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

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes to children and teens in acting, musical theatre, dance and technical theater. This year we are offering an all new class on podcasting! Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays, Tuesday evenings and Wednesday afternoons for home school students. Two-week Hands on Theatre (HOT) camps are offered throughout the summer as well as intensive one-week classes in musical theater and auditioning. We also offer a comprehensive two-week Summer Stock program for teens. Next summer, students will produce, design and stage a full production of The Outsiders, based on the book by S.E. Hinton. Partial scholarships are available for all classes.

Children and teens may also audition for roles in Young Actor Series productions. Parents and family members also have the opportunity to participate by volunteering to assist designers and working backstage.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing education outreach and stu-

dent study guides as part of our Project STAGE program. This program brings public and private school students to see three productions each season. This season, The Lion in Winter, Children of a Lesser God and The Importance of Being Earnest will be featured in the Project STAGE events. Tickets are \$8.

Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951 when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as Playhouse director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Phillip Arnoult's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.



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
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
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






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Women's Board



We are pleased and excited to be the first gallery to exhibit the paintings of Frank Bell White.

Frank Bell White, 75, has been quietly painting for the past 50-plus years. His cousin, La Jauna Thurman, a legal secretary at a law firm in Cleveland, has taken on the role of his champion and art dealer. Ms. Thurman contacted Dorothy Shinn, the Akron Beacon Journal art critic, in the hopes that she would be interested in seeing White's work. After meeting with White and Thurman and examining "a basement full of paintings," Ms. Shinn devoted a full page to Frank White and his work in February 2007. When I read the article, which featured photographs of his paintings, I knew that I wanted to have Frank White exhibit his work at Weathervane.

White moved to Akron from Shreveport, Louisiana, in childhood. He was with Akron General Medical Center most of his adult life, where he was assistant manager of housekeeping for 23 years. He's always been interested in art, and started drawing while a student at South High School, although he has never taken any formal art classes. White did most of his sketching while convalescing from a leg wound he got while serving in the Korean War. He didn't start painting until later.

White is interested in history, from the 1920s to the present. He's interested in sharecroppers, cowboys, his religion and his guitar, which he plays at Sunday services at his church, St. Ashworth's Temple on Vernon Odom Boulevard. These interests are reflected in his paintings, which may begin as copies or memory pictures of illustrations he finds in books, comic books, movie posters and so on. His works also come from his own experience and what he calls "country pictures" of houses and locations he has seen in drives through area farmlands and other rural locations. He prefers to work in acrylic, which, he says, "is easier to use than oil paints."

We are fortunate that Frank Bell White has done some special paintings specifically for this production of *Ragtime*. He was present during the publicity photo shoot for the show and has painted several pieces based on the photographs taken at that time. This is the first time Weathervane has had any paintings done specifically for a show. The freshness and immediacy of his style are quite appealing.

From Our

Executive Director

Questions & Answers

John Hedges recently participated in a Virtual Roundtable discussion on the Arts for Akron Life & Leisure Magazine. Below are excerpts from the answers he gave to his interview questions...

What is the biggest challenge facing Weathervane Playhouse?

The limitations of our own thinking. With challenging times there comes great opportunity. If we can find powerful and creative ways of thinking and

speaking about our organization, first to ourselves (self-talk is a powerful thing!) and then to others, we have the ability to capitalize on what makes us vital. We have the power to frame the discourse and influence the perception of Weathervane, and the arts in general, in a way that will compel people to joyously participate in our programs and appreciate and support the artistic expression of others.

What is the greatest obstacle facing the arts in Akron?

Toward the top of the list has to be economics. Balancing the financial equation of our enterprises, both as it relates to the increased competition for contributed revenue and the challenge of maximizing earnings, is at the heart of our survival. In addition, the amenability of media outlets to assist in raising the public awareness of our activities and celebrating the arts is a major issue facing us.

What advice do you have for upcoming artists?

Art is about revealing truth. Artists need to be ruthlessly truthful with themselves and serve as examples of discipline, integrity and excellence in our society. They need to be among our best and brightest. Stage actors need to recognize the physical demands of the work and take the necessary steps to have their bodies and voices in top condition and available for dynamic expression. I had an acting teacher tell me once there's nothing worse than a lazy actor. Develop your discipline and practice it every day. To be an artist is a responsibility. Don't abuse it.

What does the future hold for the arts?

When asked why he was such a great hockey player, Wayne Gretzky said, "I skate to where the puck will be." As we navigate the course for our organizations, reading and responding to societal trends and skating, as it were, to where the puck will be is going to be critical to our viability. I don't have a crystal ball to tell me what the future holds, but I do think the arts have to rely on the undeniably powerful core of what they bring to our society. In communicating that importance we must embrace a proactive posture rather than a reactive one. It's imperative we step up and do our job and not apologize for it - to become a beacon for all that is positive and life affirming in our world and serve as a conduit for accessing that which is eternal. We build that and they will come!

E.L. Doctorow told **The New York Times** in 1999 that his house inspired him to write *Ragtime*. Stuck with writer's block in the early 1970s, Doctorow retreated to his third-floor home office in his large 1908 house in New Rochelle, New York. Here, perched atop his six-bedroom, four-bathroom residence, he began to write about the walls in front of him. As he wrote, his thoughts turned to the past, and he began to ponder what his surroundings looked like back in 1908.

"I was imagining what things were like in that time, with awnings on the windows and trolley cars going down the hill to the Sound and people in straw boaters and women with parasols," he told the **Times**. "One image led to another, and I was off the wall and into the book."

Doctorow's resulting novel, *Ragtime*, was published in 1975 and won the National Book Critics Circle Award for fiction. In 2005, **Time** magazine placed the book on its list of the 100 Best English Language Novels from 1923 to 2005. *Ragtime* features the blending of fictional characters with historical figures and presents the author's penchant for social criticism. He is the recipient of the PEN/Faulkner Award, the Edith Wharton Citation for Fiction, the William Dean Howells Medal of the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the presidentially conferred National Humanities Medal.

New Rochelle, just 16 miles north of Grand Central Terminal in New York City, is where the musical opens. We are introduced to the three central families -- each specific yet also archetypal -- whose lives and fates will soon intertwine: the upper-middle class, white Anglo-Saxon Protestants; the socialist immigrant Jews washed ashore from Eastern Europe; and the black residents of Harlem. In this "powder-keg" moment of American history, between the birth of a new American century and the first World War, *Ragtime* depicts an explosive era of change and transformation in America. A story of dreams, a story of justice and injustice, a story of family, *Ragtime* not only shows how things were but offers a jubilant promise of how things could be.

Ragtime was the inaugural production at New York City's Ford Center for the Performing Arts (now the re-named Hilton Theatre and present home to *Young Frankenstein*) when it opened in January 1998. Under the direction of Frank Galati, the lavish and large-scale production had a 59-member cast and a reported production budget of \$10 million. In New York, *Ragtime* played for 834 performances, closing in January of 2000.

Ragtime's New York production had the unfortunate timing of opening during the same season as the still-running Walt Disney blockbuster *The Lion King*. Although Ragtime was nominated for 12 Tony Awards, it won just four.

Composer **Stephen Flaherty** and lyricist **Lynn Ahrens** have collaborated on a number of musical-theater works. In addition to *Ragtime*, the songwriting duo's Broadway and off-Broadway shows include *Once on this Island, My Favorite Year, Suessical, A Man of No Importance* and *The Glorious Ones*. The duo also worked on the vocal music for the 1997 animated feature film, *Anastasia*.

American playwright and *Ragtime* book-writer Terrence McNally is a multiple Tony Award winner. His best-known plays include *Love! Valour! Compassion!*, *The Ritz, Frankie and Johnny in the Clair de Lune, Corpus Christi* and *Lips Together, Teeth Apart*. He wrote the books for the musicals *The Rink, Kiss of the Spider Woman* and *The Full Monty*. Last season, he was represented on Broadway with Deuce (starring Angela Lansbury and Marian Seldes).

Among his 130 directing credits are two other "epic" style musicals, Titanic and Les Miserables. 
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
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Volunteering at Weathervane

Each month, we acknowledge the outstanding Volunteers of the Month in our lobby, but those volunteers represent all who commit their time and interest to create a great theater experience for everyone who's come to see this show.

Shortly after the final production of each season, Weathervane volunteers, subscribers and friends share an exciting awards show and party to acknowledge outstanding work by performers and technical volunteers. And, if you have seen all of the six Mainstage productions, you are eligible to be a judge!

The top performers, as chosen by the Chanticleer "judges," are awarded rooster statuettes -- "Chanticleers" -- in recognition of their work. It's a great night to get together and share in the fun and festivities. The Chanticleer Awards event is open to all.

Awards are presented for outstanding lead performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding lead performances in a musical, outstanding featured and supporting performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding featured and supporting performances in a musical and outstanding achievement in sound design, lighting design, properties design and costume design. The final award of the Chanticleer evening goes to the Best Production of the season.

In addition to performance and technical awards, the event also recognizes the Top 25 outstanding volunteers of the season, who represent all the volunteers whose time and talents create the memorable theater experiences of every Weathervane season.

Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volupteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! In addition, you receive complimentary tickets to see the shows plus the pride in knowing you are joining nearly 1 million volunteers nationwide to support community theater! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in selling tickets and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats. pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.



Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the Playhouse on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account. So, don't be discouraged and please audition again.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). This makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys other ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.


Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.


