




A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works – even opera – with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They named their space "Weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935 the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan with the other founders offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938 a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. It, too, continues to this day.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951 the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1471 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-69 and from 1974-92. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week, Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned. During the 15. s the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of Dark of the Moon here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed; these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was just completed for the opening of the 75th season.

From Our Executive Director

Young People + Art = Happiness

All we as parents want for our children is to grow up healthy and happy. Aside from realizing certain material aspects of life, one definition of "happiness" might be simply: to understand the world and one's place in it. In many ways, one could argue that this is the fundamental journey of our lives. What you as parents — and grandparents and those who love and care for young people — provide your children with by exposing them to the arts is access to a more profound understanding of the world and what their place in it might be. You give them a valuable tool to be able to access their own humanity and, ultimately, a pathway to experiencing that elusive thing we all so desperately seek: happiness.



One of the great thinkers and writers of our time on the importance of the arts in the lives of young people was the late Dr. Charles Fowler. He wrote, "Science is not the sole conveyor of truth. While science can explain a sunrise, the arts convey its emotive impact and meaning." He went on to say that, "Schools have a fundamental obligation to provide the fuel that will ignite the mind, spark the aspirations, and illuminate the total being. The arts can serve as that fuel." I would suggest spending a few minutes walking the halls and looking in some of the classrooms at Miller South School for the Visual and Performing Arts here in Akron to get a sense of what Dr. Fowler is talking about. Dr. Fowler also wrote, "Quite simply, the arts are the ways we human beings 'talk' to ourselves and to each other. They are the language of civilization through which we express our fears, our anxieties, our curiosities, our hungers, our discoveries, and our hopes. They are the universal ways by which we humans still play make-believe, conjuring up worlds that explain the ceremonies of our lives. The arts are not just important; they are a central force in human existence." The last great quote that I'll pass along to you is by Albert Einstein. Mr. Einstein said plainly, "Imagination is more important than knowledge. Knowledge is limited. Imagination encircles the world."

I hope the young people whom you care about enjoy their experience performing in *Our Town* and the time they've spent with us expanding their imaginations here at Weathervane. I hope they continue to find a place for the arts in their lives and allow the arts to illuminate the human experience and to ultimately contribute to their own personal realization of happiness. For providing them with this extraordinary opportunity, all of us here at Weathervane Playhouse salute you!

About the Play and Playwright

"It is a little play about all the biggest things in life." -- Thornton Wilder

The fictional town of Grover's Corners, New Hampshire, stands in for Everytown, U.S.A., in this quintessential American classic, which the celebrated playwright Edward Albee once described as "the greatest American play ever written." *Our Town* depicts the everyday lives of two average American families in the early 20th century to illuminate the timeless and universal themes of young love and the eternal cycle of birth, life and death.

The year 2013 marks the 75th anniversary of *Our Town*. The play debuted at the McCarter Theatre in Princeton, New Jersey, on January 22, 1938. After a pre-Broadway try-out at Boston's Wilbur Theatre, the play opened in New York City on February 4, 1938, at Henry Miller's Theatre. Produced and directed by Jed Harris, the original Broadway production of *Our Town* moved to the Morosco Theatre 10 days later where, after 336 performances, it closed on November 19, 1938. The play won Thornton Wilder the 1938 Pulitzer Prize for Drama. In the years thereafter, *Our Town* has enjoyed four Broadway revivals (1944, 1969, 1989 and 2003). A recent off-Broadway revival of the play at the Barrow Street Theatre in Greenwich Village ran for more than a year and a half between February 2009 and September 2010 --longer than any of the five separate Broadway productions of the play (between 1938 and 2003).

Weathervane Playhouse last presented *Our Town* in 2002 as a Young Actor Series production directed by Sean McConaha, but the Playhouse also staged this classic drama in 1948 (directed by Jesse Skrillitz) and in 1987 (directed by Bob Belfance).



About the Playwright

Born in Madison, Wisconsin, and educated at Yale and Princeton, **Thornton Wilder** (1897-1975) was an accomplished novelist and playwright whose works explore the connection between the commonplace and the cosmic dimensions of human experience. *The Bridge of San Luis Rey*, one of his seven novels, won the Pulitzer Prize in 1928, and his next-to-last novel, *The Eighth Day*, received the National Book Award (1968). Two of his four major plays garnered Pulitzer Prizes: *Our Town* (1938) and *The Skin of Our Teeth* (1943). His play *The Matchmaker* ran on Broadway (1955-1957) for 486 performances, Wilder's Broadway record, and was later adapted into the record-breaking musical *Hello*, *Dolly!*

Wilder also enjoyed enormous success with many other forms of the written and spoken word, among them translation, acting, opera librettos, lecturing, teaching and film (his screenplay for Alfred Hitchcock's 1943 psycho-thriller, *Shadow of a Doubt,* remains a classic to this day). Letter writing held a central place in Wilder's life and, since his death, three volumes of his letters have been published. Wilder's many honors include the Gold Medal for Fiction from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the Presidential Medal of Freedom, and the National Book Committee's Medal for Literature. On April 17, 1997, the centenary of his birth, the U.S. Postal Service unveiled the Thornton Wilder 32-cent stamp in Hamden, Connecticut, his official address after 1930 and where he died on December 7, 1975.

Wilder continues to be read and performed around the world. *Our Town* is performed at least once each day somewhere in this country, with his other major dramas and shorter plays not far behind. In 2008, *Our Town* and *The Bridge of San Luis Rey* were selected as a joint choice for the National Education Association's "Big Read" Program. In recent years Wilder's works have also inspired a growing number of adaptations, among them an opera based on *Our Town* (music by Ned Rorem, libretto by J.D. McClatchy) and a dramatized version of his novel, *Theophilus North* (written by Matt Burnett). Reflecting the renewed interest in Wilder, the Thornton Wilder Society sponsored the first international conference on Wilder in fall 2008.



Vijay Rastogi, a resident of Munroe Falls, has been doing watercolor art since 2002.

"Since I started painting, my outlook on life has changed," says Vijay, "Just about everything you see can be made to look captivating in a painting, if you are good or lucky. When a painting comes out well and when a random brush stroke makes a fortuitous and unexpected improvement, the sense of achievement is unbelievable."

Vijay has traveled in India, France, Spain, Italy, Germany, Russia, China and across the USA. He likes to paint from his own travels and photographs. His work has been exhibited at the Cuyahoga Valley Art Center in Cuyahoga Falls, the Epiphany Art Festival at the Bath Church, the Akron Women's City Club and privately organized shows.

He emigrated from India in 1961 when he came to the United States for post-graduate studies in Engineering at the University of Missouri at Rolla. He moved to Ohio in 1962 and joined the Babcock and Wilcox Company in Alliance. Later, he moved to the BFGoodrich Company in Troy, Ohio and then to the Ákron offices in 1976. After 26 years with Goodrich, he founded MVTechnologies, Inc., an Environmental Consulting Company, in Fairlawn, which he ran for 16 years and from which he retired in 2008.


IOHN HEDGES. Executive Director
