From 1935 until 1951, Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue. Some recall its cramped quar-

ters but especially the energy and devotion of four ladies, Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it happen. A lobby plaque lists the names of other founders who shared their commitment. The rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.


In 1951, the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and, from 1960 - 1992, Bob Belfance served as director. Along with custodian/ticket office manag-

er, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions. Ticket receipts and donations helped meet expenses and created a modest endowment. A fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263-seat facility which opened in 1970. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has been paid off.

Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery and fly system, a sound-proof production booth and a costume workshop.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production, The Laramie Project, during the 2002-2003 season. Thanks for being a part of our history as we celebrate this 70th season!



A theatrical troupe is engaged in the production of a touring turkey in which anything that can go wrong does. Noises Off is a play within a play opening with a chaotic rehearsal in one tank town and moving on to delirious performances in two others. All this is accompanied by histrionic tantrums, company romances, a set that malfunctions and actors who fail to appear. Three separate glimpses of the first act of the play Nothing On include a rehearsal, a run-through several weeks after opening from a backstage vantage point and another performance that proves to be anything but. Wayward props, including an ever-disappearing plate of sardines, take on a life of their own as cast members fly in and out of six slamming doors in typical French farce fashion. The plot? A cheerfully bright living room appears to be deserted except for the housekeeper. A real estate agent walks in, not to show the house but to shack up for the weekend with his girlfriend because he knows the owners are hiding in Spain to evade the tax police. He doesn't know that the owners have returned, followed by a trail of sheiks and burglars. Everyone is hiding from everyone else behind the doors and one is adamantly stuck. It is just one more problem for the director who divides his time between lechery and Valium. The comic momentum unfailingly builds into second and third act frenzies of slapstick with missing cues, precision prop maneuvers and dopey to-and-froing, all adding up to breathtaking knockabout burlesque.

About the Playwright

Michael Frayn was born in 1933 to a sales representative and a shop assistant, received a Bachelor's degree in education from Emmanuel College, Cambridge in 1957, served in the British Army Intelligence Corps from 1952 to 1954, married Gillian Palmer, a photojournalist, in 1960 and has three daughters. He has since written English stage plays, film scripts, television series, novels and non-fiction. *Noises Off* first appeared on the London stage in 1982, arriving on Broadway the next year. He won the Somerset Maugham Award in 1966 for *The Tin Men*, followed by numerous other awards. In 1998 Frayn had two new plays in London, *Copenhagen* and *Alarms and Excursions* which was a new comedy hit. *Headlong*, an antic novel, was published in 1999 at the same time a new adaptation of *Uncle Vanya* appeared on the Lincoln Center Stage. *Copenhagen* followed its author to Broadway, appearing in March, 2000. In 2003 he mounted a new hit play, *Democracy*, a spy drama about German chancellor Willy Brandt. Meanwhile, *Noises Off* has become a staple of community and college theaters across the country.



She finished out her school year on run crew for a world premiere show which moved to New York entitled, Blindness: The Irresistible Light of Encounter. She will work on Anything Goes, The Laramie Project and The Dinner Party this school year. She designed sound for our production of Winnie-the-Pooh.

ERIN KATZ (Lighting Co-Design) is a student at The Ohio State University but has managed to design lighting for Weathervane shows usually one a year. She helped open last season with lights for My Way. Before that she did The Chosen, Sunshine Boys, A Funny Thing Happened ...Forum, Stuart Little and Charlotte's Web.

MARK A. ZIMMERMAN (Lighting Co-Design) is Weathervane's Production Board chairman and FirstEnergy lighting chair. He is also chairman of Firestone High School's Visual and Performing Arts program. 
DOTTY OTLEY (Mrs. Clackett) makes a welcome return to the stage to create the role of Mrs. Clackett after playing Mrs. Hackett, Britain's most famous lollipop lady ("Ooh, I can't 'ardly 'old me lolly up!") in over 320 episode of TV's ON THE ZEBRAS. She was born in Malta, the only daughter of Lt. Cdr. Clive Otley, R.N., D.S.M., and trained at the Estelle Birkwood School of Drama and Allied Arts, winning the Bronze Medal, and going on to the Embassy Theatre, Swiss Cottage, where she gained invaluable experience as ASM in successful productions like AS YOU DESIRE and STARCHED APRONS. Understudying Bee Duffell in HADDOCK'S EYES at the New Lindsey Theatre, Notting Hill Gate, and Margaret Lockwood in PETER PAN at the Scala, was followed by The King's Theatre, Peebles for a season, and then the Duke's Players at Lyme Regis for the better part of two seasons, and this in turn led to a prolonged stay in Australia, where she enjoyed some of the biggest successes of her career. When she gets the time she intends writing her memoirs, she says.

BELINDA BLAIR (Flavia Brent) has been on the stage since the age of four, when she made her debut in SINBAD THE SAILOR at the old Croydon Hippodrome as one of Miss Toni Tanner's Ten Tapping Tots. She subsequently danced her way 'round this country, Southern Africa, and the Far East in shows like ZIPPEDY-DOO-DA! and HERE COMES LES GIRLS! A damaged tendon led to her first straight parts in GOOD TIME GIRL, LADIES OF THE NIGHT, and RING TWICE FOR RITA. More recently she has been seen in such comedy hits as DON'T MR. DUDDLE!, WHO'S BEEN SLEEPING IN MY BED?, and TWICE TWO IS SEX. She is married to scriptwriter Terry Wough, who has contributed lead-in material to most of TV's chat shows. They have two sons and three retrievers.

GARY LEJEUNE (Roger Tramplemain) was twice winner of the Rose Bruford Medal for Effort. His many successful tours have brought him to Weston-super-Mare only once before, when he was starring in THE ADVENTURES OF A WINDOW DRESSER. He has made innumerable television appearances, but is perhaps best-known as "Cornetto," the ice-cream salesman who stirs the hearts of all the lollipop ladies in ON THE ZEBRAS. He recently made his "big screen" debut in UP THE VIRGIN SOLDIERS, for which he was nominated as Best Male Newcomer under Forty in any British Low-Budget Comedy Film by readers of the SUN Newspaper.

SELSDON MOWBRAY (Burglar) first "trod the boards" in A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM with the Ben Greet Players, with whom he toured for three years, playing, among other roles, Moth, Mustardseed, and Nerissa(!) After war service in the Artists' Rifles, outstanding seasons with various repertory companies across the length and breadth of Great Britain led to his first West End play, KELLY'S EYE. Then "alfresco" in Regent's Park for several seasons, playing leads. To Stratford thence for Mercutio, King John, and the Porter in MACBETH. To Hollywood for several good supporting roles, including Stand-In to Robert Newton. Back home he played King Lear in Portsmouth, and joined the BBC Rep for two months in 1938. Great War No. Two saw him back in Khaki. Invalided out in 1940 he continued to serve by joining Ensa, and performing all over the world in many different "Theatres of War." To Dublin in 1946, where he set up his own touring company playing the Classics, and rivalling the great Agnew Macmaster. Returned to England in 1952 and set up his own tour - a revival of MR. CINDERS. Since then apart from an occasional excursion to "tread the green," he has been busy writing his autobiography, which he is thinking of titling HANGING ON THE WALL.

BROOKE ASHTON (Vicki) is probably best known as the girl wearing nothing but




FREDERICK FELLOWES (Philip Brent) comes from a theatrical family - his parents were a popular specialty dance act of the thirties and forties, "The Funny Fellowes." He taught at a prep school near Hayward's Heath before bowing to family tradition and joining the Osmosis Players. There followed successful seasons in Nairobi, Ventnor, and Southwold, and he was most recently seen in the controversial all-male version of THE TROJAN WOMEN. He is happily married, and lives near Crawley, where his wife breeds pedigree dogs. "If she ever leaves me," he says, "it will be for an Irish wolfhound!"

ROBIN HOUSEMONGER (Author) was born in Worcester Park, Surrey, into a family "unremarkable in every way except for an aunt with red hair who used to sing all the high twiddly bits from THE MERRY WIDOW over the tea-table." He claims to have been the world's most unsuccessful gents hosiery wholesaler, and began writing "to fill the long hours between one hosiery order and the next." He turned this experience into his very first play, SOCKS BEFORE MARRIAGE, which ran in the West End for nine years. Several subsequent plays have been produced, and at least one of them broke box office records in Perth. Western Australia. NOTHING ON is his seventeenth play.

LLOYD DALLAS (Director) "read English at Cambridge, and stagecraft at the Salisbury." A Commonwealth Scholarship took him to Princeton, where he spent his time "commuting to New York to see Miller and musicals on Broadway, and Lee Strasberg and Tallulah Bankhead at a party on East 10th St." Since then Lloyd has directed plays "in most parts of Britain," winning the South of Scotland Critic's Circle Special Award in 1968. In 1972 he directed a highly successful season for the National Theatre of Sri Lanka. In recent years Lloyd has probably become bestknown for his brilliant series of "Shakespeare in Summer" productions in the parks of the inner London boroughs.

TIM ALLGOOD (Company Stage Manager) trained for a career in Market Research, and became interested in the theatre only through a chance holiday visit to a local production of THERE'S A GIRL IN MY SOUP. He had got himself taken on by the company as Assistant Stage Manager before he realized that the girl in question was not only in the soup, but also married, with two growing children! During a production of HAMLET at the Lyceum, Portsmouth, he took over the part of Polonius at short notice, but subsequently found himself more in demand on the technical side. His most recent job was with BETROTHED, a thriller by Sam Brennicle, both on the tour prior to its West End opening in December 1980, and again on the tour which followed the conclusion of its successful West End run in January 1981.

POPPY NORTON-TAYLOR (Assistant Stage Manager) is from a family found more often on the Boards of leading companies than on the boards with touring companies. Her father is chairman of European Breweries, but has been "terribly sweet about it all - so far!" After schools in Cheltenham and Montreux she found life far too full to leave time for work. So this is her first job and she is enjoying the challenge enormously. Her hobbies include riding, skiing, tennis, reading good books, and loving anything small and furry.

Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- *** Ushering** Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.



Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and Northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Single-ticket buyers and subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). These subscription seats are held until intermission. This, additionally, makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

Subscribers: Please call the Ticket Office at 836-2626 if you will not make your ticketed performance. Thank you.

Weathervane Traditions

Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.

Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on first Friday performances. We provide light snacks and refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.

For your sweet tooth snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission.

Refreshments (other than water) are not permitted in the auditorium.



Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theater (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, *The Grapes of Wrath* and *Little Women* will be

featured in the Project STAGE events. Tickets are only \$8.

Adult Classes




