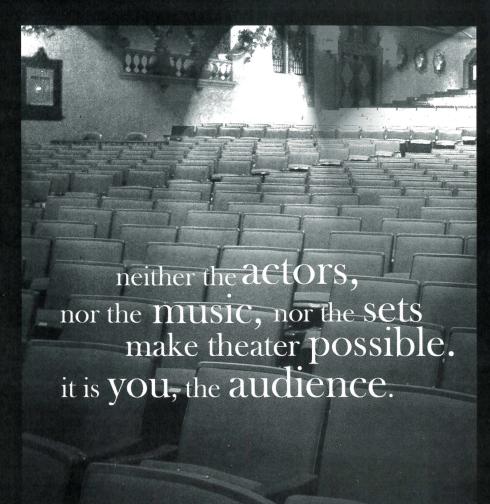

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A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works - even opera - with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 1960s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.

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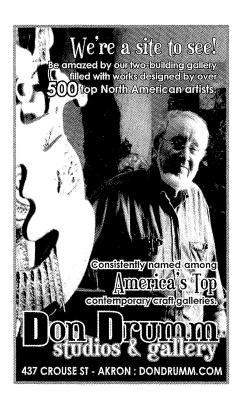
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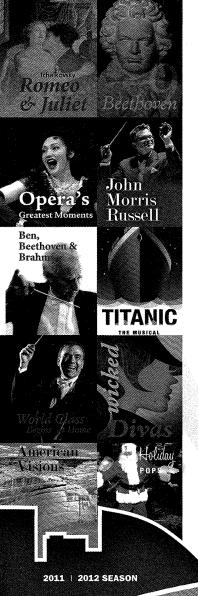
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From Our Executive Director

About the Play and Playwright

From the celebrated playwright of *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* comes this thoughtful meditation on the complicated gap between age and experience. Three women – one a 90-something-year-old, one a 52-year-old one a 26-year-old – navigate the emotional terrain of a life mixed with pleasure, satisfaction, shame and regret.

The play's three main female characters are nameless. Instead, the playwright identifies the women only by the letters A, B and C. "A" is an elderly woman who knows that the end of her life is approaching quickly. "B" is A's 52-year-old caretaker, a slightly sarcastic yet caring woman. "C" is a boldly self-confident 26-year-old who has come from A's attorney's office to discuss the elder woman's finances.

In his 1994 review of the original off-Broadway production of the play, critic Ben Brantley of *The New York Times* describes the play's structural premise: "Mr. Albee boldly sets these characters up as representatives of three ages of woman. C embodies all the intolerance and the conviction of immortality of youth, and is impatient with the old woman's meanderings. The caretaker, in turn, is impatient with C's impatience and given to sharp-tongued reminders that A represents C's future. (In this sense, she is a sort of stand-in for Mr. Albee, as playwright, not as son.) And throughout all this, A drifts between past and present."

In characterizing *Three Tall Women* as "often a truly moving work," Brantley also notes the play's semi-autobiographical roots:

"Mr. Albee has admitted in interviews that it was directly inspired by his own adoptive mother, a domineering, Amazonian woman. And the details of A's life, including her ambitious marriage to a wealthy man and her warring relationship with her recalcitrant son, seem to tally with what we know of Mr. Albee's family history. He has described the writing of the play as 'an exorcism. And one can see in A the roots of the controlling women who abound in the rest of his oeuvre."

About the Playwright

EDWARD ALBEE is perhaps best known for his association with the artistic movement of the 1950s and early 1960s more popularly regarded as "the theater of the absurd." Born in Washington, D.C., on March 12, 1928, Albee's parents abandoned him. A wealthy couple who owned a theatre chain, Reed and Frances Albee, adopted the infant boy. The Albees named their son after his adoptive paternal grandfather, Edward Franklin Albee, a powerful vaudeville producer who had made the family fortune as a partner in the Keith-Albee Theater Circuit.

Despite the lavish environment in which he grew up in affluent Westchester, New York, he was, by most accounts, unhappy. He attended Trinity College, a small liberal arts school in Hartford, Connecticut for a year. After failing to show up for the school's chapel services, as well as certain classes, Albee was dismissed by the school. At the age of 20, Albee left home and settled in Greenwich Village in New York City. He took on various jobs, including the roles of "office boy," record salesman, and Western Union messenger.

During his early years in Manhattan, he also began to meet other writers, including Thornton Wilder and W.H. Auden. It was Wilder who suggested that he try his hand at plays. At the age of 30, Albee wrote his first play, *The Zoo Story*, in a quick, three-week period.

Albee's first full-length, three-act play was *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?*, and its 1962 Broadway production won the Tony Award for Best Play. Centered on fractured family relationships, *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf* won him international fame and opened new doors of artistic opportunities.

Albee's other plays include *The American Dream, Tiny Alice, A Delicate Balance* (Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award winner) *All Over, Seascape* (Pulitzer Prize winner), *The Lady From Dubuque, The Man Who Had Three Arms, Finding the Sun, Fragments, The Play about the Baby, Occupant, The Goat, or Who is Sylvia?* and *At Home at the Zoo*. He is a member of the Dramatists Guild Council and president of the Edward F. Albee Foundation. He was awarded the Gold Medal in Drama from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters in 1980 and in 1996 received the Kennedy Center Honors and the National Medal of Arts.

In honor of his 80th birthday in 2008, several of his plays were staged at well-known off-Broadway theaters. Albee himself directed two of his own plays – *The American Dream* and *The Sandbox* – at the Cherry Lane Theatre (the original venue of both plays in 1961 and 1962, respectively).

Albee's Pulitzer Prize for *Three Tall Women* was his third Pulitzer Prize (after *A Delicate Balance* in 1967 and *Seascape* in 1975) – but it could have been his fourth. Here's why: In 1963, his *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* was selected for the Pulitzer Prize for Drama – but the selection was overruled by the trustees of Columbia University (the award's advisory board) due to the play's explicit language and sexuality. Instead, the award that year went to no play at all. Had Albee been awarded the Pulitzer Prize for *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?*, he would have tied Eugene O'Neill (with four awards) for the most Pulitzer Prizes for Drama.

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About Our Director



William Morgan is the Artistic Manager for CHSC (The Cleveland Hearing and Speech Center), where he controls the day to day activities of SignStage, a deaf awareness program within the Community Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing department. In addition to directing for many local community theatres, Bill is a specialist at adapting mainstream children's stories into "Deaf Theatre" plays that highlight deaf characters and cultural conflicts. Bill also has several years experience at writing, producing and implementing school residencies that integrate theatre arts programming with American

Sign Language into the State of Ohio Standards for the Arts. Bill co-wrote and produced D.E.A.F. (Dedicated to the Elimination of Assumptions and Fallacies) a fun, interactive educational school assembly program that focuses on deaf awareness. He has more than 30 years experience at producing theatre ranging from simple one-acts to huge outdoor productions with more than 300 actors complete with live horses in Civil War reenactments that include gun and cannon fire. You may have seen him acting in a PBS mini series titled KC and The Kidd where he played the lead role of The Kidd. Bill has been the Co-owner/Producer of Sign Stage on Tour (SSonT) for 12 years SSonT is a professional children's theatre company that produces deaf theatre productions and tours nationally. For SSonT, Bill has produced many of Roald Dahl's plays including Matilda, The Fantastic Mr. Fox, James and the Giant Peach and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. He was the only person in the world who received permission from the Roald Dahl estate to create a Deaf Theatre adaptation of Matilda and James and the Giant Peach. Bill has served as a member of the "Artist in Residence" Grant Review Committee for the Ohio Arts Council and was a member of the "Arts in Education" curriculum committee for the Cleveland Municipal School District. In 2009, Bill was nominated for the State of Ohio Governor's Award as Outstanding Arts Administrator. Bill is very proud to have directed the winning entry in Weathervane's inaugural 8 x 10 TheatreFest and 10-minute Play Competition this past July. Bill continues his work with Cleveland civic organizations and educational organizations like Young Audiences of Northeast Ohio, the Cleveland Theatre Collective and the Cuyahoga Arts and Education Consortium.

He has designed sets for many local high schools as well as for the Players Guild of Canton, Cleveland Signstage Theatre and Western Reserve Public Media (PBS-TV Channels 45/49). At Weathervane, Scott has earned several Chanticleer Awards - one as stage manager for Fences, lighting designs for The Laramie Project and A Lesson Before Dying; co-lighting designs for A Man for All Seasons, The Full Monty and Man of La Mancha and, most recently, for Best Technical Element/Young Actor Series - Lighting Design for Joseph.

Other acting credits include performances at Town Hall in New York and the Pantages Theatre in Los Angeles. Regionally he has worked at the Indiana Repertory Theatre, the Kentucky Shakespeare Festival, Actors Theatre of Louisville and the American Stage Festival, where he appeared opposite Academy Award-winner Olympia Dukakis in The Cherry Orchard. John has been Managing Director of First Stage Milwaukee, Associate Producer of North Shore Music Theatre, Business Director of Gloucester Stage Company and General Manager of New York's award-winning Pearl Theatre Company. Mr. Hedges is a member of Actors' Equity Association, served on the Board of Directors of Boston's StageSource and chaired its Strategic Planning Committee, been a Conference Panelist for the American Alliance for Theatre & Education and written for American Theatre magazine. He studied at Indiana State University and the Professional Theatre Training Program at the University of Delaware, is a graduate of the National Shakespeare Conservatory and holds an honorary MFA degree in theatre from Stafford University. 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Leave Your Legacy at Weathervane

Important News: Tax Law Expires December 31, 2011

More immediately, if you would like to support Weathervane's mission of providing arts education programs for our community and are at least 70^{1/2} years of age and own an IRA, there is legislation currently in place that expires December 31, 2011 that you should know about.

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 (in effect through the end of 2011) allows eligible individual retirement account (IRA) owners who are at least seventy and a half years of age or older to make a gift to a qualified charity directly from an IRA without the tax penalties usually associated with contributions of this type. If your gift is transferred directly from your IRA to Weathervane before the end of this calendar year, it is excluded from your gross income and thus excluded from both federal and Ohio income tax.
