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

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre, improvisation and design for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and Tuesdays evenings. Two-week Hands-on Theatre (H.O.T.) workshops are offered throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE© program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, Fences, All My Sons and Romeo &

Juliet will be featured in the Project STAGE© events. Tickets are \$8.

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
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
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

* Capital Project The construction segment of the Capital Project in 2000 included a scene shop with basement storage, a 2nd-floor classroom and rehearsal hall, soundproof production booth, elevator and fly gallery pocket above the stage and installation of the rigging system for the fly gallery. Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.



Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.



Women's Board

The Women's Board was formed in 1938 to "offer voluntary service and financial assistance to the Playhouse." Women's Board has energized youth education programs, sponsored productions, spearheaded fund raisers and paid for many of the amenities we appreciate in the Green Room/kitchen. Members of this active group are invaluable as hostesses, office helpers and backstage. The Women's Board sponsors an annual puppet presentation for children and also operates the Gift Boutique and Bank One Art Gallery.

New members are welcomed.

HARCAR (Interim Executive Director and Director of Marketing & Development) holds a Master of Arts degree in Arts Administration from The University of Akron and a Bachelor of Science degree in Music Education from Kent State University and has been a Weathervane staff member since 1993. She served Weathervane Playhouse as Interim Executive Director at a previous time. Janis is the Artistic Director of the Ravenna Community Choir and Director of St. Paul Lutheran Church Choir also in Ravenna. She was honored with the 2003 Trustees Award.

Before Weathervane, he worked at Cuyahoga Falls High School where he was awarded a Design Excellence citation from USITT and a place in Who's Who Among America's Teachers. He has designed for many local high schools as well as for The Players Guild, Cleveland Signstage and Channels 45/49. Scott has earned four Chanticleer Awards -- one as stage manager for Fences, the others as lighting co-designer for A Man for All Seasons and lighting designer for The Laramie Project and A Lesson Before Dying. He takes great pleasure in writing the end-of-the-season revue for The Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players who appear at our annual Chanticleer Awards Dinner. This is his tenth season.

MELANIE Y.C. PEPE (Interim Director of Education) holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Kent State University. She has been teaching classes at Weathervane since 1998 and has served as the supervisor of Weathervane's City of Akron-sponsored Neighborhood Playhouse program. She served as Development Associate for our Capital Campaign for two years. Melanie does most of her work in make-up design and has worked with NEOUCOM, College of Medicine; Blue City Productions and Firestone High School's Visual and Performing Arts Program. She lives in Akron with her husband, Christopher, and three children: Jude, Zavier and Calista.

KEITH D. CAMPBELL (Supervisor Front-of-House & Patron Services) holds a B.A. in English from The University of Akron, where he served as editor of *The Buchtelite* and sang with the Akron Symphony Chorus. During the summers of 1995 and 1996, he interned in the box office at Porthouse Theatre Company. Keith joined the Weathervane staff in November 1996 and was honored with the 2005 Trustees Award. He lives in Akron.

KATHRYN A. KOHL (Assistant Technical Director) holds a degree in Elementary Education from BGSU and a Master of Business Management degree from Aurora College in Aurora, IL. She began her theater career as a volunteer on many lighting, set construction and props crews. She won a Chanticleer for properties co-design of *The Philadelphia Story*. Kathy also serves as Resident Master Carpenter and Master Painter for the Theatre Department at Firestone High School. She lives in West Akron with hus-



band Doug and their three children, Stephanie, Zachary and Katie.

DREAJEAN L. BROWN (Data Services Manager) holds a M.S. degree in Technical Education and a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from The University of Akron. Michele Lowe is the author of Mezzulah, 1946 (City Theatre of Pittsburgh), String of Pearls (Outer Critics Circle Award nomination), The Smell of the Kill (Broadway debut) Backsliding in the Promised Land (Syracuse Stage), Map of Heaven, Good on Paper and Hit the Lights! (book and lyrics). She most recently completed Inana, which was commissioned by the Denver Theatre Centre. Michele has participated in the Eugene O'Neill National Music Theatre Conference, The New Harmony Project, PlayLabs, New York Stage and Film and the ACT & Hedgebrook Women Playwrights Festival. Her work has been produced at Primary Stages, Vineyard Theatre, Intiman, City Theatre, Reykjavik City Theatre (Iceland), Berkshire Theatre Festival, Cleveland Play House and Cincinnati Play House in the Park, among others. Michele's work appears in Best Plays of 2005 (Smith & Knaus, 2006) and New Monologues for Women by Women (Heinemann, 2004). For television she has written several episodes of Little Bear based on characters created by Maurice Sendak. Screenplays include The Emergence of Emily Stark and Quitting Texas for Avenue Pictures. Michele is a recipient of the Frankel Award. She is a graduate of Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism. In the John L. Dietz Theater

Once Weathervane had a theater to call its very own on Copley Road in the 1950s, the wish/need for another smaller "black box" theater surfaced. A goal of the Capital Campaign of 2000 was to add new classrooms for the theater's numerous children's programs. The campaign raised \$1,750,000 and provided a two-story addition. New classrooms became a reality as well as the installation of a fly system over the stage.

One of the classrooms was sponsored by **Margaret J. Dietz** and named in memory of her 12-year-old son, **John L. Dietz**. This space became the "black box" theater so long awaited. John was a sixth grader at Akron's Rankin School at the time of his death in 1971 following an auto accident. A darling boy with a passion, even at that age, for play-acting, he had just finished playing a clown in a youth theater production of *Aesop's Fables*.


Angels in America: Millennium Approaches was the inaugural presentation held in Weathervane's new "black box" theater. Running from Jan. 23 to Feb. 5, 2005, the Pulitzer Prize-winning play was directed by Sean McConaha.

Parallel Lives: The Kathy and Mo Show by Mo Gaffney and Kathy Najimy (July 28 - 30 and Aug. 4 - 6, 2005) was the next production for the Dietz Theater. Angels in America: Millennium Approaches was remounted Nov. 10 - 19, 2005, as a preface to Part Two: Perestroika presented May 18 - June 3, 2006. Then came Fat Men in Skirts in collaboration with Just Life and Company, July 28 - Aug. 6, 2006.

During the first part of our 2006-2007 season we presented Jason Robert Brown's contemporary musical, *The Last Five Years* and, now, Michele Lowe's, *String of Pearls*.



- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.

- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.


Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.


Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.





Awards are presented for outstanding lead performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding lead performances in a musical, outstanding featured and sup-


