

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
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A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse


From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...


Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works - even opera - with casting open to anyone who fit a part.


The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.

About the Play and Playwright

Becca and Howie are a young married couple comfortably situated in the Westchester County village of Larchmont, New York (about 30 miles north of Manhattan). All notions of normalcy disappear when a sudden and incomprehensible accident results in the death of their four-year-old son, Danny. As they struggle to cope with the aftermath of their stunning loss, Becca and Howie's marriage begins to unravel. While Becca chooses to ignore her grief, Howie holds fast to his memories. Meanwhile, Becca's sister, Izzy, and their mother, Nat, complicate an already tense domestic situation. The sudden re-appearance of Jason, the young man who drove the car that killed Danny, unexpectedly offers a glimmer of hope as the family charts the emotional terrain of grief.

Playwright David Lindsay-Abaire told *The New York Times* in 2006 that *Rabbit Hole* "is about how people grieve – how they grieve in very different ways and what can happen when those differences are at odds with each other within a family, specifically. I hope that it's about people finding their way back into the light of day and finding hope where they thought there was none."

Rabbit Hole was originally commissioned by South Coast Repertory in Costa Mesa, California, which gave the play a staged reading in its Pacific Playwrights Festival. Positive critical reaction to the script encouraged Manhattan Theatre Club to produce the play on Broadway. Rabbit Hole began previews at the Biltmore Theatre in New York City on Jan. 12, 2006. Its official opening night was Feb. 2, 2006, and it played for 77 performances before closing April 9, 2006. The production – directed by Daniel Sullivan – earned five Tony Award nominations and won one: Cynthia Nixon for Best Actress in a Play for her portrayal of Becca. For his play, David Lindsay-Abaire won the 2007 Pulitzer Prize for Drama.

Filming has wrapped on a motion-picture adaptation of the play. The film's producers tapped playwright Lindsay-Abaire to adapt his own play for the silver screen. Under the direction of *Hedwig and the Angry Inch* co-creator John Cameron Mitchell, the movie version of *Rabbit Hole* stars Nicole Kidman (who also produced the film) as Becca, Aaron Eckhart as Howie and Dianne Wiest as Nat. The film is slated for a theatrical release in 2010.

About the Playwright

Playwright, lyricist and screenwriter **David Lindsay-Abaire** was born in 1969 in South Boston, Massachusetts. One of five siblings in a working-class family, his mother was a factory worker and his father worked for a fruit market. He attended public schools until the seventh grade, after which a scholarship enabled him to complete his early education at Milton Academy, one of New England's oldest "prep" boarding schools.

At Milton, he discovered theater, which inspired him to major in it at Sarah Lawrence College. After graduation, he moved to New York City, where he found work as an arts administrator at Dance Theater Workshop and he continued to write plays, some of which were produced at Off-Off Broadway venues (such as SoHo Rep). He was also accepted into the Lila Acheson Wallace American Playwrights Program at the Juilliard School, where his teachers included playwrights Marsha Norman and Christopher Durang.

His first New York "hit" was *Fuddy Meers*, a comic drama about a woman with amnesia, which Manhattan Theatre Club produced Off-Broadway in 1999. Lindsay-Abaire continued his association with MTC two years later when the non-profit theater company staged his next play, *Wonder of the World*, with Sarah Jessica Parker as a woman who leaves her husband and jumps on a bus to Niagara Falls. In 2003, MTC staged his next play, *Kimberly Akimbo*, the story of a woman with a premature-aging disease. *continued...About the Playwright on the Gallery page...*

About Our Director

STEPHEN SKILES (Director) is an assistant professor of theatre in the School of Dance, Theatre and Arts Administration at The University of Akron. He is a professional actor and director, having performed at such theatres as the Ohio Shakespeare Festival, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, The Bang and the Clatter Theatre Company, The Phoenix Theatre, The Kentucky Shakespeare Festival, Monomoy Theatre and The Repertory Theatre of St. Louis. He was also a founding member and actor of the Cincinnati Shakespeare Company. His directing credits include the Cincinnati Playhouse, The Bang and the Clatter Theatre, Ensemble Theatre of Cincinnati, Xavier University, Cincinnati State Technical and Community College, Anderson High School, The University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music Preparatory Program and The Drama Workshop. Mr. Skiles is an active member of Actors' Equity Association and an associate member of the Stage Directors and Choreographers Society. He received his undergraduate degree in theatre from Hanover College and is a proud graduate of the Professional Actor Training Program at Ohio University.

Director's Notes

I was struck by several things upon reading *Rabbit Hole* for the first time. The most surprising, however, was how many funny moments there were in the play.

Certainly, the play is heartbreakingly written. The five characters in *Rabbit Hole* have faced a terrible tragedy. Their lives have fundamentally changed. Each one of them has begun a search for ways to put the pieces back together, a search for something to help them understand, or at least accept, the unexplainable.

But, while the journey these five characters (and especially the main character of Becca) take is difficult, the overall tone of the play is not primarily one of sadness. What set *Rabbit Hole* apart for me was the playwright's understanding of the human spirit, with all of its idiosyncratic nuances.

A theatre is much like a rabbit hole. We enter a space, the lights go down and over a period of seconds we are warped to another time and place. The lights come up, and we get to view — from the outside — a glimpse of another world. Our reality, similar to that of the characters in this play, is literally turned upside down.

Each character has been thrown down a metaphorical rabbit hole. In the end we are left with the hope that peace may emerge on the other side.

Mr. Hedges has an extensive background in theatre as both an actor and a producer. Prior to coming to Weathervane, John spent ten years in the acting company at the Barter Theatre in Virginia, where he performed in over sixty shows. Other acting credits include performances at Town Hall in New York and the Pantages Theatre in Los Angeles. Regionally he has worked at the Indiana Repertory Theatre, the Kentucky Shakespeare Festival, Actors Theatre of Louisville and the American Stage Festival, where he appeared opposite Academy Award-winner Olympia Dukakis in The Cherry Orchard. John has been Managing Director of First Stage Milwaukee, Associate Producer of North Shore Music Theatre, Business Director of Gloucester Stage Company and General Manager of New York's award-winning Pearl Theatre Company. Mr. Hedges is a member of Actors' Equity Association, served on the Board of Directors of Boston's StageSource and chaired its Strategic Planning Committee, been a Conference Panelist for the American Alliance for Theatre & Education and written for American Theatre magazine. He studied at Indiana State University and the Professional Theatre Training Program at the University of Delaware, is a graduate of the National Shakespeare Conservatory and holds an honorary MFA in theatre from Stafford University. A 2009 graduate of Leadership Akron (Class XXV), John lives in Akron with his wife, Melissa Owens, and their daughters Rachel and Mary.

In the Harris Family Gallery

Because Rabbit Hole deals with a family's loss of their young child and the ways in which all are trying to cope with that tragedy, I thought that an exhibit featuring art therapy would be appropriate. Everyone may not be familiar with art therapy and its benefits. Since education is part of the Weathervane Playhouse mission, this seemed to provide a perfect opportunity to explore art therapy as a means of dealing with grief and loss. I hope this exhibit will be helpful and interesting.

"Art therapy is a mental health profession that uses the creative process of artmaking to improve and enhance the physical, mental and emotional well-being of individuals of all ages. Art therapists are master's-level professionals who hold a degree in art therapy or a related field (from the American Art Therapy Association).

This is a group show featuring the work of six artists who are also licensed art therapists. Nancy Nierman Baker, who was instrumental in coordinating this effort, Jacky Martin, Lou Higginbottom, Judy Jankowski, Diane J. Maytas and Heidi Larew. Toni Daniel, a medical photographer and artist, was invited by Nancy to participate as well. There are also three pieces from different artists involved in art therapy who wished to remain anonymous. In addition to adapting his *Rabbit Hole* for a forthcoming motion-picture adaptation, he has written two screenplays: Robots (2005) and Inkheart (2008). Sony Pictures hired him in the fall of 2008 to re-write a screenplay for the upcoming Spider-Man 4, but the studio has since rejected his script and hired a new screenwriter.

In the world of musical theater, Lindsay-Abaire wrote the book for the musical High Fidelity, which played a brief one-month run on Broadway in 2006. He also wrote both the book and lyrics for Shrek: The Musical, which concluded a 441performance run on Jan. 3, 2010.

He has received commissions from South Coast Repertory, Dance Theater Workshop, and the Jerome Foundation, as well as awards from the Berilla Kerr Foundation, the Lincoln Center LeComte du Nuoy Fund, Mixed Blood Theater, Primary Stages, the Tennessee Williams/ New Orleans Literary Festival, and the South Carolina Playwrights Festival. In addition to his 2007 Pulitzer Prize for Drama for Rabbit Hole, he was also awarded the 2008 Ed Kleban Award as America's most promising musical theatre lyricist.

He is married to Christine Lindsay, an actress, with whom he has two children. His marriage inspired him to add his wife's surname to his own legally – thus creating his hyphenated last name.

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75th Anniversary Quips & Quotes



Alan Scott Ferrall, volunteer since 1988

With the recent Broadway revival of *A Little Night Music*, Scott remembers when he stage managed our production of the Stephen Sondheim musical in 1991, directed by John Thomas with musical direction by Sandra Schlub. Two things stand out. The first was Sheila Kane's portrayal of Petra, and her singing of The Miller's Son every night, sitting downstage center belting out her love of a miller, a businessman and the Prince of Wales. The second was an off-stage starter pistol that sometimes failed to fire. The shot cued singers to stop singing, and they couldn't stop singing until it fired. The first time it happened was in performance, and after watching the stage-right props people trying to get the gun to fire, I grabbed the first thing I saw – my prompt book – and slammed it to the ground. My assistant and I kept the book in our hand each night after that.



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
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
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
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
