









- \* Emergency Exits are located at the left front of the auditorium and the left side of the lobby. Front door and main lobby side exits will also be used in case of emergency.

- ★ Beverages and Food may not be taken into the auditorium during performances.

- performances and at 2:30 p.m. for Sunday matinees. We appreciate audience courtesy in arriving on time.
- ★ Latecomers will be quietly seated at the rear of the auditorium during a suitable break in the play if space is available and may take their reserved seats after intermission.
- ★ Exiting the Theater For safety and as a courtesy to other patrons and the performers, please remain seated until the auditorium lights are on at intermission or after the show. Auditorium doors will not be opened until the house lights are on. Parking lot illumination assures that getting to your car will be easy and secure.
- ★ Smoking Weathervane Playhouse is a smoke-free facility. Smoking is permitted outside the building.
- ★ Lost and Found items will be held at the Ticket Office until claimed. Please inquire about them during business hours.

- ★ Tickets may be purchased by telephone when you call (330) 836-2626 Tuesdays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. You may also purchase tickets in person during these hours. On performance Saturdays only, the Ticket Office is open from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The Ticket Office is also open one hour prior to all performances and remains open through the first intermission.
- \* Telephone reservations must be charged to a Visa, MasterCard or Discover credit card. Reservations are also required when using coupons from your Weathervane Super Coupon book, complimentary tickets or coupons offered from any other cooperating arts organization. Please arrive at the Ticket Office at least 20 minutes before curtain time to pick up your tickets. Any unclaimed tickets will be released for sale to waiting ticket buyers five minutes prior to curtain at the discretion of the Ticket Office Manager and volunteers.
- ★ Special seating Please inform us if you have seating preferences, or require special attention due to visual, auditory or other physical needs. We'll do our best to accommodate you, but please remember orders are filled on a first-come, first-served basis with season subscribers and advanced group sales taking first priority.
- \* Super Coupon holders are reminded that coupons do *not* ensure seats for a specific performance. Please call the box office early to reserve seats with these prepaid coupons.
- \* Season Subscriber Exchange Please call the Ticket Office at (330) 836-2626 if you wish to exchange your subscription seat for another performance of the same show. Exchanges must be phoned in at least 24 hours prior to your originally

- scheduled performance. We can't always guarantee the same seats but we'll give you the closest available replacements. An upgrade fee will be charged when changing subscription seats from the Preview Series to any other performance. If you cannot use your subscription seats, please call us at least 24 hours in advance to release them. We will recognize this as a donation to Weathervane.





#### From the Barn to the Valley A Brief Weathervane History



From 1935 until 1951. Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue in Akron. The

Barn, as it was known, has long since been destroyed but there are still a few people who recall its cramped quarters and especially the energy and devotion of the four ladies, Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it all happen. The plaque in our lobby lists the names of the other founders who shared their commitment and who joined their ambitious mission. producing everything from light comedy to Shakespeare and opera.

Though the Barn is now only a memory, its rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.

Except in 1948 when located at the Pythian Temple, the Barn was home to Weathervane until 1951. Then the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and became a more accommodating 100-seat facility. In 1960, Weathervane hired its first professional director, Bob Belfance, who served until 1992. Along with long-time custodian/ticket office manager, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions and Weathervane existed on a lean budget. Ticket office receipts, along with donations and community support, helped Weathervane meet expenses and created a modest endowment fund. Volunteers still nourish all of Weathervane's activities.

In the mid-1960's, a fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263seat facility which opened in 1970, one of the first enterprises at the head of the corridor into the Cuyahoga Valley National Recreation Area. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has since been paid off. Growing audience demand for live entertainment and theater education continues to underscore Weathervane's needs for increased community support.

In its nearly seven decades, Weathervane has constructed, torn down, recycled, painted and refitted stage settings for more than 500 productions (when Stage Two and Youth Theater productions are included). We've stitched up hundreds of costumes, created lighting magic by the multi-watt, crafted reality out of scores of stage properties and, most of all, shared the talents of well over a thousand amateur performers, who take their performance curtain calls to the applause of more than a hundred thousand theater goers. This effort is the result of volunteer dedication based on the founders' original philosophy that "all who can contribute are welcome."

Our volunteer archivist, Cue Fleming, has compiled the impressive list of productions back to 1935, a record of the dedication of those who have given their time to present each show to please the audiences who seek entertainment excellence each time the lights go up. 

Shortly after the final production of each season, Weathervane volunteers and friends share an exciting party to acknowledge outstanding performances by performers and technical volunteers. The top performers are awarded rooster statuettes— Chanticleers—in recognition of their work, as voted by Chanticleer "judges" who have seen all productions during the season. It's a great night to get together, share hopes, fun and festivities and is open to all.

If you'd like to take an additional part in Chanticleer night and serve as a juror to vote for the award winners, all that is required is your affidavit that you have seen all seven shows during the season, and your choices for outstanding lead performances by a male or female in a drama or comedy, outstanding support performances, and outstanding lead and support in a musical as well as choices in technical achievement. Chanticleers are also awarded for Properties, Lights, Costumes and Sound Design, plus Best Production of the season. In addition to performance and production awards, the event also recognizes outstanding volunteers of the year.

Chanticleer ballots are available during the run of the season's final show in July or August each year. We welcome regular theater-goers who'd like to take part in the jurying and join us for the biggest nail-biting party of the year. For information, please call our office.





#### Theater Education at Weathervane

#### Youth Theater

Weathervane's mission to provide children's theatrical education began with Junior Weathervane classes in 1937. The education program has continued to grow since then with workshops and classes, plus production opportunities for children. In the 2000-2001 season, we offer professionally taught classes in acting. stagecraft and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays at Weathervane. In addition, two-week workshops for children are planned throughout the summer months. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available for motivated students and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children from throughout the community may also audition for roles in Youth Theater productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides in our **Project STAGE** program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as two productions each season. This season, *The Glass Menagerie* and *Of Mice and* 

*Men* will be featured in the **Project STAGE** events.

#### About the Play & Playwright The Philadelphia Story by Philip Barry

In 1938, motion picture exhibitors labeled Oscar-winning actress Katherine Hepburn "box-office poison" after she starred in three flop films. Hepburn bought out her contract and fled Hollywood for her family enclave in Hartford, Connecticut. Her career in pictures seemed at an end.

To her rescue came an old friend, playwright Philip Barry. Barry's forte was the comedy of manners and the privileged classes "enjoying their privileges." Barry was in a slump of his own. After having six hits on Broadway from 1927 to 1932, his reputation quickly sank in a series of failures. Then came *The Philadelphia Story*. Barry wrote two acts of the play with Hepburn in mind as the haughty Tracy Lord, then went to Connecticut to recruit her involvement. Hepburn quickly agreed to star.

The Theatre Guild soon entered the picture. Always on the brink of financial ruin, the Guild struggled to raise the cash to produce the play. Neither Barry nor Hepburn knew of the Guild's troubles. The Guild didn't know of Hepburn's faded stardom and neither of them knew that Barry had no idea how to finish his play.

All worry was for naught, though. The play opened in 1939 to rave reviews for both playwright and star. The Philadelphia Story also featured actors later to make their mark in the movies as well: Van Heflin, Joseph Cotton and Shirley Booth. It played 417 performances before being sold to the movies. Being a savvy businesswoman, Hepburn persuaded friend Howard Hughes to buy the movie rights for the play, who turned around and sold them to her. Hepburn approached MGM with the rights, and asked that Spencer Tracy be assigned to the picture. Instead, she got Cary Grant. Grant chose the part of exhusband, C.K. Dexter Haven, with the part of reporter Macaulay Connor going to Jimmy Stewart. The 1940 movie was a smash and reestablished Hepburn's second career in Hollywood. It earned Oscar nominations for Jimmy Stewart and Donald Ogden Stewart, who adapted the play for the film. Both nominees won, and Cary Grant was denied his only Oscar bid.

The Philadelphia Story was later remade into a successful movie musical, High Society, starring Grace Kelly, Frank Sinatra and Bing Crosby. Cole Porter assembled a hitladen soundtrack that included True Love and Well Did You Evah?. In 1999, a less successful musical appeared on Broadway with other Porter songs rounding out the score.

Katherine Hepburn starred in two other movie versions of Philip Barry plays — Holiday, starring with Grant, and Without Love, appearing with Spencer Tracy. She also holds the record for Oscar-winning performances for Morning Glory, The Lion in Winter, Guess Who's Coming to Dinner and On Golden Pond.

If longevity is a true test of comedy, *The Philadelphia Story* is as true as they come. Even though it was written more than six decades ago, the comedy in Philip Barry's play is as honest and charming as it ever has been. I have no reason to doubt that it will remain so for many decades to come. She began learning her art in seventh grade when her aunt gave her a pressed flower bookmark. After mastering bookmarks, she studied other pressing techniques. She presses them in books but also builds her own flower presses. Twenty-four years of experience and a two-year Natural Science degree have contributed significantly to Lisa's unique artistic design, matting, framing, selection and use of plant material.

Most of the paper products she uses are hand cut – bookmarks, background papers and mats as well as glass. Although it's time-consuming, she tries to keep with the "handmade" tradition and avoid the commercial process in every aspect of her work. The most unique aspect of her framed work is the variety of material used. Newly made, used and antique frames are all incorporated into her collection, providing decoration for most any taste and décor.

#### Who Gets On Stage at Weathervane?

The performers you see on the Weathervane stage come from throughout the greater Akron and surrounding areas. They're volunteers, just like the many men and women who supply backstage talent to make sure the show goes on performance after performance. They've committed themselves to four to six weeks of rehearsals plus perfor-

mances, and their greatest reward is your applause.

performers Many come to our shows with substantial theatrical experience. Others may be new to the stage. Frequently we find that talented newcomers to our area find that Weathervane is a great way to make new friends especially if they've

been involved with community productions in their former home town.

Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for performance opportunities for ethnic minority actors and others who may be physically or mentally challenged. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent and sincerity of purpose.

To find out how you can get on stage, check the newspaper for audition dates and times or call Weathervane at (330)836-2626 if you are interested in auditioning for a role in one of our upcoming productions or in a Youth Theater production. We'll tell you about requirements.

Weathervane shows are never "precast." When you've been in a show or auditioned, your name will be included in our file so we can send you future audition notices. Some guest directors prefer to set appointments for audition

> times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

> When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, learn about the you'll rehearsal and performance

schedule ahead. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for callbacks and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged. Come try again. The next show may suit you even better!




#### Put On Your Own Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* Indians game? Weathervane has the same problem. Single-ticket buyers and subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). These subscription seats are held until intermission. This, additionally, makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

Weathervane Business Office hours are from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday at (330) 836- 2323. To place ticket orders, the Ticket Office at (330) 836-2626 is open Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and reopens one hour before performances. During performances, the Ticket Office opens one hour before each performance and remains open through the first intermission only. On performance Saturdays only, the Ticket Office is open from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Ticket hours on performance Sundays begin at 1:30 p.m. Reservations may be made in person or by telephone with a credit card number.

Of course, rehearsals, set construction, classes and performance times often mean that staff and volunteers are likely to be available at other times than the hours noted during the week. 

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work night after night. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call our Production and Volunteer Coordinator, Maryanne Cotter, at (330) 836-2323. Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- \* Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A fulfilling responsibility for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- \* Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. We appreciate all the help we can find to design and build sets, move them and tear them down after a show to make new ones.
- \* Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We need skilled and even unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized. Add your design ideas or learn from other hard-working volunteers.
- \* Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. You'll take pride in knowing that nobody can see the show without you.
- \* Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural environment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system

for technical rehearsals and productions. We'll help you learn.

- \* Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. We need many volunteers to work on each performance. If you are clever at building things or have friends with "neat stuff" they'll loan, volunteer here.
- \* Box Office If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations.
- ★ Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, showing them to their seats, passing out programs, and serving refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- \* House Manager The theater's unofficial representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theatergoers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.
- \* Office Volunteer Put a few morning or afternoon hours to good use answering phones, taking reservations, helping with mailings, working with staff, and greeting customers and visitors. Many friendly people are needed to help.
