than water) are not permitted in the auditorium.

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theatre (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE© program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, Much Ado about Nothing, Crowns and Antigone will be featured in the Project STAGE© events. Tickets are \$8.

Adult Classes

Professionally taught adult theatre classes have included classical drama, improvisation, scenic design, stage lighting and directing. These classes help actors expand their performance and public speaking skills. Look for new schedules for classes periodically.






