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
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



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
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


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### A BRIEF HISTORY OF WEATHERVANE PLAYHOUSE

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley ...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members – Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch – and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/ Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season. Weathervane is proud to celebrate its 81st Season.


All the students participating in this exhibit are from Mr. Patrick Dougherty's Portfolio Class. Eight of these students are juniors in the VPA (Visual and Performing Arts) program and art is their main focus. The rest of the students are seniors in advanced classes, having taken Drawing I & II, and, in some cases, painting. There are also two students from the International Baccalaureate Program who are in the Art Studio Program.

Each student chose the medium in which he or she wanted to work. The theme for the exhibit is "Family: A Narrative." The students discussed the play *Clybourne Park*. The art they've created reflects their thoughts and feelings as they relate to their own families and the families portrayed onstage.

Nathaniel Duvuvuei, Learning Specialist of the APS (Akron Public Schools) Fine Arts Department, approved funding for the materials needed for this important project. Weathervane would like to thank him for supporting this special exhibit. We are delighted to have this opportunity to feature the talents of these gifted students in The Harris Family Gallery.



### ABOUT THE SHOW

Based on the young-adult novel by Dave Barry and Ridley Pearson, *Peter and the Starcatcher* has been described as "a grownup's prequel to *Peter Pan*." In this fast-moving adventure tale, a company of a dozen actors portray more than a hundred unforgettable characters who reveal the answer to the century-old question: How did Peter Pan become The Boy Who Never Grew Up?

Molly Aster is a 13-year-old Starcatcher Apprentice who finds herself in the company of pirates, a giant crocodile and angry Mollusks as she and three orphan boys (one of whom happens to be unnamed) attempt to return a trunk of precious star-stuff to her father. The star-stuff is important because it is a magical material that falls from the stars. Those who possess star-stuff are endowed with happiness, power and the ability to fly! Molly is determined to keep the star-stuff out of the hands of evildoers, and adventures abound as she and her cohorts are pursued by a mustachioed pirate captain and his sidekick Smee.

A show full of wildly imaginative and inventive theater, *Peter and the Starcatcher* is a hilarious flight of fancy that brings the magic of theatre to life.

Peter and the Starcatcher was commissioned by Disney Theatrical Productions and premiered in February 2009 at the La Jolla Playhouse in California as part of the company's Page to Stage Play Development program. After a couple more years of tweaking, the play moved east to the New York Theatre Workshop, where it ran at the Off-Broadway theater for a month and a half in the spring of 2011.

With great success at New York Theatre Workshop, including multiple extensions, the play transferred to Broadway to the Brooks Atkinson Theatre, where it opened on April 15, 2012 (featuring nearly all of the Off-Broadway cast members). The Broadway production closed on January 20, 2013 after 319 regular performances, but then reopened two months later at New World Stages, an Off-Broadway theater. After nearly three straight years in New York City, *Peter and the Starcatcher* closed on January 12, 2014. A national tour of the show also started in August 2013 and played across the United States through May 2014.

Peter and the Starcatcher is one of the first "plays with music" to run in an Off-Broadway theater, transfer to Broadway, and then move back to an Off-Broadway venue once more. Peter and the Starcatcher received nine Tony Award nominations, and took home five Tonys (for best costume design, best lighting design, best sound design, best scenic design and best featured actor for Christian Borle). The 2011 Off-Broadway production won two Lucille Lortel Awards (one for its choreography and one for lead-actor Borle) and a Village Voice Obie Award for the show's original directing team (Roger Rees and Alex Timbers).


### ABOUT THE SHOW'S CREATORS

Playwright **RICK ELICE**'s Broadway credits include co-writing (with Marshall Brickman) the books for both *Jersey Boys* and *The Addams Family*. His regional theater credits include *Turn of the Century* (with Marshall Brickman; directed by Tommy Tune); *Double Double* (directed by Roger Rees); *Dog and Pony* (with Michael Patrick Walker); and *Studio 54* (with Stephen Trask, Peter Yanowitz; directed by Christopher Ashley).

Composer WAYNE BARKER won the 2011 Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Music in a Play for *Peter and the Starcatcher*. His other Broadway credits as a composer or arranger include *Dame Edna: Back With a Vengeance, After the* 

Night and the Music and All About Me. Regionally, his credits include The Great Gatsby (Guthrie Theatre), Twelfth Night and The Three Musketeers (Seattle Rep). Other credits: Mark Bennett's A Midsummer Night's Dream (orchestrations) Chicago City Limits, the Raymond Scott Orchestrette, and various orchestras worldwide. A longstanding member of the Dramatists Guild, he also serves as an artistic associate for new musicals at New York Theatre Workshop.
