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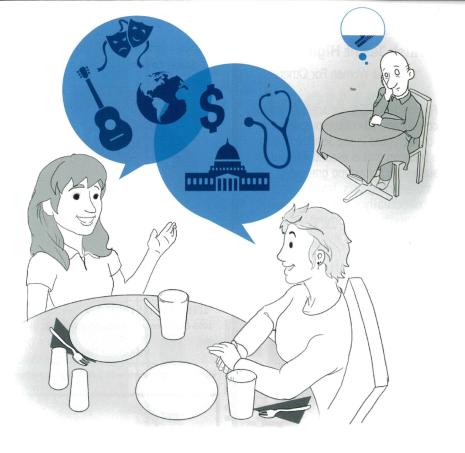


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A BRIEF HISTORY OF WEATHERVANE PLAYHOUSE

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members - Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch - and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works - even opera - with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/ Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 81st Season.

Our Dietz Theater is in its tenth season at Weathervane Playhouse. The space was repurposed from the old scene shop as part of the 2001 capital campaign. The Dietz Theater is named in honor of John L. Dietz, who was tragically lost in a car accident at a young age. He had a love of theater and Weathervane is grateful to Margaret Dietz for her continued commitment to productions in his name.

The Dietz Theater is a black box. This minimalistic and flexible type of space became popular in the 1960s and 70s. Because of the layout, it allows for staging to be done in many ways. Our own space has been used in many different configurations from traditional, to thrust, to nearly in the round. These productions often involve basic technical arrangements

and set construction. However, the scenic designs in the Dietz Theater have run the gamut from a large house in *Long Day's Journey Into Night* to a completely bare stage (save for chains bolted to the floor and a single hanging light bulb) to represent a prison cell in *Someone Who'll Watch Over Me.*

The first production in the Dietz was in January 2005 with Angels in America: Millennium Approaches. Thus began a series of shows ranging from those that required an intimate space, to the experimental, to the avant-garde. Often, due to the shows chosen and to the small space, these productions have been sold to capacity every performance and more performances added to accommodate patrons. Weathervane has only produced a musical in the Dietz Theater one other time in 2006, The Last Five Years. We hope you enjoy this production of Ordinary Days.

WELCOME FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

I was introduced to *Ordinary Days* through Scott Ferrall. He returned from a trip to New York two years ago and told me he found the most wonderful musical in a bargain bin at a theatre shop. He asked if I would like to be a part of a one night "sing through" to introduce the show to our Weathervane friends. "There's a perfect part for you," he said, "look at Deb." And then he laughed. I said, "Let me listen to the music and get back you." As I listened to the soundtrack, I was introduced to four New Yorkers living their lives in the city that never sleeps. I fell in love with Warren, his passion, and his

faith in the future. I adored Jason, knowing he had found his kindred spirit in Claire. I ached for Claire, who had experienced so much loss and heartbreak. And the college version of me found a kindred spirit in Deb—who so desperately wanted to do something important, but just wasn't sure how or where to begin. Also, Deb has a bit of an edge, which is also familiar, and I'm guessing the reason behind Scott's laugh.

I know you will fall in love with these characters and their stories. I know you will love Scott's concept which includes an ensemble. This ensemble portrays the heart of New York and what keeps the city moving—its people. "Love, :)"

Ordinary Days is a refreshingly honest and funny musical about making real connections in the city that never sleeps (but probably should at some point!) This intimate show tells the story of four young New Yorkers whose lives intersect as they search for fulfillment, happiness, love and cabs.

In *Ordinary Days* we meet Warren, an aspiring artist who's working as the assistant to a more established artist. By day, he passes out fliers advertising his boss's work — and along the way he cultivates his personal hobby of collecting found objects. One day, he stumbles across a notebook belonging to Deb, a student of literature who's writing her dissertation on Virginia Woolf. Warren arranges to meet Deb at the Metropolitan Museum of Art to reunite her with her notebook. Will this meeting present Warren with the opportunity to make a "real connection" or will Deb's no-nonsense attitude crush his hope?

The show's other two characters, Jason and Claire, also happen to be at the Met on the same day that Warren and Deb meet. Jason and Claire have recently started living together,

but this new intimacy has produced a new anxiety for this young couple. When Jason and Claire each choose to explore separate wings of the museum, the nagging doubts creep up: Can their fledgling relationship surmount their differences?

Through a score of vibrant and memorable songs, the experiences of four young people striving to find their way in the big city ring startlingly true to life. *Ordinary Days* is an original musical for anyone who's ever struggled to appreciate the simple things in a complex place. With equal doses of humor and poignancy, it celebrates how 8.3 million individual stories combine in unexpected ways to make New York City such a unique and extraordinary home.

Ordinary Days was selected for the 2008 National Alliance for Musical Theatre Festival of New Musicals. After productions at Pennsylvania Centre Stage, the Finborough Theatre in London and at universities across the country, Ordinary Days opened Off-Broadway in October 2009 at the Roundabout Theatre Company's Harold and Miriam Steinberg Center for Theatre.



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ABOUT THE SHOW'S COMPOSER AND LYRICIST

ADAM GWON is a rising musical theater writer named one of "50 to Watch" by The Dramatist magazine. He won the 2008 Fred Ebb Award for excellence in musical-theater songwriting, the 2011 Kleban Prize in Musical Theatre (in the lyricist category and has been hailed as "an extremely talented composer and lyricist" who "is seriously going places" (according to The New York Sun and StageSpace.com, respectively).

In describing his creation of *Ordinary Days*, Gwon explained to *Upstage* magazine that "I'm a huge believer that form is born out of content, and so, because I knew I'd be stitching together a narrative told through individual songs and vignettes, I came up with this story about people struggling to make connections with each other and with the world around them.

"It was my thought that the audience would have to actively be connecting the dots of the story as they watched, since the story is essentially told in fragments, and I liked the idea of engaging the audience to make connections in a show about the importance of making connections. You get the idea."

As a composer, Gwon's other shows include *The Boy Detective Fails* (book by Joe Meno), *Bernice Bobs Her Hair* (book/lyrics by Julia Jordan) and *Ethan Frome* (book by Michael Ruby).

His work has been developed and produced by such companies as Roundabout Theatre Company, Primary Stages, the York Theatre, Signature Theatre Company, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Ars Nova, New Dramatists, the Johnny Mercer Foundation/American Music Theatre Project, Symphony Space, the Disney/American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) Musical Theatre Workshop, Tribeca Performing Arts Center, the Flea Theater and many others.

His other honors include the ASCAP Foundation Harold Adamson Lyric Award, the John Wallowitch Award from the Manhattan Association of Cabarets & Clubs as well as commissions from Signature Theatre in Arlington, Virginia (as part of its American Musical Voices Project: The Next Generation), South Coast Repertory, Broadway Across America, and the Ensemble Studio Theatre/Alfred P. Sloan Foundation Science and Technology Project.

Gwon has been a MacDowell Colony fellow, a musical theater fellow at the Dramatists Guild, and an artist-in-residence at Weston Playhouse. A graduate of New York University's Tisch School of the Arts, he is a member of ASCAP and the Dramatists Guild.

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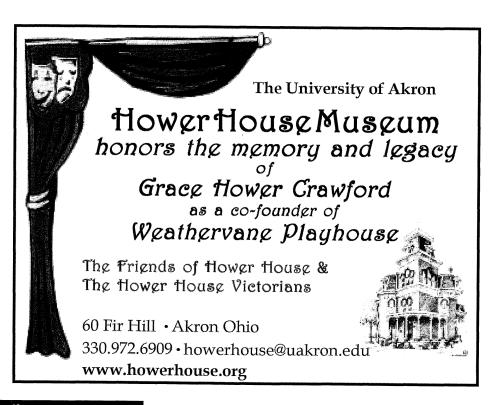
DIRECTOR'S NOTES

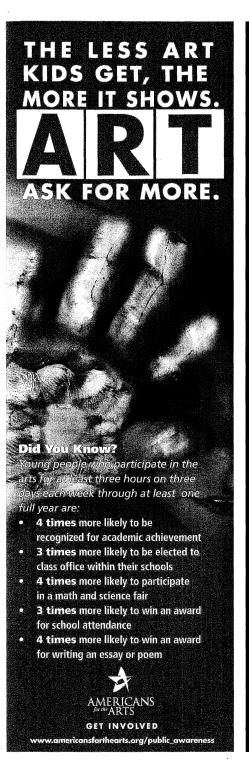
Ordinary Days Alan Scott Ferrall

My love for New York City happened with my first trip to the city during spring break with my oldest brother, Jeff, and two fraternity brothers; for whatever reason I was invited along, too. I remember that my love affair began as we had breakfast at a Burger King in New Jersey – and then I recall marveling at the tall towers and art deco architecture of Manhattan when we drove over the bridges heading toward Lincoln Tunnel. My dad was practical – he had "seen" New York. When I returned to New York with my mother, she and I were forever changed. In 1980, she and I began what would become a yearly pilgrimage to the city.

New York is exciting, dangerous and glamorous and ever-changing. Stores restaurants, theaters, even entire buildings will be transformed year

by year. We head - still do - every morning, to buy theater tickets at the various TKTS booths located somewhere in lower Manhattan and then start walking north. On the seven-mile walk from lower Manhattan to Broadway, we always hit the highlights: shopping for knock-off perfume in Chinatown, The Broome Street Bar and Grille (best burger anywhere!) and the Strand bookstore. How The Strand manages to survive when parts of New York can't is a miracle. Walking among the stacks, I found a CD of a cast recording of a musical named "Ordinary Days." The CD's cover showed a skyline of the city and four harried New Yorkers. Without knowing anything about this show, I bought the CD. I discovered a story of people trying to make sense of their lives in a city that never sleeps. I like the energy, the history, the sadness and the joy that is New York. New Yorkers see the possibilities of living in the city.









ALAN SCOTT FERRALL (Director/Scenic Designer) started as a volunteer under friend and mentor John R. Thomas in 1988. He served as Weathervane's full-time technical director and

resident scenic designer for 18 seasons and has had the greatest pleasure working with our volunteers to pull off some pretty amazing work. Scott has seven Chanticleer Awards, mostly in lighting design, and a 2013 Trustee Award. He has also written six plays for children: Two Swords, A Bag of Marbles and a PB and J, How the Bee Learned to Spell, The Mystery of The Missing Robot, The Legend of the Gold Doubloons, A Tale of Two Dragons and The Case of the Beautified Forest. He also has written and directed sketch comedy for the Not-Yet-Ready-for-Mainstage Players at our annual Chanticleer Awards. Scott directed a staged reading of Ordinary Days in the summer of 2014 and is pleased to present a fully realized show this season.



JOHN EBNER (Musical Director) most recently served as Musical Director for *Hair* at Weathervane. In past seasons, he was musical director of The Roar of the Greasepaint - the Smell of the

Crowd, Ordinary Days (staged reading), Dirty Rotten Scoundrels, Christmas My Way, Xanadu, The Drowsy Chaperone, Putting it Together and Ragtime. He received a YACTA Marquee Award (Youngstown Area Community Theater Association) and a Chanticleer award for Ragtime and another Chanticleer for The Drowsy Chaperone. He has worked extensively in a variety of ways as a musical director, keyboardist and accompanist for Canton Cabaret, Carousel Dinner Theatre, Coach House Theatre, Ohio Shakespeare Festival, The Players Guild of Canton, North Canton Playhouse, Kent State-Stark Campus, Western Reserve Playhouse and Voices of Canton. He has performed with Arthur Fiedler, Paul Williams and a Billy Joel Tribute band at Cleveland's House of Blues. Iohn is a retired music teacher and continues to work with locals schools in Stark and Summit counties. John says, "It is a pleasure and honor to get to work with Scott Ferrall as this show's director."



JJ MCADAMS (Stage Manager) is a graduate of Kent State University with a BFA in Theatre Design/ Technology and a certificate in Teaching English as a Foreign Language. She is

currently working for Disney Cruise Line aboard the Disney Magic as the Props and Puppets Stage Technician. JJ got her start in theatre here at Weathervane in 2008 and has been involved backstage in many productions here over the years. She is excited to return and to work on her favorite musical with her Weathervane family!



IONATHON HUNTER (Lighting) Sound/Projection Designer) has designed Weathervane lighting for productions including Peter Pan, Oklahoma!; A Delicate Balance, The Roar of the Greasepaint —

The Smell of the Crowd, Dirty Rotten Scoundrels, The Music Man, Rodgers and Hammerstein's Cinderella and Pippin. He holds an M.F.A. degree in lighting design from the University of Virginia and is currently Weathervane's Technical Director. Jonathon's other Weathervane credits include scenic design for Dracula and Peter Pan, properties designer for A View from the Bridge, Breaking the Code and The Sum of Us and stage manager for They're Playing Our Song.

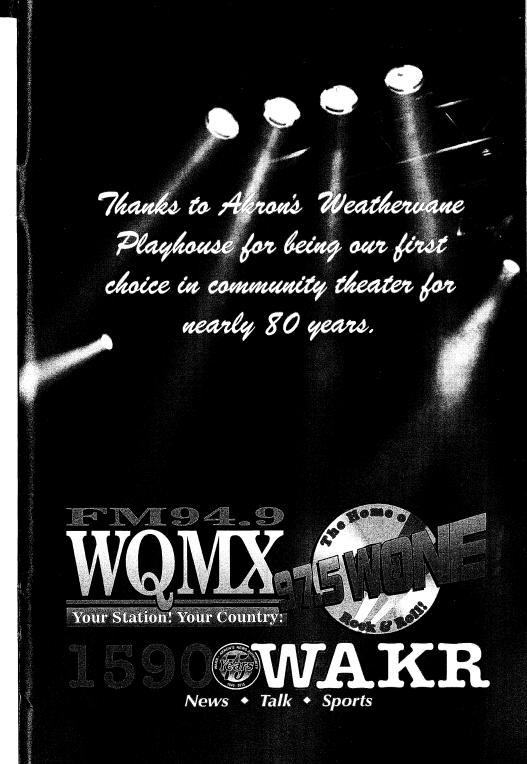

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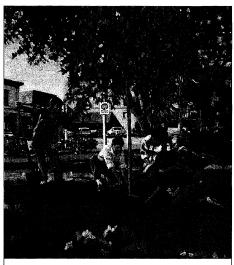
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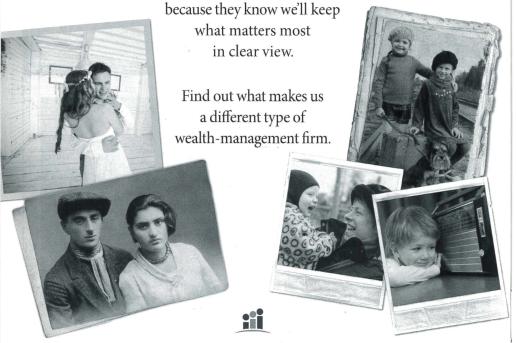
