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A Brief History of Weathervane Playhouse

From the "barn" to Copley Road to the Valley...

Weathervane Community Playhouse began its run in 1935. Four artistically talented Woman's City Club members -- Grace Hower Crawford, Muriel MacLachlan, Laurine Schwan, Helen Troesch -- and a core of charter members rented the empty carriage house belonging to Akron's Senator Charles Dick. Their goal was to present a wide spectrum of plays: classics, dramas, comedies, new works -- even opera -- with casting open to anyone who fit a part.

The women chose a carnival as their fundraiser to start paying the rent. Despite a drenching downpour, they raised \$60. They names their space "weathervane" after the rooster on the barn's cupola. After cleaning their new home, scrounging for seats, a curtain and a coffee pot, Weathervane opened its first season. During that summer of 1935, the group presented seven fully costumed and staged plays. In 1936, Muriel MacLachlan, with the other founders, offered classes to children and adults, beginning a tradition that has become today's Education Department. In 1938, a Women's Board was formed to offer volunteer financial assistance. This group is now the Volunteer Guild.

The "barn" was home until it was sold. In 1951, the Playhouse purchased a cement block building at 1474 Copley Road and renovated it for a theater with seating capacity of 125. The all-volunteer organization hired its first employee, Nora Scott, as custodian/ticket manager. Actual management of the Playhouse was handled by the Operating Board, which reported to the Board of Trustees. Because directors were becoming scarce, the Board hired Bob Belfance as full-time Manager/Director. He held the position from 1961-1969 and from 1974-1992. During the Copley Road days, plays were presented six days a week. Because of their popularity, not everyone who wanted to see a show could be accommodated. A new home was planned.

During the 1960s, the membership's plans came together in June 1970 with the opening of *Dark of the Moon* here on Weathervane Lane. Longtime friend and founder Grace Hower Crawford died in 1971, remembering the Playhouse in her will. Her money enabled the Board to pare down the mortgage and set up an Endowment Fund. The last mortgage payment was made in 1974 through a contribution of the Women's Board. Three major additions followed: these included first-floor restrooms, classrooms, a costume shop, fly gallery and elevator. The former scene shop became the John L. Dietz Theater/Classroom in 2005 and the lobby project was completed in 2009 in time for the opening of the 75th season.

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
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From Our Executive Director

If You Like Us, Talk About Us

Before I came to Weathervane in 2007, I spent ten years in the Resident Acting Company at the Barter Theatre in Virginia. This theater began during the Depression and, as the actors needed food, people could literally trade "Ham for Hamlet" -- thus the name of the theater; barter. The original producer was famous for ending his curtain speeches with the phrase, "If you like us talk about us. And if you don't, just keep your mouths shut". Over the years people accepted it in a loving, almost quaint way. That tradition continued through my days with the theatre and I literally heard that phrase hundreds of times while waiting backstage for the performance to begin.



I've often thought of adopting it here at Weathervane, but was concerned that the second half might be too off putting. However, the first half is even more applicable now than ever.

Any marketing expert will tell you that word of mouth is by far the best form of advertising (short of spending millions of dollars on a multitude of television spots preferably during the Super Bowl). And so it is that I begin this season by sincerely asking each of you to please talk about us -- that is . . . if you like us.

In this era of social media and instantaneous communication in cyberspace, most of us have a network of people that we can contact at a moment's notice. I encourage you -- whether it's through tweets, posts, emails, or good old fashioned phone calls -- to reach out to the people you know and tell them what we're doing and how much you value it. With an expense budget as tight as ours and the limited amount of money we have available for any real marketing, your assistance in spreading the word is truly our only hope for letting people know of the extraordinary work of this theater.

When you leave Weathervane after the show feel free to take as much promotional material with you as you like. The business card-size season schedule might be particularly easy to use in conversation and to distribute. Talk about our beautiful facility, entertaining shows, free and easy parking, comfortable theater seats and friendly staff. Talk about how interesting it was to look at the world from a different point of view and to have imagined life in an exciting new way. Talk about it all and more, but I implore you ... If you like us, talk about us. And if you don't well, you know.

About the Play and Playwright

Written by Kenneth Lonergan, *The Waverly Gallery* is a heart-rending, poignant and often hilarious comic drama that examines the effect of senility on a family.

The play's central character is Gladys Green, an "eighty-something" former lawyer and Greenwich Village activist who runs an art gallery in a small hotel.

The hotel's management would prefer to replace her less-than-thriving gallery with a potentially more lucrative coffee shop -- but the feisty Gladys isn't someone who backs down easily.

Always slightly cranky but now increasingly unpredictable due to her descent into Alzheimer's disease, Gladys becomes a cause of concern to her daughter and son-in-law and, in particular, to her grandson from whose point of view this touching "memory play" unfolds. As Gladys fights to retain her independence, her decline impacts her family in profound ways.

Simultaneously heart-breaking and hilarious, *The Waverly Gallery* shows how a family can confront a crisis with both humor and strength.

About the Play's Production History


The Waverly Gallery originated at the Williamstown Theatre Festival in Massachusetts, where it debuted in August of 1999. It then opened at the Promenade Theatre off-Broadway in New York City on March 22, 2000, where it ran for 70 performances before closing May 21, 2000. Among its many honors, The Waverly Gallery was a finalist for the 2001 Pulitzer Prize for Drama. The legendary Eileen Heckart originated the role of Gladys, and her performance earned her the following awards: The 2000 Lucille Lortel Award for Outstanding Actress, the 2000 Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Actress, the 1999-2000 OBIE Award for Performance, the 1999-2000 Outer Critics Circle Award for Outstanding Actress in a Play and the 2000 Drama League Award for Distinguished Performance.

About the Playwright

Born in 1962, KENNETH LONERGAN is an American playwright, screenwriter and director. He earned an M.F.A. degree in dramatic writing for New York University's Tisch School of the Arts. His productions on the New York stage include Medieval Play (2012), The Starry Messenger (2009), Lobby Hero (2001), The Waverly Gallery (2000) and This Is Our Youth (1998). Lobby Hero and This Is Our Youth have also received productions in London's West End. He co-wrote the film Gangs of New York, which garnered him Writers Guild of America and Academy Award nominations for best original screenplay. His 2000 film You Can Count On Me -- which he wrote and directed -- was nominated for an Academy Award (for best screenplay). Additionally, it won the Sundance Film Festival Grand Jury Prize, the New York Film Critics Circle Award (for best screenplay), the L.A. Film Critics Association Award (for best screenplay), the Writers Guild of America Award (for best screenplay) the National Board of Review's Special Achievement Award, and two American Film Institute Awards (for movie of the year and best new writer). Lonergan's film Margaret, which he wrote and directed, was released in the fall of 2012. He is a co-founder of the New York City-based theater company Naked Angels. Married to actress J. Smith-Cameron, they have one daughter, Nelly Sharpe Lonergan.

Secrets of the Mystery Cult and Other Visionary Works Come for the Murder, Stay for the Art!

We are pleased to welcome **Mark Soppeland** to The Harris Family Gallery. His work is fascinating, whimsical and mysterious, and frequently has a dark side--which complements our recent production, Night Must Fall. Mark created the title piece, "Secrets of the Mystery Cult" specifically for this exhibit. Professor Soppeland is known for incorporating "found objects" into many of his works.

A painter, sculptor and designer, Soppeland has shown his work in more than four hundred exhibitions and has been awarded five Ohio Arts Council Fellowships. He has created more than fifty public art projects including works for The Bravo Networks, Prague Center for Contemporary Art and the Klenova Institute in the Czech Republic, Kohler Art Center, Cleveland Public Theatre, Philadelphia Children's Hospital, Metro Health Medical Center, Summa Health Systems, Children's Hospital Medical Center of Akron, Summit County Children's Services Board and Akron-Summit County Public Library. A Distinguished Professor at The University of Akron, he is starting his 38th year of teaching at The Myers School of Art. He was also awarded "Akron Life's Artist of the Year" in 2008. Soppeland's work can be seen at the Harris Stanton Gallery in Akron and Art and Soul Gallery in Boulder, Colorado. "My work reflects what I believe to be an elemental human need for the activities involved with the search, possession and transformation of the object. Presentation, engagement and exchange are the completing acts of this process. I am particularly interested in moments when a collection of materials, ideas and energy converge to create reassuring events of improbable coincidence," says Soppeland.

"The use of the found brings multiple levels of symbolic and cultural baggage to a meeting with efficiency and historical process. My work attempts to reflect the complexity and duality of the postmodernist world. As such, the work is romantic and pragmatic; primitive and modern; timeless and timely. In the creation of these works, I perform the roles of conceptualist, designer, craftsman, historian, philosopher, storyteller and magician."

Film work includes Freedom (Best Supporting Actor, SA International Film Festival) as well as The Crimson Fold. John has been Managing Director of First Stage Milwaukee, Associate Producer of North Shore Music Theatre, Business Director of Gloucester Stage Company and General Manager of New York's Pearl Theatre Company. Mr. Hedges is a member of Actors' Equity Association, has served on the Board of Directors of Boston's StageSource, been a Conference Panelist for the American Alliance for Theatre & Education, and written for American Theatre magazine. He studied at Indiana State University, the Professional Theatre Training Program at the University of Delaware, is a graduate of the National Shakespeare Conservatory and holds an honorary MFA degree in theatre from Stafford University. He is a graduate of Leadership Akron (Class XXV) and he and his wife, Cheryl, live in Munroe Falls.



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
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
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


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


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
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
