From 1935 until 1951, Weathervane was housed in a modest carriage house barn on Marshall Avenue. Some recall its cramped quar-

ters but especially the energy and devotion of four ladies, Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch and Muriel MacLachlan, who believed that Akron deserved the best in theater and that volunteers could make it happen. A lobby plaque lists the names of other founders who shared their commitment. The rooftop weathervane gave the theater its name and logotype character, the Chanticleer.

In 1951, the organization renovated a building on Copley Road and, from 1960 - 1992, Bob Belfance served as director. Along with custodian/ticket office manag-

er, Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support. Paid guest directors and children's theater instructors served in part-time positions. Ticket receipts and donations helped meet expenses and created a modest endowment. A fund-raising drive resulted in construction of the present 263-seat facility which opened in 1970. Thanks to Grace Crawford's legacy, the mortgage has been paid off.

Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery and fly system, a sound-proof production booth and a costume workshop.

Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production, The Laramie Project, during the 2002-2003 season. Thanks for being a part of our history as we celebrate this 70th season!







The Women's Board was formed in 1938 to "offer voluntary service and financial assistance to the Playhouse." Women's Board has energized youth education programs. sponsored productions, spearheaded fund raisers and paid for many of the amenities we appreciate in the Green Room/kitchen. Members of this active group are invaluable as hostesses, office helpers and backstage. The Women's Board sponsors an annual puppet presentation for children and also operates the Gift Boutique and Bank One Art Gallery. New members are welcomed.





# About the Play

Marguarite Clark starred in the title role of the play Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs by Jessie Braham White, which opened in New York on November 7, 1912, and ran for 72 performances. In 1916, a movie based on the play opened. It is believed to be the first movie Walt Disney ever saw.

This live-action, silent version of the fairy tale supposedly inspired Disney to make his 1937 animated version and was thought to be lost, until it was discovered by the George Eastman House in the Dutch film Archive. GEH acquired the nitrate negative and was able to preserve it. Researchers went back and, using the play script and translations, restored the English titles to the print. Restorers also repaired some defects in the image and tinting of the film.

This 1916 version is one of the 50 films in the 4-disc boxed DVD set called "Treasures from American Film Archives," compiled by the National Film Preservation Foundation from 18 American film archives and released in 2000. This film was preserved by the George Eastman House. This version has an uncredited piano music score and runs 63 minutes. Sketches of the sets and costumes from the play were used for this film.

# Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs -- Director

Jessica Shepherd is very pleased to return to Weathervane, after directing last season's Winnie-the-Pooh. A graduate of Miller South and Firestone High School's performing arts program, Jessica grew up here in Akron where she appeared in many plays at both schools, Dynamics Community Theatre and Magical Theatre Company. Jessica has also directed for both the Ashland University and Firestone High School one-act play festivals. She would like to thank Elynmarie Kazle and Mark A Zimmerman for this opportunity.

#### Director's Notes:

I have always loved stories. I love tales of magical people in far-off places doing remarkable things. I love stories about the good guy not only overcoming the bad guy, but ridding the world of the threat of evil altogether. I adore love stories, especially when they have to do with a princess finding her true love. Like many girls, I spent much of my life hoping that I was a princess. As I grew older I realized that I was no princess, though I kept the crown collection anyway.

*Snow White* has always been one of my favorites because it has all of the qualities that make it a truly fabulous story. I, like the rest of you, grew up singing the Disney songs and picturing the seven dwarfs as being Sleepy and Grumpy and Dopey and so on. When I was given the script, I worried about what a non-Disney *Snow White* would be like. I was pleased to see that it not only had all of the elements that I loved, but it had even more moments of magic and mystery that made the play exciting.

Over the course of the last two months, I have shared with the cast my love of magic and stories and found that I am not alone. These young people have shared with each other the stories of their own lives that make them extraordinary people. I have been amazed to listen and see how each of their stories also contains all of the elements of fairy tales that we all adore. We all know someone who is too proud and vain like the Queen, someone who has been in a tough situation like the Huntsmen, and we all have found friends as loyal as the dwarfs. And we realized, by making our own magic on the stage, that our lives are just as remarkable as that of the fairy tale heroes we admire as children. I sincerely hope that watching the human characteristics that we have brought to this play, you see a little of yourself or someone you know on stage and realize that your life is just as magical.



# In the Bank One Visual Arts Gallery

We are pleased to display Shakespearean art from the private collection of Marci Paolucci, Weathervane's Gallery Director. "Since I passionately believe that one is never too young to be exposed to the magic of Shakespeare, I feel that this exhibit will be interesting to both the Snow White and Much Ado About Nothing audience members."

Works here include six prints from artist Susan Loy. Each print is signed and numbered from the original watercolor painting. Each painting requires months to complete. Susan Loy's secluded studio is surrounded by rolling pastures, forests and gardens in Bedford County, Virginia. Her Literary Calligraphy art is part of the permanent art collections of the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, DC., and the Jones Library (Emily Dickinson) in Amherst, Massachusetts. She presented the official poster as Artist-on-the-Lawn at the 1999 White House Easter Egg Roll during President Clinton's tenure in the White House.

Loy combines her love of texts with delicate artistry in calligraphy and watercolors. Her art appeals to those who appreciate fine literature presented in intricately detailed pen and brush work.

With an American Studies degree from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, and graduate coursework in art history, literature, and philosophy at The Ohio State University, Loy approaches her art from a truly multidimensional perspective. She has also published a book, Flowers, the Angels' Alphabet, The Language and Poetry of Flowers which features an American Floral Dictionary and twenty-eight color illustrations.

The remaining works of the exhibit are prints from Shakespeare's Realm calendars that are published annually by Pomegranate using prints and paintings from the vast holdings of The Library of Congress.

# Volunteer Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- \* Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- \* Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- \* Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes. create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- \* Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus, and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. Nobody can see the show without you.
- \* Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- \* Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- \* Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in taking money and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff, and greet customers and visitors.
- \* Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- \* House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.





Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and Northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the theater on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account to develop the proper "relationships," style and reality of the ensemble. Don't be discouraged.

## Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Single-ticket buyers and subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). These subscription seats are held until intermission. This, additionally, makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.

Subscribers: Please call the Ticket Office at 836-2626 if you will not make your ticketed performance. Thank you.

# Weathervane Traditions

Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.

**Intermission Tea** is served with our compliments by our volunteers. Soft drinks are available at a nominal cost.

Opening Night Receptions welcome audiences on first Friday performances. We provide light snacks and refreshments after the show so you can share in the celebration.

For your sweet tooth snacks are available for purchase before the show and during intermission. Refreshments (other than water) are not permitted in the auditorium.



#### Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes in acting, stagecraft, musical theatre and improvisation for children up to age 18. Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays and two-week Hands on Theater (H.O.T.) workshops are planned throughout the summer. The cost is minimal with a limited number of scholarships available and discounted fees for Weathervane members.

Children may also audition for roles in many productions. Casting is not dependent upon class enrollment. Participation is an extension of valuable training in every facet of production from the audition process to technical and performance experience. Family members may also have learning opportunities by participating in such productions.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing outreach information and study guides as part of our Project STAGE program, which brings public and private school students to see as many as five productions each season. This season, *The Grapes of Wrath* and *Little Women* will be

featured in the **Project STAGE** events. Tickets are only \$8.

### Adult Classes

Professionally taught Adult Theatre classes include Classical Drama, Improvisation, Scenic Design, Stage Lighting and Directing. These classes help actors expand their performance and public speaking skills. Look for classes in the spring.




