Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre, improvisation and design for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and Tuesdays evenings. Two-week Hands-on Theatre (H.O.T.) workshops are offered throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE© program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, Fences, All My Sons and Romeo &








Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.





Four society women Weathervane urged Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951 when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years, directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as theater director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Maggie Moore's production of Dark of the Moon. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a soundproof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the awardwinning The Laramie Project in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with Angels in America: Millennium Approaches in January 2005.



Women's Board

The Women's Board was formed in 1938 to "offer voluntary service and financial assistance to the Playhouse." Women's Board has energized youth education programs, sponsored productions, spearheaded fund raisers and paid for many of the amenities we appreciate in the Green Room/kitchen. Members of this active group are invaluable as hostesses, office helpers and backstage. The Women's Board sponsors an annual puppet presentation for children and also operates the Gift Boutique and Bank One Art Gallery. New members are welcomed.

I am delighted to announce Weathervane's 2007-2008 Grace Hower Crawford (mainstage) season and our Young Actor Series. For our 73rd season, we will offer a mix of musicals, dramas and comedies that is certain to entertain, stimulate and challenge our audiences and our actors as well as our designers and technicians.

While the order is not yet entirely set, I can let you know that we will be opening our season with the utterly charming musical *I Do! I Do!* and closing it with the powerful musical *Ragtime*. Written by Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt, who gave us *The Fantasticks*, the story line of *I Do! I Do!* chronicles a marriage from the first night of the honeymoon, through the birth of children, middle-age blues and the empty-nest syndrome, all leading to a positive assessment of the institution by evening's end. Winner of several Tony Awards, *Ragtime* paints a rich portrait of life in turn-of-the-century America. Intertwining three distinct stories, *Ragtime* is supported by a score that draws upon traditional Jewish folk music to color the music of the immigrants, vaudeville's style to capture the spectacle of Evelyn Nesbit and the music of Scott Joplin and jazz to invoke the spirit of Harlem.

For dramas, we have selected two plays that, in the few years since they were originally produced on Broadway, have already attained the status of classics of modern American theater. Told with intelligence and wit, *The Lion in Winter* is the story of your typical dysfunctional family, albeit one set in the 12th century and involving a king, Henry II of England; a queen, Eleanor of Aquitaine and their three sons – and that ageold issue: who's going to run the business after mom and dad have died? *Children of a Lesser God*, also a Tony Award-winner, is a deeply moving, beautifully written play about the romance and marriage of a sensitive, but spirited, deaf woman and the devoted (and hearing) young teacher whom she meets at a school for the deaf.

Finally, our comedies. *Enchanted April* is just that – enchanting. Two proper London housewives decide they need some time away from their husbands and so they rent a house in Italy. They are joined by two other, very different English women, who share the cost and experience. In this romantic comedy, these women rediscover laughter and find the romance they need. And, finally, *Moon Over Buffalo*, a farce from the playwright who gave us *Lend Me a Tenor*, takes us to Buffalo in 1953 where an acting couple – no, not the Lunts – are doing *Cyrano de Bergerac* and *Private Lives* in repertory. Hilarious misunderstandings pile up on madcap misadventures to create what will be a side-splitting night at Weathervane.

Our Young Actor Series will open with a delightful musical *The Frog Prince* based on a tale by the Brothers Grimm and adapted by Donald J. Leonard, Jr. with music and lyrics by David Reiser. Our holiday family show will, again, be *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*. If you have not brought your family to this exciting holiday offering, do make this the year! Then, in the spring, our teens will tackle Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Earnest!*

We will soon be offering renewal subscriptions and hope that you join us for another exciting season. We, of course, look forward to all the remaining productions of this current season and hope that you will continue to join us for all the upcoming productions.

About the Play & Playwright

The song, *Smokey Joe's Café*, was written originally for a Los Angeles rhythm and blues group called the Robins. Later, Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller formed a group around two of the Robins to become the Coasters, America's most popular black vocal group in the late 1950s. Though tame by today's standards, their slangy, good-humored expressions of teenage defiance were the direct antecedents of contemporary rap songs. *Smokey Joe's Café* is just that, a night spot where people sing songs that have become classics over the years. One singer boasts of being thrown out of a dive at knife point by the jealous boyfriend of a woman who flirted with him. The song is typical of the songwriters with its bluesy speech/song and wise-guy attitude. And nothing promoted their music like Elvis Presley, who turned *You Ain't Nothing but a Hound Dog* into an international hit. Other songs featured include *Jailhouse Rock, Spanish Harlem, Love Potion # 9* and *Is That All There Is?* The reviews when the show opened on Broadway in 1995 were tepid, but the public liked it. It closed in January 2000 after 2,036 performances.

When Leiber and Stoller began writing songs together in 1950, they were 17-year-old rhythm and blues fans and the songs they wrote came in explosive bursts that Stoller called "spontaneous combustion." "I'd be banging on the piano, and Jerry would be yelling and pacing" recalled Stoller, the composing half of the team. "It all happened simultaneously." A few years later, they formed the Coasters and it was like hiring a troupe of actors, remembered Leiber. "You have the heavy, the kid, the girl, the jerk. We conceived the songs as little comedy playlets." By the mid-1960s, the team had built a pop music empire that included their own record and music publishing companies. Then the music industry changed and the two were bored. So they began writing cabaret songs with distinctly adult themes. Their opening salvo, *Is That All There Is?*, was a hit for Peggy Lee in 1969. Written in a style closer to Kurt Weill and Bertolt Brecht than to the blues, the song is the dramatic monologue of a woman who finds life's peak experiences anticlimactic and considers suicide.

Director's Notes

Welcome to the world of Leiber and Stoller! I want to thank Weathervane for giving me the opportunity to return to direct this incredible musical anthology. This evening is constructed to let the audience sit back and have a wonderful time reliving memories, singing along and forgetting about troubles for a while. We certainly hope you will allow us to do that. For those of you who have seen *Smokey Joe's Café* on Broadway or the current DVD in release, the casting in this production varies from the original casting. However, the individuals who have joined this party embrace this music and perform it with unabashed energy. And as far as the staging is concerned, I have tried my best to create new staging of the numbers along with help from choreographer Jennifer Glowe. I am thrilled to have this company of performers, some veterans, some novices, but all have an extreme love and respect for music. So sit back, no, wait, don't sit back, ha, and enjoy the show. Eight individuals have come together, joined by a great orchestra led by Heidi Herczeg, joined by a wonderful production team, and joined by the spirit of Leiber and Stoller, and all of us welcome you to our "Neighborhood." TPOG!

In keeping with the theme and spirit of Weathervane's 2006-07 Season, Home Is Where the Heart Is, and one of the songs in Smokey Joe's Café, Neighborhood, I felt that this would be the perfect time to pay tribute to one of our neighbors who has graced this area for some time. Dolores "Dee" Parker Morgan is an exquisitely beautiful, exceptionally talented jazz singer who has been living and performing in northeast Ohio since she moved here in the late 1950s after her marriage to Dr. E. Gates Morgan. Dr. Morgan was the first African-American president of the Summit County Medical Society and had a distinguished career in medicine.

Her early professisonal career included singing with the Fletcher Henderson Band, with Earl "Fatha" Hines and, most importantly, the brilliant Duke Ellington. She also performed at the famous Apollo Theatre, had engagements in London, England; Glasgow, Scotland and Paris, France, worked with Nat "King" Cole, hosted a nightly radio talk show and disc-jockey broadcast from the Palm Café in New York and appeared in movies and stage productions.

After moving here, she did not perform on a full-time basis. She turned her attention to family and civic volunteerism. Her daughter is now Dr. Melodie Morgan-Minott, a psychiatrist, married to Dr. Howard B. Minott, a urologist. Over the years, Dolores has contributed her time, talent and energy to, among others, the Akron Symphony, the Akron Art Museum, Ohio Ballet, E.J. Thomas Hall, the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, the Visiting Nurses Association, served as president of the Medical Auxiliary of the Summit County Medical Society, the Cascade Locks Parks Association and the Dolores Parker Morgan Endowment for the music school at Kent State University.

I have tried to include as much material as possible to give everyone a sense of the scope of this remarkable woman's life. She is to be treasured by us all. We are blessed to have her in our neighborhood.

Volunteer

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes. create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.

- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.


Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.


Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.





Awards are presented for outstanding lead performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding lead performances in a musical, outstanding featured and sup-





Intermission Tea is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.


Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on Main Stage first Friday performances. We provide light refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.
