Youth Education

Weathervane offers professionally taught classes to children and teens in acting, musical theatre, dance and technical theater. This year we are offering an all new class on podcasting! Fall and spring classes are held on Saturdays, Tuesday evenings and Wednesday afternoons for home school students. Two-week Hands on Theatre (HOT) camps are offered throughout the summer as well as intensive one-week classes in musical theater and auditioning. We also offer a comprehensive two-week Summer Stock program for teens. Next summer, students will produce, design and stage a full production of The Outsiders, based on the book by S.E. Hinton. Partial scholarships are available for all classes.

Children and teens may also audition for roles in Young Actor Series productions. Parents and family members also have the opportunity to participate by volunteering to assist designers and working backstage.

Weathervane works with area schools by providing education outreach and student study guides as part of our Project STAGE program. This program brings public and private school students to see three productions each season. This season, The Lion in Winter, Children of a Lesser God and The Importance of Being Earnest will be featured in the Project STAGE events. Tickets are \$8.

Donations for Stage Two of the project continue to purchase classroom furnishings, update the lighting system, renovate the lobby and replenish the Capital Fund for maintenance and repairs.





Four society women urged Weathervane Playhouse into existence in 1935 - Grace Hower Crawford, Laurine Schwan, Helen

Troesch and Muriel Maclachlan. They started with amateur theatricals at Coach House Theater, then as now part of Akron Woman's City Club. Back then Coach House was a club theater with closed membership and profits going back to the club. This left nothing for theatrical expansion or experimentation, so the ladies set up shop in a barn owned by U.S. Senator Charles Dick on Marshall Avenue. They had no money so they planned a carnival. After expenses, they cleared \$65 and declared themselves good to go.

Friends assisted in cleaning the barn that had been a garage for the Senator's cars. They scrounged for seats, curtains and a coffee pot. Seven fully costumed and staged plays were presented during the first three weeks of the summer of 1935. The audience applauded while bringing cushions from home to sit on -the benches were hard. There was no running water or heat in the barn, but the operation had a name -- Weathervane, named for the chanticleer on the cupola of the barn. The ladies agreed that they would produce everything -- comedy, tragedy, Shakespeare, new works -- even opera. They also decreed that anyone who fit a part could be on their stage.

"The barn" was home until 1951when it was sold, leaving the troupe homeless. The Board renovated a cement block building on Copley Road. This served until the late 1960's when the troupe moved to the Valley. In the early years,

directors came from the membership and were charged with casting, costumes, settings and publicity. By 1960, there were so many shows that Bob Belfance was hired as Playhouse director. Along with custodian/ticket manager Nora Scott, the two-person staff relied on volunteer support.

A Women's Board was formed in 1938 to offer volunteer and financial assistance. The Youth Theater Workshop grew out of classes offered by the original founders. Muriel Maclachlan was particularly energetic in teaching children, bringing in experts in dance and voice to assist her in teaching the youngsters. Muriel's classes grew until they became today's Education Department. Project STAGE©, a program with reduced-price, school day matinees for students, was added in the early 1990s.

A fund-raising drive in the late 1960s built the present facility on Weathervane Lane. The Playhouse opened in 1970 with Phillip Arnoult's production of *Dark of the Moon*. Grace Crawford, who died in 1971, left a legacy to pay off the mortgage. Construction made possible by the most recent Capital Campaign added classrooms, rehearsal space, scene shop, additional prop storage, elevator, library, fly gallery, stage mechanics, a sound-proof production booth and a costume shop, and also upgraded the roof and HVAC system.


Weathervane celebrated its 500th Mainstage production with the award-winning *The Laramie Project* in February, 2003. The John L. Dietz Classroom Theater for students and black box productions had its inaugural production as part of our 70th Season, opening with *Angels in America: Millennium Approaches* in January 2005.










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Women's Board





About the Play & Playwright

About the Play

Weathervane Community Playhouse celebrates the regional premiere of Mitch Albom's And the Winner Is.

The play's central character is Tyler Johnes, a handsome, self-absorbed movie star who dies on the eve of the Academy Awards. What soon ensues is a comedy of existential proportion! Trapped in a strange limbo-like place with no normal sense of time or meaning, can Tyler somehow negotiate with the heavenly powers-that-be to make it back to Hollywood in time to see if he wins his Oscar? Along the way, Tyler encounters a strange cast of characters including a weird bartender, a buxom ingenue, his cranky agent and even his estranged wife. Alternately charming and cutting, And the Winner Is both skewers Hollywood values and offers up Albom's trademark self-reflective life lessons.

And the Winner Is premiered at the Purple Rose Theatre Company in Chelsea, Michigan in 2005. It marked the second premiere of an Albom play at the theater, which was founded by actor Jeff Daniels in 1991. Albom's first stage comedy, Duckhunter Shoots Angel, premiered at the Purple Rose in 2004. Albom's association with the Purple Rose began when actor Jeff Daniels saw the 2002 off-Broadway production of Albom's Tuesdays with Morrie, after which he persuaded the author to consider writing an original play for his theater. Notable subsequent productions of And the Winner Is include the West Coast premiere in 2006 at the Laguna Playhouse.

About the Playwright

MITCH ALBOM is a best-selling author, playwright, radio host and newspaper columnist. His nine books include Tuesdays with Morrie (which spent four years on The New York Times best-seller list), The Five People You Meet in Heaven (which sold over 8 million copies worldwide) and For One More Day (which spent nine months on the NYT best-seller list). For nearly 25 years, he has written as a journalist and sports writer for The Detroit Free Press. The Associated Press Sports Editors have named him the No. 1 sports columnist in the nation for over a decade. He wrote the screenplay for the television adaptation of his The Five People You Meet in Heaven and co-wrote the stage adaptation (with Jeffrey Hatcher) of his Tuesdays with Morrie, which has received dozens of productions around the country, including an off-Broadway run in 2002. His philanthropic work includes founding three Detroit-area charities: The Dream Fund (connecting at-risk kids with the arts), A Time to Help (a volunteer-based program to assist people with housing, meals and other humanitarian efforts) and S.A.Y. Detroit (funding shelter and care for the homeless).

In the John L. Dietz Theater

Once Weathervane had a theater to call its very own on Copley Road in the 1950s, the wish/need for another smaller "black box" theater surfaced. A goal of the Capital Campaign of 2000 was to add new classrooms for the theater's numerous children's programs. The campaign raised \$1,750,000 and provided a two-story addition. New classrooms became a reality as well as the installation of a fly system over the stage.

One of the classrooms was sponsored by Margaret J. Dietz and named in memory of her son, John L. Dietz. This space became the "black box" theater so long awaited. John was a sixth-grader at Akron's Rankin School and was 12 years old at the time of his death in 1971 following an auto accident. A darling boy with a passion, even at that age, for play-acting, he had just finished playing a clown in a youth theater production of Aesop's Fables.

Angels in America: Millennium Approaches was the inaugural presentation held in Weathervane's new "black box" theater. Running from Jan. 23 to Feb. 5, 2005, the Pulitzer Prize-winning play was directed by Sean McConaha.

Parallel Lives: The Kathy and Mo Show by Mo Gaffney and Kathy Najimy (July 28 - 30 and Aug. 4 - 6, 2005) was the next production for the Dietz Theater. Angels in America: Millennium Approaches was remounted Nov. 10 - 19, 2005, as a preface to part two: Perestroika presented May 18 - June 3, 2006. Then came Fat Men in Skirts, in collaboration with Just Life and Company, July 28 - Aug. 6, 2006.

During the 2006-2007 season we presented Jason Robert Brown's contemporary musical, The Last Five Years, and Michele Lowe's comic drama, String of Pearls. Earlier this season we presented, Someone Who'll Watch Over Me and, now, And the Winner Is.

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

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
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Volunteering at Weathervane

Supporting those who are actively involved in putting on each show are still more volunteers who usher, house manage, sell tickets, keep our office running and serve on our Board of Trustees, Board committees, Production Board, Advisory Board and Women's Board.

Their spirit is the backbone of our continuing operations, a valued support on which our professional staff relies.

Each month, we acknowledge the outstanding Volunteers of the Month in our lobby, but those volunteers represent all who commit their time and interest to create a great theater experience for evervone who's come to see this show.

porting performances in a drama or comedy, outstanding featured and supporting performances in a musical and outstanding achievement in sound design, lighting design, properties design and costume design. The final award of the Chanticleer evening goes to the Best Production of the season.

In addition to performance and technical awards, the event also recognizes the Top 25 outstanding volunteers of the season, who represent all the volunteers whose time and talents create the memorable theater experiences of every Weathervane season.

We welcome you to take part in the biggest nail-biting party of the year. Make sure to pick up your ballot at the end of the season and join us!

Responsibilities

Here's a quick introduction to the responsibilities volunteers undertake to make our shows work. If you'd like to try your hand at any of these jobs, please call us. We'll help you learn! In addition, you receive complimentary tickets to see the shows plus the pride in knowing you are joining nearly 1 million volunteers nationwide to support community theater! Volunteers with 100 hours or more of service are eligible for a special Weathervane membership!

- * Stage Management Duties include assisting the director throughout the rehearsal period, calling cues, keeping backstage safe and orderly, and coordinating the technical needs of the show with the actors. A great opportunity for those who enjoy planning, communicating and taking charge. Once the director's work is done, it's the Stage Manager who runs each performance.
- * Set Construction Use your building skills, carpentry or painting techniques to help make illusion come to life. Help is needed days and evenings.
- * Costumes Designers and workers are vital. We invite skilled and unskilled seamstresses to make or alter costumes, create patterns, care for costumes during a show and keep our wardrobe department organized.
- * Lighting Experience is a plus, but you can learn by assisting others who know computers and electrical requirements. We'll train eager volunteers to help hang, focus and add color to lighting instruments. We'll also teach you how to run the light board and follow spots. *Nobody* can see the show without you.
- * Sound Create the music and sound effects tapes that enrich the aural envi-

- ronment for each show or add "live" backstage sound. Run the sound system for technical rehearsals and productions.
- * Properties All the items that help "dress" a set and all those used by actors in rehearsal and performance (from tea sandwiches to "deadly" weapons and "shattering" windowpanes) must be borrowed, built or cooked. Many volunteers are needed to work on each performance.
- * Office Volunteer If you enjoy dealing with the public, we can use your help during office hours and on show nights to assist in selling tickets and answering the phone to take reservations. You may also help with mailings, work with staff and greet customers and visitors.
- * Ushering Welcome audience members with your smile, show them to their seats, pass out programs, and serve refreshments at intermission. Your help is always welcome.
- * House Manager This representative greets the audience, tears tickets and guides theater-goers to ushers for seating. You'll work with the stage manager to coordinate the timing of intermissions and remain in the lobby throughout the show to handle any emergency.

Our volunteer performers come from throughout greater Akron and northeastern Ohio. They've committed themselves to four or more weeks of rehearsals plus performances. Their greatest reward is your applause.

Many performers come with substantial theatrical experience. Others are new to the stage. Auditions are open to all and our non-traditional casting policy opens the way for many performance opportunities. Except in cases where race, gender, age or disability is essential to the play, all roles are cast on the basis of talent.

Local newspapers carry audition dates and times or call Weathervane at 330-836-2626 to be added to the audition mailing list. Some directors prefer to set appointments for audition times and may ask that you come prepared with a brief

monologue, improvisational subject or musical number. Copies of plays scheduled or audition scenes are often available for a nominal deposit.

When you arrive at the Playhouse on audition nights, you'll learn about the rehearsal and performance schedule. You may also register as a production volunteer if you're interested in learning about the technical opportunities in the show.

You may be asked to return for call-backs and will be notified of the director's cast selection as soon as possible. Please note that if you don't win the role you've wanted so badly, it may not necessarily reflect on your talent. The director's choice of cast members must take many factors into account. So, don't be discouraged and please audition again.

Beware of the Dreaded No-Show

Have you ever seen empty seats at a *sold out* sporting event or concert? Weathervane has the same problem. Subscribers who may have exchanged from another performance wonder why they weren't given those prime empty seats for the evening.

When you buy a subscription, you are *promising* to come to the theater for that ticketed performance and we hold your seat(s). This makes it impossible to tell if a performance is ever really *sold out* and annoys other ticket buyers who see that they could have been seated in a better spot.


Meet the cast Many cast members spend a few minutes in the lobby area to meet and greet friends after performances. It's your chance to thank them for their performance.



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
