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


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#### **A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse**

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week, Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.

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
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

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

#### From Our Executive Director

#### The Real Price of a Ticket

During this time of year when we are offering such generous discounts off of our regular ticket prices through our subscription campaign, I thought I would take a moment to highlight just how discounted our "full price" tickets already are and shine a light on what ticket prices would be without the subsidy we receive each year as a nonprofit organization.

Our annual operating budget at Weathervane Playhouse is approximately \$900,000 of which 35% comes from contributed sources: foundations, corporations, some from the Ohio Arts Council, but a large portion from generous individuals through direct gifts, from our Volunteer Guild, through Thank You Dollars, as well



as those who support our fundraising events. Without those contributions, the cost of a ticket at Weathervane would literally have to double -- from \$21 for a play and \$25 for a musical to \$42 for plays and \$50 for musicals. This, of course, would make it prohibitive for many area residents to attend. The simple fact is, the only way the nonprofit arts are made accessible (and viable) in our country is through tax-deductible contributions. I would also be remiss if I didn't underscore the importance of the volunteers who give so generously of their time and talent at Weathervane each year -- nearly 300 volunteers giving over 32,000 hours of their time annually -- for without them, the cost of a ticket would surely double yet again. So the simple fact is your tickets are already heavily discounted to begin with and when you combine that with the up to 25% discount we are offering on some subscription packages, you have what amounts to one of the best live entertainment values around.

\*Subscribe (it's a great deal on top of a great deal)



#### **About the Play and Playwright**

What do you get when you mix an Alfred Hitchcock masterpiece with a juicy spy novel, and then toss in a dash of freewheeling Monty Python-like theatrical antics? It's *The 39 Steps*, a fast-paced whodunit for anyone who loves the magic of theater!

Packed with nonstop laughs, three men and one woman play more than 150 zany characters, who together endure an on-stage plane crash, fight with handcuffs, deal with missing fingers and create some good old-fashioned romance!

In *The 39 Steps*, a man with a boring life meets a woman with a thick accent who says she's a spy. When he takes her home, she is murdered. Soon, a mysterious organization called "The 39 Steps" is hot on the man's trail in a cross-country manhunt that climaxes in a death-defying finale!

A riotous blend of virtuoso performances and wildly inventive stagecraft, *The 39 Steps* amounts to an unforgettable experience of pure pleasure!

Although *The 39 Steps* uses key plot points and characters from Alfred Hitchcock's 1935 film of the same name, this stage adaptation is definitely a more satirical "send up" of the story (ala Monty Python) and also incorporates characters from (and references to) such other Hitchcock films as *North by Northwest, Dial M for Murder, Psycho, Vertigo* and *The Birds*.

The play's original concept as developed by Simon Corble and Nobby Dimon was for two actors to play all the parts. Playwright Patrick Barlow then tweaked that concept for four people, and the four-person version was first presented in 2005 at the West Yorkshire (England) Playhouse. About a year later, the production opened in London. The show premiered on Broadway in 2008 and ran for two years before transferring to an off-Broadway theater, where it ran for another nine months before closing in January 2011. Since then, the show has been one of the most consistently popular titles produced by both regional theaters and community groups across America.

#### About the Playwright

PATRICK BARLOW, born in 1947, is an English actor, comedian and playwright. In his native England, he is best known as one half of a comic duo known as The National Theatre of Brent, which since 1980 has produced nearly two dozen shows that have been produced for the stage, recorded for radio and filmed for television. Designed as a mock theatrical troupe, Barlow's role in The National Theatre of Brent is to play Desmond Olivier Dingle, the troupe's founder, artistic director and chief executive. Over the years, several actors have filled the role of Dingle's assistant, a man whom Dingle has always taken great pleasure in referring to as "my entire company." The company's 1998 production *Love Upon the Throne* (featuring Barlow as Prince Charles and John Ramm as Diana, Princess of Wales) was nominated for a Laurence Olivier Theatre Award for Best Comedy. Outside of his National Theatre of Brent productions, Barlow has also played several bit parts in films, including *Shakespeare in Love* (as Will Kempe), *Notting Hill* (as the Savoy Concierge), *Bridget Jones's Diary* (as Julian) and *Nanny McPhee* (as Mr. Jowls).



MARC MORITZ (Director) is thrilled to return to Weathervane Playhouse for this production of *The 39 Steps*. #### Director's Notes

"I never said all actors are cattle; what I said was all actors should be treated like cattle." Alfred Hitchcock

While this is one of Mr. Hitchcock's most famous and controversial quotes, and without question quite hilarious, it is indeed not how I view my actors and the process of directing! And I have been blessed to work with lovely actors at the top of their game!

This piece has been a challenge. One wants to honor the original Hitchcock film, but the brilliant playwright has managed, quite uniquely, to take the essence of this film and blow it out to a respectful and satirical piece of theatre! Even those not familiar with this original 1935 film will find the style quite familiar -- Film Noir in all its cheesy but fun glory.

It is in that spirit that we have approached this production. I could not have asked for a better production team. My scenic, lighting, costume, sound and props designers and stage manager have been a great collaborative team. And for me, collaboration is the only sane and joyful way to work.

I have wanted this production to be a tribute and love fest for all of those black and white 1930s and 1940s films -- particularly Hitchcock. So sit back, let go of all your needs for "realism" and enjoy the ride. And no worries...There's no shower curtain scene! I'm not THAT PSYCHO! Sorry, couldn't control myself! Enjoy!

At Weathervane, Scott has earned seven Chanticleer Awards -- one as the stage manager for Fences; one each for his lighting designs for The Laramie Project, A Lesson Before

Dying and Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat; and one each for his co-lighting designs'for A Man for All Seasons, The Full Monty and Man of La Mancha. In his spare time, Scott has written three one-act children's plays that tour local schools: Two Swords, a Bag of Marbles and a PB & J, The Mystery of the Missing Robot and How the Bee Learned to Spell: A Fable. He also takes great pleasure in writing the end-of-the-season revue for the Not-Ready-for-Mainstage Players, who appear at Weathervane's annual Chanticleer Awards banquet. ## OHIO COLLAGE SOCIETY'S 7th ANNUAL EXHIBIT "A New Century of Collage"

Weathervane's Harris Family Gallery is proud to host the Ohio Collage Society's 7th Annual Exhibit during the run of *The 39 Steps*.

Collage pieces in the Gallery seems to be a perfect way to enhance the experience of *The 39 Steps*. The four actors portraying multiple characters have lightning-fast quick changes that often involve layering the costumes. This is similar to collage depictions which are frequently layered and have a certain air of mystery. The script drew from multiple sources: the original Alfred Hitchcock movie, *The 39 Steps*, and is also filled with allusions to (and puns on the titles of) other Hitchcock films, including *Rear Window*, *Psycho*, *Vertigo* and *North by Northwest*. Also, there is a freewheeling comedic aspect present which is reminiscent of Monty Python's humor. All these elements are similar to the creation of collage - different sources, materials, mediums, etc.

Collage is considered the only "new fine art medium" of the 20th Century. Although Pablo Picasso added pasted elements into some early paintings in spring 1912, it was Georges Braque who initiated the "pasted paper revolution" in autumn 1912. He shared a studio with Picasso, who was away in Paris. Picasso's explosive response to Braque's new medium helped push collage into the realm of fine art and the future.

Collage continues to be a dynamic and diverse contemporary art form a century later in 2013. This exhibit demonstrates the same interest in materials, imagery, colors and an altered reality that Picasso and Braque explored 100 years ago. Collage artists construct a world made from the fragments and cast offs of the modern age for us to consider in their art. Enjoy!

The Ohio Collage Society (OCS) seeks to promote and appreciate the techniques of collage in Ohio by mounting exhibits of members' work and meeting to create and collaborate on collage. OCS was founded in 2007 by Gretchen Bierbaum, as an affiliate of the National Collage Society (NCS) which Ms. Bierbaum founded in 1982. The OCS thanks Weathervane Playhouse for hosting the annual Members' Show.

"The Annual Post Card Show" of the OCS will open June 19, 2013, at the KSU Gallery on Main St., Kent, OH.

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
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


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


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
