

Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre, improvisation and design for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and Tuesdays evenings. Two-week Hands-on Theatre (H.O.T.) workshops are offered throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. 






Four society women Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951 when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of Dark of the Moon. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a soundproof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the awardwinning The Laramie Project in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with Angels in America: Millennium Approaches in January 2005.



Women's Board

The Women's Board was formed in 1938 to "offer voluntary service" and financial assistance to the Playhouse." Women's Board has energized youth education programs, sponsored productions, spearheaded fund raisers and paid for many of the amenities we appreciate in the Green Room/kitchen. Members of this active group are invaluable as hostesses, office helpers and backstage. The Women's Board sponsors an annual puppet presentation for children and also operates the Gift Boutique and Bank One Art Gallery. New members are welcomed.

From Our

Interim Artistic Director

One of the comments we often hear from our patrons here at Weathervane is that they come to the theater to be entertained. Of course, what's entertaining to one person is not necessarily entertaining to someone else. My very old version of Webster's New International Dictionary of the English Language, Second Edition, Unabridged, defines "entertain" this way: "To engage the attention of agreeably; to amuse with that which makes the time pass pleasantly; to divert." Wendy Wasserstein's *The Sisters Rosensweig* is designed to entertain. George Bernard Shaw divided his works into "plays pleasant" and "plays unpleasant." As you will no doubt discover today, *Sisters* is primarily a "play pleasant."

While focusing on the lives, loves, troubles and foibles of three Anglo-Jewish-American sisters, the themes of *Sisters* are universal: sibling relationships and rivalries; love sought, found, and lost; identity and definition in a turbulent, changing world. The universality of the message is one reason for the play's success as a work of art. Drawing upon her own experiences as the youngest member of a truly formidable bunch of overachievers - her sister became head of corporate affairs at Citicorp and her brother ran a corporate takeover company - Wasserstein developed a keen ability to write realistic situations that ring true. Furthermore, she filled those situations with lines that cause you to laugh out loud, smile and even bring a tear or two to your eyes.

Our theme for this year's season at Weathervane is "Home is Where the Heart Is." Sit back and enjoy some time with the family Rosensweig where, despite several ups and downs, the "heart" reigns supreme. If there is a sad note in these proceedings, however, it is the fact that just last year our theatrical family lost Wendy Wasserstein as one of its most affecting and accomplished playwrights. We hope our production of this fine play successfully honors her memory and achievement.

About the Play & Playwright

The Sisters Rosensweig is an affectionate portrait of three dramatically different siblings, all at crossroads in their lives, who gather in London to celebrate the eldest sister's 54th birthday. Loosely based on the lives of the playwright and her sisters, the play is a look at three uncommon women and their quest for love, self-definition and fulfillment. One of them asks plaintively, "How did our nice Jewish mother do such a lousy job on us?" The sisters meet for the birthday with an unexpected guest, a furrier from New York, who is currently dealing in "synthetic animal protective covering" as opposed to the unpopular real thing. Sara is the president of the London office of the Hong Kong/Shanghai Bank Worldwide and lives in an elegant townhouse. The furrier has come to see her. Pfeni is a writer of esoteric travel articles while Gorgeous is about to launch "The Dr. Gorgeous Show" because "talking has always come easily to me." The comedy is a tribute to all women who have endured and triumphed with the love of their sisters.

Playwright, Wendy Wasserstein, is best known for *The Heidi Chronicles* which, in 1989, won for her Pulitzer, Tony, New York Drama Critics Circle, Drama Desk and Outer Critics Circle Awards. She uses her own family for her comic material. The family Wasserstein was a formidable bunch of over-achievers who provided the fodder for most of their youngest member's writing. The playwright's Uncommon Women and Others was produced when Wendy was 27. But she had a list of milestones she wanted to achieve by 40, at which age she had lost 40 pounds and shredded the list. Her career started in second grade when she played Queen Esther at the local yeshiva. She spent a year at Amherst where she and a friend survived on peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for two weeks before getting up sufficient nerve to go to the cafeteria where the student body was mostly male. She attended Yale School of Drama where her experiences became the basis for Uncommon Women and Others. Other plays by Wasserstein include Sunset at Camp O'Henry, Miami, Festival of Regrets, Bachelor Girls, Shiksa Goddess and Elements of Style.

Director's Notes

"Don't live down to expectations. Go out there and do something remarkable!"

Wendy Wasserstein's remarkable writing was drawn upon her experiences with the changes and emotions which were occurring in her life at the time, usually involving deeply drawn portraits of women struggling to succeed. *The Sisters Rosensweig* explores the transformative power of love, sisterhood and life, set among the social and political climate of the late 1980s-the fall of the Soviet Union, Reaganomics and the plight of the homeless, to name a few. Through the interactions of the three Rosensweig sisters (with strong parallels to Chekhov's *Three Sisters*) over one weekend in August 1991, we see a little of ourselves and our need, as the character of Merv suggests, "to connect" with another person and with the world outside our living room.

What a pleasure, after almost 12 years, to return to Weathervane! I have been blessed to be surrounded on this project by a multitude of talented folks with whom to collaborate, and I would like to express my sincere thanks to every member of the cast, the staff, and the crew, as well as the Weathervane administrative personnel. Working on *The Sisters Rosensweig* has been a complete pleasure for me, and I think that we've done something which Ms. Wasserstein would admire -- something remarkable! I hope you enjoy meeting the "Sisters Rosensweig": Sara, Pfeni and Gorgeous. And I hope you find them ALL gorgeous, as I do!!

MARGO PARKER (Sara Goode) first appeared on Weathervane's stage nearly 27 years ago in Dracula. She was last seen as Lee Green in The Tale of the Allergist's Wife. In 1985 she won a Chanticleer for her many roles in The Dining Room. Her resume includes 43 productions and also lists Coach House Theatre, North Canton Playhouse and Stow Players as well as several Cleveland-area theaters. Margo, who lives in West Akron, is the daughter of a musician and a dancer. Her daughter, Melanie Fox, is a writer who lives in Pittsburgh. Her son, Bryan Czibesz, is an artist who lives in San Diego. Margo takes great delight in her new role as grandmother to one-year-old Zora Morgan Fox.

MARYJO MACE WOODBURN (Pfeni) finished her theater degree with an acting internship at Cleveland Play House. Her most recent directing credit at Weathervane was for Little Women preceded by Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. She has performed for Chanticleer audiences with the Not-Ready-for-Mainstage-Players and was seen on stage in our production of The King of the Kosher Grocers. She is employed by AmeriCorps Vista and lives in Cuyahoga Falls with husband, Dan, and sons, Sam and Leo.

MARYANN ELDER (Gorgeous) returned to her roots in Cleveland two years ago after 25 years in Philadelphia. She has since been seen onstage at Beck Center, Willoughby Fine Arts, Cleveland Stage Co., Ensemble Theater and the Cleveland Play House. Charenton Theatre recently produced her original work Both Sides Of The Family, documenting her adventures as a non-Jew raising a Jewish daughter. Maryann is making her first appearance at Weathervane.

IAN S. HABERMAN (Merv) was seen here most recently in The Rocky Horror

Show as Dr. Scott and, previously, as Dr. Kelekian in Wit and as Senex in A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum. He collected Chanticleer Awards for his performances as Mr. Mushnik in Little Shop of Horrors, Zaretzky in Conversations with My Father and Lenny in Doubles. It would, actually, take several columns to list the productions in which Ian has performed to the pleasure of Weathervane audiences. He has also served as a Trustee and President of the Board besides heading the Play Selection Committee for many years. He lives in Sharon Center, holds a law degree from Case Western Reserve University and practices law in Medina. Ian currently serves as Weathervane's Interim Artistic Director.

RICHARD WORSWICK (Geoffrey Duncan) reports a long list of stage credits in addition to his work as a model for commercial, industrial, print and voice-over advertising for a wide range of companies. TONI CLAIR (Tess Goode) is a University of Akron sophomore working toward a bachelor's degree in theater and French. She has a theater scholarship, is a State qualifier for Speech, on the Dean's List and is in the Honor Society. Last year, she played a tango dancer in *Cabaret*, June in June Daydreaming and Shelley in Buried Child, all at the university. In 2005

she played Melinda in Inherit the Wind, and Marianne in Tartuffe on the Daum Theater stage. She is a cashier for The Rocky River Grillhouse in her "spare" time.

GEOFFREY DARLING (Nicholas Pym) is making his first appearance at Weathervane and was most recently Frank Strang in Equus at the Beck Center in Lakewood. Based in Canton, Geoffrey arrived from New Zealand last year with his Ohio-born wife and has already been in productions in Cleveland and Stow as well as many solo performances of the Gospel According to St. Mark in northeast Ohio. Among his credits are lead roles in

Shadowlands, Terra Nova, The Tempest, Taming of the Shrew and The Crucible and his forays into solo theatre also include The Ancient Mariner and his own creation, Shakespeare and the Supernatural. He trained at Canterbury University in New Zealand and is also an award-winning journalist.



In keeping with the theme and spirit of Weathervane's 2006-07 Season, Home Is Where the Heart Is, I felt that this would be the perfect time to pay tribute to one of our neighbors who has graced this area for some time. Dolores "Dee" Parker Morgan is an exquisitely beautiful, exceptionally talented jazz singer who has been living and performing in northeast Ohio since she moved here in the late 1950s after her marriage to Dr. E. Gates Morgan. Dr. Morgan was the first African-American president of the Summit County Medical Society and had a distinguished career in medicine.

Her early professisonal career included singing with the Fletcher Henderson Band, with Earl "Fatha" Hines and, most importantly, the brilliant Duke Ellington. She also performed at the famous Apollo Theatre, had engagements in London, England; Glasgow, Scotland and Paris, France, worked with Nat "King" Cole, hosted a nightly radio talk show and disc-jockey broadcast from the Palm Café in New York and appeared in movies and stage productions.

After moving here, she did not perform on a full-time basis. She turned her attention to family and civic volunteerism. Her daughter is now Dr. Melodie Morgan-Minott, a psychiatrist, married to Dr. Howard B. Minott, a urologist. Over the years, Dolores has contributed her time, talent and energy to, among others, the Akron Symphony, the Akron Art Museum, Ohio Ballet, E.J. Thomas Hall, the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, the Visiting Nurses Association and served as president of the Medical Auxiliary of the Summit County Medical Society, the Cascade Locks Parks Association and the Dolores Parker Morgan Endowment for the music school at Kent State University.

I have tried to include as much material as possible to give everyone a sense of the scope of this remarkable woman's life. She is to be treasured by us all. We are blessed to have her in our neighborhood.

Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- **❖ Sound** Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- *Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.


Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.





Weathervane began as a volunteer organization and continues its growth thanks to the time and talent that members of our community invest in it. Our on-stage performers have worked long and hard to earn your applause. But their work is supported by many other unseen men and women who've helped build and paint sets, run the lights and sound, make sure that properties and set dressing items are in their proper places and do other backstage labor from stage managing to costuming and make-up. Supporting those who are actively involved in putting on each show are still more volunteers who usher, house manage, sell tickets, keep our office running and serve on our Board of Trustees, Board committees, Production Board and Women's Board.

Their spirit is the backbone of our continuing operations, a valued support on which our professional staff relies.

Each month, we acknowledge the outstanding Volunteers of the Month in our lobby, but those volunteers represent all who commit their time and interest to create a great theater experience for everyone who's come to see this show.

If you have friends or relatives who volunteer generously at Weathervane, we hope you'll take a moment to thank them for their help and their support of the cultural enrichment of our community. Better yet, join them! Call us and we'll help you win your own share of the applause for a "jolly good show," an experience that offers unique challenges with every performance.



Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.


Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on Main Stage first Friday performances. We provide light refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.
